INTO THE FIRE

Japs Driving Russians Into Hands of the Chinese.

ACCORDING TO THE EXPERTS

Entrance Into Mongolia Might Be Signal For General Attack Up:n ! u o atkin.

St. Petersburg, May 16. - In view of the official dispatches regarding the hostile attitude of the Chinese with-in and without the Russian sphere of influence, the authorities here do not conceal their apprehension as to the outlook; especially in the north of the empire, for they purpose to call the attention of the Celestial Government to the impending uprising in Tapadciatsi, in order that repressive measures may be instantly taken.

It is known and appreciated here that all the powers have made strong representations to Pekin in the inter-est of the preservation of the tranquility of the empire, but it is stated that Major-General Pflug's dispatch of May 14 shows the necessity for further impressing the Celestial Government with the advisability of acting with a firm hand. The authorities do not forget that the Boxer revolt, which spread from Shan Tung, would have involved the entire empire had it not been for the firmnes of the southern viceroys.

The military authorities in St. Petersburg claim to have information of a sensational character to the effect that the Chinese have tacitly agreed to co-operate with the Japanese operations against the Russians. The Japanese propose, it is stated, to drive General Kuropatkin's forces into Mongolia, which would place the Russians in the position of invaders of neutral territory, and enable re-prisals by General Ma's army. This army, it is asserted, is kept in that region for that special object. Thus the slightest infringement of the neutrality of China by Japan would be cleverly avoided, and the Chinese troops, by not crossing the Manchur-ian frontier, could not be charged with a violation of pledges in respect to non-interference in military operations in Manchuria. 

Kansas City, May 16.-Survivors of he Poncas Indians, who 40 years ago numbered 6,000 but are now reduced to 600, have purchased three buffalos from the Goodnight ranch in the Panhandle of Texas in order to have a buffalo hunt, the result of which will determine the selection of a new tribal chief and his ten advisers. Horse Chief, who was selected at the Sun dance last June to succeed his father. White Eagle, cannot assume authority until this hunt takes place. It will probably be their last chance. When the Poncas inaugurate a new chief they hold the Buffalo hunt at which 60 bucks form twelve hunting parties of five each to chase the ani mals. The most successful ten in the hunt are selected as the council, and when one of these dies the next best hunter among the remaining 50 who participated in the chase is put in his place. The Indians have been dying so fast that out of the 60 who hunted when White Eagle was inaugurated

DETECT FEIGNED DEAFNESS. Gofseyeff tells the military candidate

feigning deafness that his sense touch is to be tested first. Various ests are made with pins, etc., on various parts of the body. Then a clothes brush is rubbed across back a few times, and he is asked whether he feels it. The sound of the brush is unconsciously associated with the sensation by those who can hear. If the examiner now passes his hand lightly over the candidate's back, and at the same time passes the brush over his own clothes, the candidate who can hear will think the brush is still being rubbed over his clothes, and cannot distinguish the hand from the brush. On the other hand, a deaf man will always give the correct answer as to whether the hand or the brush is used. The same correctness will be observed in healthy persons when the ears are closed tightly. This is bécause when the hearing is eliminated, the difference in the sensation between the hand and the brush passed over the clothes is noticed more acutely than when the sound of brushing accompanies the procedure and confuses the observer.-New York Medical Journal.


