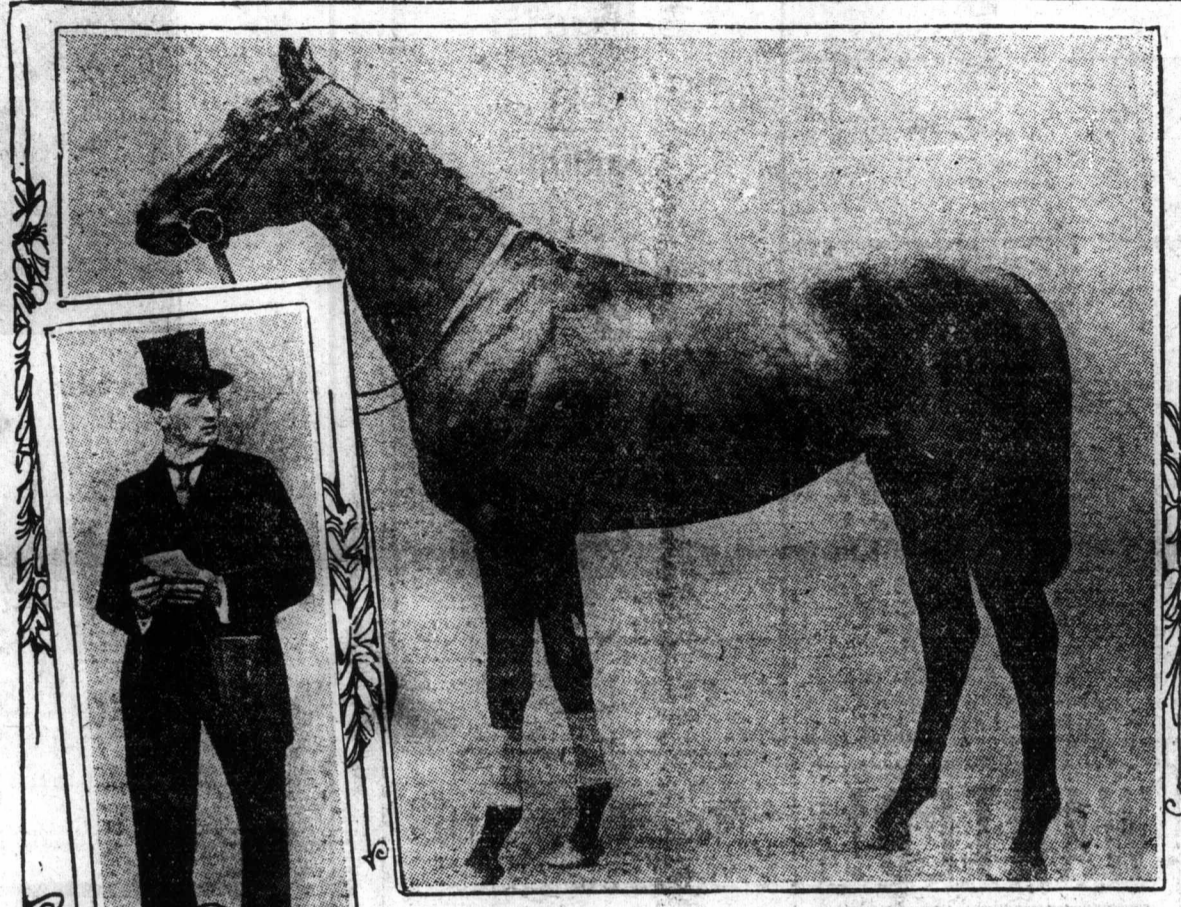

FIRE DEATH TOLL IS OVER FIFTY HORRIBLE AFFAIR IN BINGHAMPTON

Fire in an Overall Factory Snuffed Out the Lives of Over Fifty Young Girls—Heart Rending Scenes Enacted as Girls Topped Over Into Furnace of Flames or Jumped to the Street—Thousands Witness Sad Affair.

[Canadian Press Despatch] BINGHAMPTON, N. Y., July 23.—At daybreak today a big force of city employees began to search for the dead entombed beneath the smouldering ruins of the overall factory of the Binghamton Clothing Co., at Nos. 17-18 Wall street. Not until the tangled mass of brick and steel has been removed, will the full extent of yesterday's holocaust be known.

A conservative estimate places the number of dead at more than fifty. About 125 employees, mostly women and girls, were trapped in the burning walls. Of these forty are known to have escaped. Sixteen charred bodies as yet unidentified were recovered last night.

The list of the 134 employees of the company who were on the pay rolls Saturday, some of whom were on vacation in the safe under the building, is the task of compiling a list of the dead a difficult one.

The loss by fire and water to the building and stock of five concerns is estimated at more than \$200,000, largely covered by insurance. The post office, built about twenty years ago, was badly damaged, but the mails were saved. A temporary office has been established in a near-by garage. The loss of the Binghamton Clothing Co., of which Reed B. Freeman is president, is estimated at about \$40,000. This does not include the building valued at \$50,000, which was owned by Z. Bennett Phelps, and which was insured for \$18,000. The clothing company's loss is covered by insurance. Other losses were sustained by Simon O'Neil, the McKallor Drug Co., and the Link Piano Co., occupants of adjacent buildings.

Officials could not carry out instructions from this person and there had to be some order of business. AN INGERSOL CITIZEN HAS DISAPPEARED FROM TOWN

He Was a Constable and a Theft Charge Has Been Laid Against Him.

[Canadian Press Despatch] INGERSOLL, July 23.—Legal machinery was yesterday set in motion to trace Constable A. L. Wright, missing since Saturday afternoon. The sensation which his disappearance created was intensified by the announcement that a warrant charging him with theft had been issued. The warrant charges him with the theft of the two revolvers belonging to Chief of Police Fish. Since the return of Chief Fish, who was holidaying when Wright disappeared, a systematic investigation has been in progress. Wright is believed to have taken with him three revolvers, one of which was a Savage automatic. It is also understood that the constable had in his possession money belonging to the corporation, but the amount is not thought to be larger than the balance of the salary due him.

TWO WIVES ARE CLAIMING HUSBAND

Unique Bigamy Case is Ventilated in Montreal Court.

[Canadian Press Despatch] MONTREAL, July 23.—"I married him in New York in 1899 and intend to take him back-home to California with me." "I married him in Napanee, Ontario, in 1904, and have lived with him ever since." Such are the claims of Pasquale Ferratta's two wives, one of whom arrived yesterday from California and the other who has lived in Montreal for some time. Ferratta is behind the bars of the jail charged with the murder of an Italian named Patillo, who was killed in Fresno, Cal., in 1904. That the case will be fought out in the courts of Ontario was made evident this morning, when the two women, each accompanied by a brother, sought the advice of Judge Basin. He told them that the courts of Quebec could have nothing to do with the case. Giovanni Pasquale came here from Napanee to-day to be at his sister's side during her troubles. This morning he sought a warrant for bigamy against the man now charged with murder, but could not get it. "The California wife has in her possession a license which she claims demonstrates that Ferratta married her. The Napanee wife also has a wedding certificate and three children.

WILL REMOVE ALL THE SURPLUS EARTH

Hydro Electric Department Will Start to Clean Things Up.

In view of a number of complaints which have been made recently regarding earth left on streets after Hydro-Electric poles are erected, the Hydro-Electric department are sending out teams to gather up all surplus earth. This will be done on every street after the poles are erected. It will take a few days to remove all the material, but the streets may rest assured that it will be cleaned up as quickly as possible. The attention of the Hydro-Electric department has also been called to the fact that the wooden covers which are placed over holes at night are occasionally being moved by some malicious persons. This is a dangerous matter if it will be necessary to place the matter in the hands of the police.

PARIS, July 23.—The necklace of imitation pearls, which a student brought to the police station at Neuilly Sunday evening, and which the police at the time thought possibly might be the \$650,000 necklace which disappeared from the registered mail was claimed to-day by a manufacturer of imitation jewelry. Fire Death Toll.

(Continued from Page 1) BINGHAMPTON, N.Y., July 23.—A few minutes before 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the clang of the automatic fire alarm stopped the busy fingers of 125 young girls at work in the machines of the Binghampton Clothing Company. They were not startled or alarmed.

The girls, most of them, settled back to work. Two minutes later they were dying miserably in flame and smoke, or crushing each other in hopeless attempts to escape down a single stairway and the two narrow fire ladders. In 18 minutes the fourth storey factory of "approved factory construction" was a mass of ashes and embers—walls, roof and supports fallen in.

At least fifty of the girls are dead, their bodies consumed or charred in the smoking debris of the factory. At least fifty more are injured, many fatally. Of the 125 girls on the payroll, only 17 have been accounted for as uninjured. Twenty-two are in the hospitals, 10 are being cared for in private homes. Possibly twenty of twenty-five who survived the dreadful rush of flame and smoke, or who fought their way to the streets over the bodies of their workmates, fled away to their homes before firemen or policeman could learn their identity.

The Pirates Went Down to Defeat in Both Ends of a Double-Header.

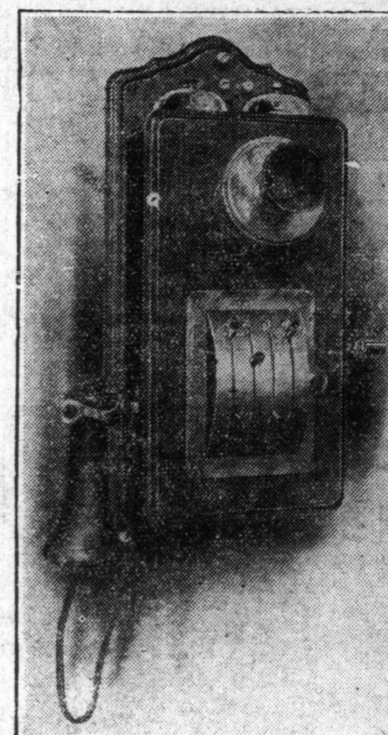
