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
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GREETINGS....

Association Hall.

The object of the Association is to furnish a home and centre for the religious life of the University; to promote growth in grace and Christian fellowship among its members and aggressive Christian

work, especially by and for students; to train them for Christian service and to lead them to devote their lives to Jesus Christ not only in distinctive religious callings but also in secular pursuits.

The building, which was erected in 1886 and was furnished by the Ladies' Auxiliary, is open every day except Sunday from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Its privileges are open to all members. The Reading Room is well supplied with newspapers, periodicals and magazines. The parlor is very comfortably furnished, and members will always find at their disposal a piano, an organ, college song books, checkers and chess.

Library.

The Library of the Association is composed chiefly of works on missions. Books will be let out on application to the General Secretary or any member of the Rooms' Committee, and should be returned at the end of two weeks.

General Secretary.

With the erection of Association Hall the administration of the growing work of the Association was too heavy a burden upon the President and undergraduate officers so the Association employ a General Secretary or executive officer to supervise the work. The Secretary will be pleased to welcome any student to whom he may be of service. His hours will be found on the Y. M. C. A. bulletin board.

Membership.

The Active Membership consists of students who are members in good standing of an evangelical church.

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The Associate Membership consists of students of good moral character. The annual fee for both active and associate members is \$1.00.

The Life Membership consists of graduates and undergraduates of the University who agree to pay the sum of \$2.00 per year for ten years.

The Sustaining Membership consists of undergraduates who are able and desire to contribute the sum of at least \$3.00 per year during their undergraduate course.

Students may be nominated for membership at any regular meeting of the Association.

Regular Meetings.

Thursday Afternoon Meeting.—Every Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock a general religious meeting is held in Association Hall. These meetings will be addressed by prominent Christian workers.

Class Prayer Meeting.—Each of the four years and the S.P.S. hold weekly prayer meetings. The time of these meetings will be announced as early as possible.

Bible Classes.—The Bible Class for the Seniors and Juniors will be conducted by Principal Sheraton of Wycliffe College on Sunday afternoons at 3 o'clock.

A Bible Class for Sophomores will also be held. Arrangements as to leader and time of meeting will be made early in the Fall term.

The First Year Bible Class will be conducted by the General Secretary and will meet at 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon.

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University of Toronto

HISTORICAL.



1827.—Royal Charter granted for establishing a State University under the name of King's College.

1842.—APRIL 23RD.—Laying of the corner stone of King's College Building in Queen's Park.

1843.—Beginning of Lectures in Faculties of Arts, Medicine and Divinity.

1850.—JAN. 1ST.—In accordance with an Act of Parliament the Faculty of Divinity ceases to exist, and King's College is transformed into the University of Toronto.

1853.—Faculty of Medicine abolished. University College created, with a teaching Faculty in Arts. The University of Toronto retains the power to conduct examinations and to grant degrees.

1854.—FEB. 22ND.—Establishment of the Literary and Scientific Society.

1856.—OCT. 4TH.—Laying of the corner stone of University College Building.

1858.—OCT. 4TH.—Placing of the coping stone on the turret of the main tower.

1873.—MARCH 29TH.—Organization of the Young Men's Christian Association.

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1880.—OCT. 7TH.—First issue of THE VARSITY under the management of a joint-stock company.

1881.—Establishment of the School of Practical Science, and erection of the building.

1886.—MARCH 2ND.—Opening of the Y. M. C. A. Hall.

1887.—University Federation Act, by which the University of Toronto is given teaching Faculties in Arts, Medicine and Law.

1888.—Erection of Biological Building on the site of old Moss Hall.

1890.—FEB. 14TH.—The University College fire.

1890.—OCT. 7TH.—First issue of THE VARSITY under the management of the Literary and Scientific Society.

1891.—JUNE 15TH.—Laying of the corner stone of Victoria College.

1892.—MARCH 24TH.—The Young Men's Christian Association incorporated.

1892.—APRIL 1ST.—Canadian Colleges' Mission established.

1892.—AUG. 6TH.—Death of Sir Daniel Wilson, President of the University.

1892.—SEPT. 13TH.—Prof. James Loudon, M.A., LL.D., appointed President.

1892.—Library Building opened.

1894.—Gymnasium Building completed.

1895.—Chemistry and Mineralogy Building completed.

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INTERCOLLEGIATE MOVEMENT.




Its purposes are threefold :

1. To bring the students of the world to Christ.
2. To guard and develop them in Christ.
3. To send them into the world to work for Christ.

The movement has had a remarkable growth. Before the Intercollegiate department was incorporated in the work of the International Committee in 1877, there were only 26 Associations on the continent, and these were bound together by no tie and had no common purposes or methods of work. But these 26 Associations with their 1,300 members have increased to over 500 Associations, with 30,000 members. Every prominent institution of higher learning in the United States and Canada has now its organization. Within eighteen years fully 30,000 college men have been influenced to become followers of Jesus Christ; 3,400 men have been led to enter the Christian ministry; and tens of thousands of men have been trained in methods of Christian work. This wonderful development has been due largely to the

directive work of the Intercollegiate Committee. The 1895 records showed 8,000 men in Association Bible Classes, 20 Associations with General Secretaries, 23 with separate buildings, 1,000 delegates at Summer Schools, 35 publications on College work and 4 International College Secretaries.

The movement is directed from New York city as headquarters. We are kept in close touch with it through correspondence and the visits of the Secretaries. Our own Association owes much to the supervision of the Intercollegiate Committee, and calls for the prayer and support of its members for this commendable and most necessary work.

Origin.

In 1888 our Y.M.C.A., impressed with the supreme importance of foreign missionary work, sent as a missionary to Corea, Mr. J. S. Gale, B.A. Two years later the Medical Students' Y.M.C.A., following our example, sent to the same field Dr. and Mrs. Hardie. In March, 1892, Mr. Gale having joined another Board, we united with the "Meds" in forming the C.C.M., with Dr. and Mrs. Hardie as our representatives. The work was extended to other colleges and schools, and we have now mission circles in sixty different educational institutions in Ontario and Quebec.

The mission is distinctly undenominational.

Its Objects are:

1. To impress upon and foster in the minds of Canadian students, the claims of foreign missions; and, since zeal for any cause can be developed only in proportion as that zeal finds expression in practice,
2. The prosecution of aggressive missionary work among the unevangelized, especially in Corea.

Means Employed.

Special prayer Saturday evening from 9 to 10 o'clock. Publication of a monthly journal—"The College Missionary." Employment of a travelling secretary. Maintenance of medical and evangelistic work in Wonsau, Corea.

How Supported.

All effort in connection with this work is spontaneous, and its support purely voluntary on the part of the students and their friends. The former have adopted the plan of weekly systematic giving (1 Cor. xvi. 2), and last year contributed over \$700.

In Wonsau the mission has a large lot, on which is built a commodious brick dispensary, which our missionaries occupied while in Corea. It is, however, much too small for a family dwelling, and is, moreover, urgently needed for the purpose for which it was built. The need of a suitable dwelling has long been felt, and must now be supplied unless the Lord's work is to be further impeded. We look to students to contribute the \$1,700 required for maintenance, and to collect from their friends the \$1,900 need for dwelling and supplies.

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Our Missionaries.

A year ago Dr. and Mrs. Hardie were compelled to return home on account of ill-health, due largely to Malaria. Six years of foreign service, under the most favorable circumstances has often led to a similar result, but when we remember that upon these two rested the entire responsibility of inaugurating and maintaining in a new and difficult field, a work both medical and evangelistic, and that, with but meagre equipment, we feel that they have in every respect proved their fitness for this calling. Although their little girl, Bessie, has not yet sufficiently recovered to be taken back, our missionaries feel that the work demands the return, as soon as possible, of one of them at least. In accordance with their own proposal, therefore, the doctor sailed for Corea in September, leaving Mrs. Hardie and the children at home for another year.

Surely their renewed self-sacrifice will quicken our zeal!

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Every student of the University of Toronto should be in sympathy with and have a direct interest in our college athletics and should manifest his interest by joining the Athletic Association which looks after the various departments of college athletics.

The athletic achievements of our University are well-known, and the honor and pleasure of membership on an University team is something well worth working for.

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GYMNASIUM....

The Gymnasium is situated back of the College and is acknowledged to be one of the best equipped on the Continent. The best and most modern gymnastic apparatus has been secured and the building also contains bowling alleys, shower and swimming baths, a running track, lockers and dressing rooms. A competent instructor has been engaged and is in constant attendance at the Gymnasium. Fencing, single-stick, etc., are taught, and special attention is given to class work in gymnastics. An Assault-at-arms is held annually to which the public are invited.

Gymnasium Hours.

Fencing Class, 4 to 6—Tuesdays and Thursdays, in Assembly Hall.

Class Work, 5 to 6—Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

General Work—Saturdays, and when special work is not required.

During the hours that class work is going on all members other than those engaged in class will be excluded from the floor. All members wishing information as to the apparatus, or assistance on the floor, are requested to apply to the instructor, Mr. Williams, who will assist in every way they may require.


