



B. Smith, urging the need of such a measure, asking her to do her part in having the negolution adopted by the national body, and commending the council of women for all that it has done and is doing for Canada's welfare.

The letter in part reads as follows:

"Know to My Sorrow."
"This motion has interested me reatly. Farm women, especially, have a hard time to get any of their husband's income, that is milk checks, sale of stock, pigs and cattle, hay or grain, and are eramped for money, not having a definite allowance. I think that it is no more than right that women should have a right to get new clothes for themselves and family and things needed in the house without having to ask and be refused, condemned, abused and cursed in some cases. That I know to my sorrow, and another thing, it s not right that a mother, no matter should be deprived of the satisfaction of knowing that she will have vive her husband.

Too often the husband farmer usually leaves everything in pro-perty and money to the children, and the mother that has raised them and wife that has worked as hard as he and saved and done without, to educate a perhaps unappreciative child, can be left with little or othing and be obliged to go and



Roy Gibbons, in Guise of "Bootlegger," Discovers How Tens of Thousands of Gallons of Liquor Are Smuggled Into "Dry America" While Washington Delays Action.

BULLETIN.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 15 .- Roy A. Haynes, federal prohibition commissioner, came to Detroit today for a three-days' conference with federal, state and city officlais engaged in enforcing the liquor laws and to deliver a series of lectures designed to bring about closer co-operation of the public with these officials. The commis-sioner also is to address the National Methodist Conference now

In session, The illicit Ilquor traffic over the Canadian border is to receive much of Commissioner Haynes' attention here and he may visit Port Huron, where some officials claim the rum-runners have moved the greater part of their operations owing to vigilance of officers in the Detroit area.

Efforts of liquor agents here and In Canadian border cities, it was announced, are to be directed chiefly at the practice of smug-gling into the United States liquor shipped to Canada for medicinal purposes. This traffic, it was said, now makes up about 75 per cent of the rum-running here, the liquor being unloaded from cars
just across the border and immediately brought back by truck.





usual banking business, taking loans from the people and lending money principally to the farming community. There are times when farmers find they have to sacrifice in order to raise money against certain paper they have signed. In our scheme we would probably take a mortgage as security and allow the money to be paid at a lower rate than is being charged at the present moment. The Advertiser inquired if it were

practicable to pay a higher rate of interest to the depositor and at the same time let the farmer have the money at a lower rate of interest than was being charged in the charter banks at the present time. Can Be Done Profitably.

"We figured very carefully on that point," answered Mr. McKenzie, "and we are quite satisfied that the thing can be done safely and profitably. There have been some loans made recently that show how it would work out and effect, a saving for the whole province.


