EXPLANATION OF CALENDAR PAGES.

The Publishers of this Almanac, with a view to increase its circulation and usefulness, have adapted its calculations for the whole country. the Moon's changes are given for five different places, viz., Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, and London. The rising and setting of the Sun are given for Montreal and Toronto. The Sun's declination North or South is given as usual. The rising and setting of the Moon are given with sufficient exactness for all practical purposes. The weather prognostications are again calculated according to the table of the celebrated Dr. Herschel, and for extraordinary accuracy Miller's Almanac retains its wonderful popularity.

ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR 1863.

During this year there will be four Eclipses, two of the Sun and two of the Moon.

- I.—On the 17th of May, there will be a partial eclipse of the Sun. Not visible in any part of British America.
- II.—In the evening of the 1st of June there will be a total eclipse of the moon. It will appear as a *partial* eclipse in Canada. At the time of the moon's rising the shadow will appear, covering nearly two-thirds of its surface, and passing off in about 45 minutes.
- III.—On the 11th of November there will be an annular eclipse of the Sun, but it will not be visible in Canada.
- V.—In the morning of the 25th of November, there will be a partial eclipse of the Moon, of which take note, that it begins at Quebec 29 minutes past 2 and ends 10 minutes past 5; begins at Montreal 21 min. past 2, and ends 38 minutes past 5; begins at Kingston 9 min. past 2 and ends 30 minutes past 5; begins at Toronto 57 minutes past 1, and ends 18 minutes past 5; begins at London 49 minutes past 1, and ends 10 minutes past 5.

APPEARANCE OF THE PLANETS, 1863.

Until September 28th Venus will be Evening Star, and the rest of the year Morning Star. Until October 2nd Mars will be Evening Star, then Morning Star the rest of the year. Jupiter will be Morning Star until April 12th, Evening Star until Oct. 31st, then Morning Star the rest of the year. Until March 23rd, Saturn will be Morning Star; Evening Star until Oct. 2nd, then Morning Star the rest of the year. Mercury will be visible in the West soon after sunset, about Jan. 22nd, March 16th, and Sept. 12th; also in the morning, in the East just before sunrise, about March 11th, July 9th, and Oct. 29th. Venus will be brightest on the 22nd of August, being then an Evening Star, and again while Morning Star, on the 5th of November.

JANUARY.—*Dinglers' Journal* (German) states as a new discovery, that a few pails of water set among indoor plants will protect them from frost in quite severe weather. It is not a new discovery, but has long been practised. Water, when passing from the liquid to the solid or frozen state, gives out a large amount of heat that was previously latent. A considerable body of water would keep a room sufficiently warm to prevent the destruction of many plants which are known to be tender. But if when the cold is intense, there be only a small quantity of water, the juices in the fibres of the plant will congeal, and induce decay.

FEBRUARY.—There is quite a business done in many parts of our country, in the collecting of ice for summer use. Almost any farmer may have this luxury if he chooses to go to the trouble and expense, which after all is not much. Perhaps some might be disposed to try the following method of collecting ice, said to have been practised by a gentleman in Connecticut. He has a pipe leading from a spring which passes through his ice house. This is pierced by numerous small holes; and when the weather is very cold, the house is thrown open and the water turned on. The fine spray and jets freeze as they fall, and in a few days or weeks at furthest the house is filled with ice, with no labor of cutting and hauling.

MARCH.—Concerning sheep, the *Manual of Agriculture* says, "In the vicinity of large markets and where pasturage is expensive, it will be found most profitable to raise sheep for the market only, making wool a secondary object. But in remote and mountainous regions where land is cheap and not suited to cultivation, they may be profitably kept for the wool. Many, however, think that even for wool, the larger breeds may be equally profitable, on account of the greater weight of their long and coarse wool, which is well suited for many kinds of fabrics, and commands a good price in the market. Of the care required for sheep we shall speak in September.

APRIL.—A correspondent of *Field Notes* gives the following: "Maple molasses well made and put up in cans right from the kettle, and hermetically sealed, as you would can and seal fruits, will keep as fresh as when first boiled from the sap. This is decidedly the best plan for keeping; as when made in cakes, if exposed to the air, it will lose somewhat of the peculiarly delightful flavor for which it is prized. All this is obviated by canning when hot. There need be only a trifling expense about this. The cans that have been emptied through the winter, can be used thus until autumn fruits demand them again.

There should be in Canada a little more care taken in the making of cheese. There is a good deal of indifferent quality, and yet we have the means of producing the best cheese in the world. Let us do it.

Where this cannot be done, farmers should make such changes among themselves, having respect to the different kinds of soil. We repeat the advice of a contemporary to plant as largely as possible, and to direct greatly increased attention to the general subject of farming on improved principles. Think well, and act rightly.

AUGUST.—Farmers may have good grapes for their own use. To plant grape cuttings is a very simple operation. Those who have not much time to spare, should use cuttings with two buds, leaving half an inch of wood at each end. Throw out the dirt to the full depth of the cutting; plant so that the upper end of the cutting is visible; fill the dirt in with a garden trowel, or small hand fork, and press down firmly with the foot. The ground should be kept moist, and in hot weather well mulched with grass. Most varieties of grape are easily grown in this way. This delicious fruit is worth some pains.

SEPTEMBER.—Proper shelter and suitable food make a vast difference in the cost of keeping sheep. The experiment has been tried as between those fed in comfortable sheds, and those fed in the open field. Those in the field will consume all you give them, and their increase in weight will not be as you would desire, but those under shelter will eat a great deal less in the same time of three months, and gain in weight fully one third more. Ten fine woolled or Merino sheep, will eat about as much as a medium sized cow. Dogs and foxes may be kept from your flocks by attaching bells to several of the sheep. This also helps to give warning.

OCTOBER.—Turnips, beets, parsnips and carrots, may be kept fresh and good well into the next summer. Select in the Fall at the time of digging, those that are nice and smooth, and of suitable size; medium size is best, and pack them in barrels. Then put in dry sand, sufficient to fill the barrels, and cover the roots entirely over. As you put in the sand, shake the barrel somewhat, so as to cause the sand to fill up the interstices, and exclude the air. Parsnips are better left in the ground through the winter; but it is well to dig a few, and keep them as above for winter use. Potatoes would probably rot if kept in this way; they seem to require air, but not light.

To inclose a letter or any writing, or to make any written mark to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded with the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers) shall be a misdemeanor.

COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.—The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Upper Canada. *Chief Justice*—Hon. Archibald McLean. *Puisné Judges*—Hons. John Hawkins Hagarty, and Robert Esten Burns.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—This Court has the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators, co-partnerships, accounts, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery and to prevent multiplicity of suits, staying proceedings at law prosecuted against equity and good conscience, and may decree the issue, repeal or avoidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law. *Chancellor*—Hon. P. M. Vankoughnet. *Vice-Chancellors*—Hon. James Christie Palmer Esten and John Godfrey Spragge. *Master*—Andrew Norton Buell.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.—This Court has the same powers and jurisdiction as a Court of Record, as the Court of Queen's Bench. *Chief Justice*—Hon. W. H. Draper, C.B. *Puisné Judges*—Hons. William Buell Richards and Joseph C. Morrison.

HEIR AND DEVISEE COURT.—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other person as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine claims to lands, in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favor of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assignees. *Sittings at Toronto*, first Monday in January and July in each year. *Clerk of Commissions*—W. B. Heward.

COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each County. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50 ; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100. An appeal lies to either

of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

SURROGATE COURTS.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts.

RECORDERS' COURT.—In the Cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Kingston and Ottawa, the Recorders' Court takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices for Counties having no jurisdiction in the Cities—the care of which is confided to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen and Police Magistrate of each. Sessions held 2nd Monday in January, 1st Monday in April and July, and 3rd Monday in November. *Recorders.*—George Duggan, Toronto; Archd. J. McDonell, Kingston; John E. Start, Hamilton; William Horton, London; J. B. Lewis, Ottawa.

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURT.—The County Judge in each County presides.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contracts amounting to £25; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.

TERMS OF THE COURTS.

APPEAL TERMS commence on the second Thursday next after Hilary, Easter and Michaelmas Terms.

LAW TERMS.—Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Easter begins 3rd Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Trinity begins Monday next after 21st August, and ends on Saturday of the ensuing week; Michaelmas begins 3rd Monday in November, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week. Long vacation from 1st July to 21st August.

COUNTY COURT TERMS commence on the first Monday in January, April, July, and October, and end the following Saturday.

CIRCUITS OF THE COURTS.
