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INDICATIONS THAT G. T. P. TRAFFIC WILL NOT COME TO THE PORT OF ST. JOHN

Startling Report From Ottawa that Portland and Providence Will Get the Business.

If this Proves to be True St. John Will Not Benefit One Dollar's Worth -- Has Mr. Pugsley Been Betraying Us Again?

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Aug. 27.—That the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway traffic will not find its way down to New Brunswick and Canadian ocean ports is indicated in a statement given to your correspondent by a leading official of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission.

As originally intended by the Grand Trunk, the traffic from the west is to come down to Ontario via North Bay AND OVER THE OLD GRAND TRUNK SYSTEM TO PORTLAND AND PROVIDENCE, P. I.

The Grand Trunk is desirous of getting the Ontario government line, to reduce its grades and use it as a permanent link between the new and old system. If the Ontario government will not lease the line the Grand Trunk will enter an arrangement for running rights. The line of the N.T.R. from Cochrane east must await for as through traffic is concerned for the Quebec bridge and for a lot of actual construction work, one contract being so far untouched.

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THE TELEGRAPH LIAR AGAIN

NEW MEN FOR BISLEY TEAM

FATAL PANIC IN A THEATRE, MANY KILLED

Fire Scare in Canonsburg, Pa. Opera House, Started Audience in Mad Rush for Door -- Twenty-Six Dead. Canonsburg, Pa., Aug. 27.—Twenty-six dead from suffocation, twenty-five seriously injured, thirty suffering from minor hurts. That is the human toll exacted last night during an inexcusable panic at a moving picture show in the Canonsburg Opera House.

Ottawa, Aug. 26.—Capt. C. R. Crowe, of Guelph won the governor general's prize, the blue ribbon event in Canadian rifle shooting, when he defeated Sergt. J. Battershill, of the 8th Regiment, Winnipeg, in the shoot-off at the Dumfries Rifle Association matches Saturday. Capt. Crowe had been a leader in the grand aggregate up to about the last day when he dropped somewhat and Sergt. Battershill won the first prize in the grand aggregate. In the first stage of the governor general's it was Capt. Crowe's turn and he pulled out a winner of this stage with a score of 98 while Sergt. Battershill was 3 points behind.

It is indeed unusual that of this year's Bisley's team, only two are in this Bisley team of 20, there are only 7 who have ever been on a Bisley team before at any time. Measurements taken by members of the jury showed the staircase leading to the second floor of the building, the main entrance to the Opera House, to be only six and one half feet wide, while the doorway at the bottom was not more than eight feet.
