## ORGANIZATION OF A RED CROSS

(Continued from Page 1).

that we do not need such a nurse, we need one or two and perhaps more and we need them badly. We only have to look in the Vital Statistics of the town and see the great number of young babies who appear in this world and disappear after a few weeks or a few months to get the certitude that there is something wrong somewhere. Every mother feels that it is not the wish of God that her young baby be taken away from her and put in the ground at the age where the innocent creature begins to smile and stretch his little arms towards the one who gave him life.

Mothers, it is not God's desire that you should suffer in vain and that the reward of your devotion to your country should be two or three small white crosses in a corner of a grave-yard. Oh, no, your children are given to you to stay with you, to grow under your eyes, to help you when they are grown up to take your place when you get old and to close your eyes when it is time for you to follow the great law of nature and lay down for the endless sleep.

We often hear people say when a child dies: "This is God's will, the poor child makes one more angel in heaven." This is a blasphemy, it is not God's will but often it is the parent's neglect that causes the child's death.

I admit that in some cases the child will lose the fight in spite of all, in spite of proper care and feeding, but in the majority of cases these feeble creatures are deprived of the greatest possible gift, which is life, on account of some defects in the management of their diet and hygiene in the early life.

Parents can not always be blamed or kept responsible for what happens, Organization No. 2 of the Red Cross for the reason that they do the best they can, they do according to the best way they were told. The responsibility lays on the community which did not teach them the sciences of motherhood. There should be schools where mothers will learn how to feed their babies how to take care of them, how to prevent many diseases and there are none but the Red Cross nurse will try to remedy it.

Those who are educated and have time to read will take in the books the knowledge necessary to enable them to fulfill properly their duties of mother. Those who can hardly read or have no time to do so, are generally guided by the neighbors who have received their hygienic education from their mothers and grand mothers and God knows how hard it is for a small child to pass through the ill-treatment and stomach and entire body and still live and become strong.

The Red Cross nurse is here to tell you what you should do to give your babies all the possible chances to live, to grow strong and be in fighting condition to support the attacks of our numerous enemies called microbes or germs of disease.

In order to work properly the present nurse and those who will follow her, require help and support, she cannot work with success and authority if she is left alone, she must have some influential body to support and assist her in every way, and this meeting is called to elect, I would say to select, those who are more willing to do good to their neighbors and fellow citizens.

I hope that this organization will be a success and that every Red Cross member present and future will make it a duty to work in sympathies with the nurse.

This is a non sectarian organization and I hope religion will be left home and have nothing to do with the Red Cross affairs; or you may adopt a new religion, the religion of saving the lives of dozens of babies who die of preventable diseases every year, adopt the religion of bringing consolation in the homes that are desolated, of bringing hope to those who despair, adopt the religion of bringing sunshine and light where darkness reigns and health where death is waiting.

In devoting yourselves to the Red Cross works or in helping the nurse to conduct as it should be you will save many lives, and more fortunate than the great men who had stone monuments erected in their memory, you will see around you numerous living monuments under the form of rosy happy children.

Remember that children have a God given right to live, and to deprive them of it is a crime. Remember also that nothing brings more satisfaction than being able to say to yourself when the day is over, that you made some difference in the day just ended, that a sick one is suffering less, that a child is feeling more comfortable and sleeps better, that someone is blessing you for the good you did to them.

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## MEETING OF PRESBYTERY

Reports of Work and Plans Being Made for This Season.

The Quarterly Meeting of the Presbytery of Miramichi was held on Tuesday March 14th, in St. James Hall, Newcastle, with morning, afternoon and evening sessions. There were present Revs. L. H. McLeod, Moderator, W. H. Matthews, P. W. Thompson, A. D. Archibald, H. Miller, B. C. Sallis, L. J. King, E. J. Shaw, G. A. Grant, T. Harrison, H. S. Raymond, J. C. McNeill, A. Firth, A. McRoy, MacMillan, J. P. McCurdy, B. H. Penwarden, A. Crooks, J. H. Anderson, ministers, and Messrs. D. Baldwin, W. J. Carruthers, P. A. Forsythe, H. F. Patterson, elders.

After the devotional service and adoption of minutes the business of the Presbytery was taken up. At the request of the clerk the Presbytery adjourned to the 11th of the day and appointed P. W. Thompson to act in his stead.

Mr. Matthews submitted the report on the "Bible School" which showed an encouraging feature of the work and life in the congregations of the Presbytery. Mr. Archibald reported for the committee on co-operation that the Methodist and Presbyterian Congregations in New Brunswick had been visited and the matter laid before them, but that time is not yet ripe for any further definite action.

Mr. Miller brought up the matter of special offerings for the Sick Ministers Relief fund and a more generous response in the interest of those immediately concerned. The clerk was requested to bring the matter before the congregations.

On motion of Mr. Miller, seconded by Mr. Anderson, Professor Charles Cumming, Ph. D., of Bangor Theological Seminary was unanimously nominated for the Old Testament chair in Saskatoon College. Applications were made to the Home Missions Board for grants amounting to \$100 to \$750 for the following congregations: Harcourt, Bass River, New Brunswick, New Carlisle, Upper Miramichi, Douglastown and Nelson, Blackville and Millville.

Mr. McCurdy was instructed to apply to the Home Missions Board for a grant for the mission fields of Millbank and Micou and Kouchibouguie. It is expected that George King who was a student missionary in Matapedia last summer will accept appointment as an ordained missionary to the same field after graduation in April.

Mr. McCurdy submitted the report on his home missions. He read Dr. Ross's full statement of his work in visiting congregations in connection with the new minimum stipend for ministers which showed faithful and effective effort and indicated that the seven congregations had come up to the new requirements and that others had made advances. A resolution was passed expressing the thanks of the Presbytery to Dr. Ross for his good service.

The congregations which attained the minimum are: New Richmond, Bathurst, Black River, Loggieville, Redford, Messingville and Red Bank. Revs. L. J. King and J. P. McCurdy made a strong request that the Presbytery should apply for a grant from the Forward Movement Extension Fund, to provide a School Home for the benefit of the boys and girls along the Gaspe coast. Presbytery approved and agreed to make the application.

Mr. Anderson submitted the report for the past year on Sunday Schools and young people's societies. One of the encouraging features of the report was the increase in young people's organizations and also the more generous offerings made by the Sunday Schools to missions. The report which was adopted, recommended to sessions and Sunday School workers the value of boys' and girls' summer camps and the summer schools for Sunday Schools workers through the M. R. E. C. The boys' camp is to be held at Chipman, July 15 to 27, the girls camp from July 29 to Aug. 7 also at Chipman. Summer Schools for teachers will be held in this province at Sackville Aug. 4 to 11th and Woodstock Aug. 21 to 28th.

The report of the General Interests committee was given by Mr. Archibald. It was requested that the treasurers of the congregations should forward Budget money to the head office at least quarterly. Another request was to the Assembly's Committee on Literature to provide a leaflet on the use of cigarettes by boys. A resolution was passed expressing regret at the death of Dr. MacMillan, Minister, Miramichi.

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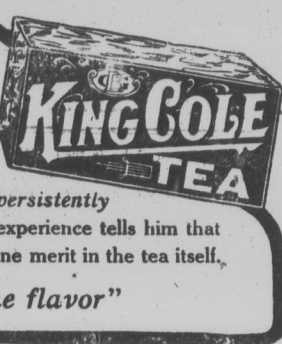
