SUED FOR SLANDER.

A Sensational Case Now on in Circuit Court.

SERMON. Dr. A. V. V. Raymond on The Emphasis in Religion

President Andrew V. V. Raymond of Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., preached in the Tomkins Avenue Congregational church, Brooklyn, His subject was "The Emphasis in Religion." The text was chosen from Luke vi. 46: "Why call ye me Lord, and do not the things which I say?"

It seems to me that with many of us the highest idea of religion has been to call Christ, Lord. The doctrines about Him have been for ages the supreme test of orthodoxy. By them the church has sought to divide the sheep from the goats. And even now the plea of many appears especially in zeal to keep this separative fence in repair. To them the greater question is not "What is man's spirit? How Christ-like is he?" but "What title does he give to Christ?"

Now to accept this teaching is not to say that Christ is not Lord and ought not to be called Lord—but that calling Him Lord is not enough—is not necessarily making Him our Lord. It simply takes the emphasis from a form of words and puts it on a spirit of obedience and of service. Emphasis is the great thing in any sentence of teaching. Take this for instance: "A child ought to obey his father."
