HALIFAX, N. S., March 5.—Full returns at hand shew that the Tories have carried sixteen seats in Nova Scotia and the Liberals five. The Liberals redeemed Digby and Queen's, but lost Richmond, Lunenburg and one seat in Halifax. In Annapolis, Mills (Tory) has about 100 majority. In Antigonish Sir John Thompson has 234. In Cape Breton McKeen and McDougall (Tory) have 691 and 491 majority respectively. In Colchester Patterson (Tory) has 797. The Prohibitionist got less than 100 votes. In Cumberland Dickey has 750 majority; in Halifax Kenny and Stairs (Tory) will have about 700; in Inverness (Zameron (Tory) has 450; in Hants Putnam (Tory), 124; in Lunenburg Kaulbach (Tory), 37; in Pictou Tupper and McDougald (Tory), 33; in Pictou Tupper and McDougald (Tory), 734 and 688 respectively; in Richmond Gillies (Tory), 142; in Shelburne White (Tory), 17; in Victoria McDonald (Tory), 53. Railway Directors Held Responsible for an Accident.

New York, March 7.—Coroner Levy has issued warrants for the arrest of five of the railroad officials alleged by his jury to be responsible for the Harlem tunnel disaster. The gentlemen named in the warrants were Chauncey M. Depew, G. N. Miller, Wilson G. Hunt, Joseph Park and Wm. Rockefeller. Mr. Depew appeared at the coroner's office and furnished the bond of Cornelius Vanderbilt for \$25,000. Mr. Park surrendered himself, and H. J. Park, his son, went on his bond for \$25,000. President Clark surrendered soon after Mr. Park did. He also gave a bond in \$25,000. The warrants for Messrs. Miller and Hunt have not yet been served owing to the advanced age of the gentlemen. The coroner said he would wait until Monday night in their cases. The coroner has signed warrants for the arrest of the other directors and they will be arrested as quickly as possible. Operators McManus and Breen were discharged by the coroner and Engineer Fowler is under \$10,000 bail to await the action of the grand jury.

GROWTH OF EUROPEAN CITIES.

It is Even More Wonderful Than That of American Urban Population.

According to the census which has just been completed in Germany, the growth of cities is almost as rapid in Europe as in this country, and in some respects even more wonderful. Berlin has gone up past New York, with a population of 1,574,485. Hamburg, with its beg suburb of Altona, has 715,170 inhabitants. Leipsic is credited with 353,272. Munich has a population of 344,899, and that of Breslau is 334,710. Cologne has 282,537 inhabitants; Dresden, 276,085; Magdeburg, 300,071, and Frankfort-on-the-Main, 179,850. In 1885, when the last previous census of Germany was taken, Berlin had 1,315,297 inhabitants; Hamburg and Altona, 410,404; Leipsic, 170,076; Munich, 261,981; Breslau, 299,405; Cologne, 161,266; Dresden, 245,515; Magdeburg, 114,298 and Frankfort-on-the-Main, 154,518. Such gains as are here shown can searcely be matched by an equal number of cities on this continent. The period between the two enumerations, it flust be remembered, is any half as long as that from 1880 to 1890, which is used in all tables showing the growth of American cities, and yet, while the reare but four places in this country in which the increase in population has been as much as 120,000 in the last ten years, Germany has four cities which have increased from 121,000 to 259,000 each in five years. It is the same with some of the smaller cities. Magdeburg has gained about as much in five years as Detroit and Milwaukee in ten, and Munich is growing much faster than Cincinnati or San Francisco.

The crowding into the towns which has caused so much comment in this country is found elsewhere in the civilized world. Next year the census to be taken in Great Britain will show that not a few British thems here gaining at an astonishing cities have been gaining at an astonishing rate for old towns in the country where the population has long been dense. A Few Palatable Recipes.

SALTED ALMONDS.

Shell and blanch one pound of almonds, i. e., drop into a vessel of boiling water to loosen the skin, when in a few minutes the almond can be pushed out white and pure from the brown skin; dry thoroughly in a towel; put into a large pan a piece of butter the size of a small chestnut, and, when melted, turn the almonds into it, stirring rapidly until every nut is shining with butter; then sprinkle over them a large cooking-spoonful of salt, mixing so that every nut shall be coated with salt, then put the pan in the bottom of the oven, and let it remain there (shaking and stirring every few minutes) until the almonds are a light yellowish-brown, when they will be very crisp and delicious.

When risen sufficiently take a light brown, and, after eating one, acknowledge that you have attained to the
