H. M., the King was born June 3, 1865, so that he has now attained the age of 49 years and the loyal prayer of his subjects is that he may be preserved in health, "long to reign over us."

His Royal Consort, Queen Mary, was, a few days ago, the subject of many congratulations, for her birthday falls on May 26. The Queen was born in 1867, so that she is two years young-

er than the King. Queen-Mother Alexandra, probably the most popular of all the Queen-Consorts of Great Britain, has passed the allotted span of "three score years and ten," but is remarkably well-preserved, in spite of her great age. She is still active in most public functions and is everywhere acclaimed with an enthusiasm that proves she has not lost her hold on the hearts of the people of Great Britain.

FORCED RESIGN

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EARLY CLOSING.

T the present time there is a fleet of something like 200 fishing schooners in port, outfitting for ling St. John's. the coming season's fishery. The Spring has been backward some 20 days behind that of ordinary years and this season's outfitting will not be over for another 10 days.

In view of this fact the importers should have re-adjusted the early closing and holiday period. The shops closed last night to the disgust of some 2000 fishermen in port, who are anxious to do their business as quickly as possible and get away to their Summer's work. Fishermen are workers and have no use for sports.

Some hundreds of protests have been made to us concerning this early closing and against making Empire Day and the King's Birthday holidays.

The result of such blundering and interference with the Spring's outfitting for the fishery will be the withdrawal of trade to the outports, where such nonsense will not prevail.

Last year similar protests were made by the fishermen against making Empire Day a holiday, and not one of the 150 schooners in port hoisted a flag in honor of the day. The ones to blame are the Importers, many of whom have now degenerated into a clique of sports rather than bein chips of the old block that they sprung from, who were genuine business

men and workers withal. The Legislature will have to step in and protect what the Importers of St. John's are too indifferent and careless about, viz.: the business interests of the Colony in the Spring time. Those holidays in the outfitting season are a public outrage.

Countrys must exist and progress by industry and not sport and pleasure—and if such propensities are allowed to prevail, then some big business firms will spring up in some of




