RECIPROCITY WOULD BE BAD FOR **NOVA SCOTIA ORCHARDISTS,** SAYS A LIBERAL EXPERT

The Following is the Opinion Expressed by a Fruit Expert, who is Also a Liberal, Concerning Reciprocity and Our Markets.

PORK DEALERS REFUSE TO BUY.

Produce buyers in the province are finding it hard to dispose of pork in large quantities.

The dealers of St. John and other points of the Maritime Provinces are only buying sufficient pork to carry them through their immediate needs.

Why? The dealers claim that if they pay the prevailing prices in this market, the passage of reciprocity will find them loaded with a smashed market.

The fact is that they realize that if the pact passes it means cheap pork from the United States and the flooding of the New Brunswick market.

If reciprocity passes they will be able to get their supplies for the fall several cents per pound less than they are now paying here. That means that until after September 21st there will be little pork sold in New Brunswick and if reciprocity passes, farmers will have to be content with a big cut.

It is notorious that United States corn fed pork can be produced much cheaper than it can be raised by the Canadian farmer, who is pressed hard at the present time by United States farmers, even with the heavy duty on that article.

Once throw down the trade barrier between Canada and the United States and it will be good-bye to the high prices that have ruled in New Brunswick for several years.

Not only that but the local packing factories will be put out of business and the local markets for pork will be destroyed. The pork market of Canada is one of the things that President Taft has his eye on.

That settled it, Maine potatoes were actually fed to Canadian troops in a county which the Telegraph boasts is solid for reciprocity.

To get the Maine potatoes to Sussex it was necessary to pay 60 cents per barrel duty, freight charges and the profits of a middleman. With reciprocity the duty of 60 cents per barrel will be wiped out. Under those conditions, where will the farmers of Kings and other counties find themselves?
