Ottawa, Jan. 20.—It is announced tonight that Sir Robert Borden, Prime Minister, has sent to the Imperial authorities the offer of a fourth Canadian Division at the front. The troops are in England now and they will go over to France in the near future. This will make two complete army corps or about 80,000 men on the firing line. With the sending of another division of 20,000 men across the channel it will be necessary to send a corresponding number from Canada to England to be held in readiness to act as reinforcements. The action of the government was made possible by the prospect of a satisfactory response from the country to the call for 5,000 men.




