THE MAKE-UP OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The House of Commons of Canada consists of 215 members. Each Province is represented in the Commons on the basis of population.

By the census of 1871 Ontario gained 6, Nova Scotia, 2, and New Brunswick 1. Manitoba, Prince Edward Island and British Columbia were admitted, and by special agreement were accorded the following representation in the Commons, which will remain at those figures until their proportionate gain of population over Quebec entitles them or any of them to more: Manitoba, 5; Prince Edward Island, 6; British Columbia, 6.

By the census of 1881 Ontario made a further gain of four seats, but none of the other Provinces made a gain on Quebec. In 1895 the four territories of the Northwest were each accorded a member in the House of Commons, namely Alberta, Saskatchewan, Assiniboia West and Assiniboia East.

A Liberal Jew.

Certainly, an illustrious example of practical benevolence is supplied by the news that the well-known Israelite and man of wealth, Baron Hirsch, has telegraphed Mr. Jesse Seligman, treasurer of the "Baron Hirsch Fund" the trustees of the fund may draw upon him for \$2,000,000, to be applied to the relief of the Hebrew immigrants in this country. The income of this amount is to be devoted to the work of giving them homes in some fertile farming districts of the country. The money is to be at the disposal of the Baron Hirsch Fund trustees, even if the demands are so great as to compel a part of the principal to be drawn upon. In this case Baron Hirsch has promised to make good the amounts needed. In this Baron Hirsch only emphasizes a work begun some time ago, for during the last twelve months the Baron has furnished on an average of \$10,000 a month for the relief of the Hebrews in this country. His charity has been extended to many other countries. The persecution of the Jews in Russia recently has driven out of that country hundreds of these people, many of whom have come to our shores, and have been assisted by Baron Hirsch and other well-to-do Jews in establishing themselves in comfortable homes. The benefactions is a most noble one and will make the Baron's name, already illustrious, unrivaled in the domain of a giving which is more than princely. Evidently the Baron believes in doing good while he lives and while he can direct what has too often been diverted by the Jews from its true end when the testament has gone down to his grave.

Food for the Brain.

[Juliet Crohn, in Harper's Bazaar.] There is a popular idea extant that foods which abound in phosphorus are special brain nutrients, but it has no scientific foundation. There are many empirical mixtures based on this idea that are extensively sold as brain and nerve food, without any particular merit or applicability. Made Gentle. A fine sentiment deeply felt by one person will prove contagious, however insensible his companion may seem at first, and however obstinate he may be himself, sometimes, indeed, his influence is all the greater for being unobtrusive and unassuming. Little by little all the men, of rather coarse fiber by nature, grew gentle and kind, and some drooping shoulders and weary looks on their faces faded away, as if by magic. From beyond a mistake that the inevitable shadow was drawing nearer. Every day someone hid a piece of work for him, and put it on the bench. The night before the night the little coffin came out of the lonely door, and the snail-like winged men flew from their lean clothes, stood just round the corner. Most of them had given a half-day's time for the privilege of following in the footsteps of the man who had a child, though probably not one of them had ever seen him.

A Few Palatable Recipes.
