Canning Items.

The Methodist church here was burned to the ground on Monday afternoon. It is supposed to have been burning since the night before, but when discovered about five o'clock by a person driving past, the flames were bursting from the windows and in half an hour in spite of the heroic efforts of the firemen, was totally destroyed with all its contents. These included a small pipe organ, a reed organ and a new library of four hundred books. It seems almost incredible that a building so exposed to view and passed by so many school children and others, should have burned so long in broad daylight without discovery, but it was due to the fact that the burning was all inside and the window blinds were drawn. The barn of Messrs. A. D. Payzant and I. B. Solomons caught from the dying flames, but were extinguished by the firemen before much damage was done. On two or three previous occasions fire has broken out in the church, but each time was promptly extinguished by the alert firemen. The loss is partially covered by an insurance of two thousand dollars.

Post Observations.

Congratulations, Mayor Harvey! You look good and your name looks well in print. Wolfville has always been fortunate in the selection of her Mayors, and never more so than just now. The anticipated slump in real-estate was only a nightmare.

Wolfville never had quite as able, and safe, a civic government as she has to-day. Everyone seems content that the proper thing will be done, and at the proper time. The senseless, vicious and insane policy of continuous litigation is, no doubt, a thing of the past.

We are informed that three stands against the town to-day, because of two foolish arbitrations, not less than \$2,000, not one dollar of which has been paid by the tax-payer, and for which he is liable, and for which he will be assessed the present year—in the immediate future \$2,000—placed upon our roads, or invested in a recreation or play-ground for the children, would be a luxury. About two years more of the influence that has been cut out for good would have left us in a sorry mess. No wonder Wolfville gives a sigh of relief.

A more dignified, up-beated, reliable group of gentlemen were named elected in any town in Nova Scotia or in Canada than those elected in Wolfville on Feb. 2nd. They did not seek the office, the office sought them. Very often it comes about that some of our best citizens are nominated for civic honors and defeated. They are too often, perhaps, judged by the company they keep. It has generally been considered, I think, the privilege of gentlemen to conduct, at least a civic contest, with sportsmanlike dignity and bearing. Not to be open and above-board, to stoop to reprisals, or to 'hobble' any adherent of opponents, or to seek unfair tactics—would be ungentlemanly. A fair fight, with no impediments, and a sporty demeanor no matter what the results, is the part of gentlemen.

The bluff tactics don't go with Anglo-Saxon blood. There is no one in this little town, neither is there any combination of men hereabout, that has the ability, speed or influence necessary, no matter how underhanded they scheme and plot, to 'stall off' any other man from doing just what he makes up his mind to do.

Anyone who attempts in an underhand way to injure another in a sneak and a coward. They forget how thin is the glass house wherein they have lived for years. The futility and impotency of these same squelchers is only exceeded by their ambitions and spite; and the good, sound lying they have just received at the hands of Wolfville voters, and Mayor Harvey, chief magistrate of the city, is gall enough for a life-time.

When ex-Mayor Black received this notice and somewhat unfortunate address on leaving the position he has so wisely and honorably filled it is a pity that he could not conscientiously say to all the signatures, 'You're another.'

Rink Notes.

The fourth game of the Nova Scotia Western Hockey League was played in Evangeline rink last Friday evening, between Wolfville and Windsor (Swastika), resulting in a score of 2-2. On account of the special train from Windsor being delayed the game was late in starting. However, at about 9 o'clock the referee, J. Bates, lined the teams up as follows: Windsor, W. Each team scored twice more during the game, which was fast throughout and quite rough. Both teams played good combination but the visitors were fairly out played. How to Get Winter Eggs.
Give the hens a warm house, give them exercise, do not feed too much grain. Give them a head of cabbage or a beet hung by a cord so that they can peck at it. Scatter the grain among leaves of fine straw so that they will have to scratch to find it.

Keep the house well lighted and admit the sunshine. Keep the poultry house clean and free from vermin. Whitewash the interior at least twice a year.

Divide the fowls so that there will not be more than 12 or 15 in one compartment. Poultry never succeeds so well where there are large numbers herded together, mainly for the reason that the stronger birds get too much food and the weaker birds get too little. See that there is some ventilation, but not too much.

There are many farmers who are wondering why they do not get winter eggs and yet these men permit the birds to wander about the stables and haymows, roosting wherever they can find a perch, with chilly drafts or cold winds blowing continually. The question of feeding poultry receives but little attention at the hands of many farmers who seem to expect that the hens shall pick up a living without much attention.

Against the Beverage Use of Alcohol.
One of the most distinguished educationalists in the United States, President Chas. W. Eliot, of Harvard University, has recently made a clear-cut, unequivocal statement of his conversion to the principle of total abstinence for the individual and no license for the community. The occasion was an address delivered by him before the Massachusetts No License League. Regarding personal habits, he said—
'I have been all my life what is sometimes called a moderate drinker. That is to say, I have used beer and wine on occasion, not habitually, and while I have never experienced any ill effects in my own person from either beer or wine, it seems to me that the recent researches in physiology and medicine tend very strongly to show that the moderate drinking of alcohol is inexpedient. I say that the recent progress of medical science, largely accomplished through animal experimentation, has satisfied me that even the moderate use of alcohol is objectional—that the habitual use of alcohol in any form is lowering to the intellectual and nervous power.'

President Eliot then went on to discuss the question of no-license, which was the particular matter with which the League deals. He said—
'Is it not a great interference with liberty, with the liberty that God gives man, to undertake to prevent people who want alcoholic drink from getting it? What is the justification of that interference with liberty? I found that justification in the experience of Cambridge under a no-license system. It seemed to me that it is a collective good, by excluding non-users of Cambridge, justified the abridgment of this individual liberty, particularly when that liberty was an illiberty to use something that was unwholesome.'

Economic Waste of the Saloon.
The Boston City (N.Y.) Times writes editorially as follows:
'The spread of the prohibition movement affects more than the political and social side of our life; it touches the economic conditions even more closely. The greatest waste of the American people is their neglect of their natural sources of wealth. But the greatest extravagance regarding the wealth already in possession is the support given to saloons. Through the South and West the restriction, and to wide areas, the absolute

Against the Beverage Use of Alcohol.
One of the most distinguished educationalists in the United States, President Chas. W. Eliot, of Harvard University, has recently made a clear-cut, unequivocal statement of his conversion to the principle of total abstinence for the individual and no license for the community. The occasion was an address delivered by him before the Massachusetts No License League. Regarding personal habits, he said—
'I have been all my life what is sometimes called a moderate drinker. That is to say, I have used beer and wine on occasion, not habitually, and while I have never experienced any ill effects in my own person from either beer or wine, it seems to me that the recent researches in physiology and medicine tend very strongly to show that the moderate drinking of alcohol is inexpedient. I say that the recent progress of medical science, largely accomplished through animal experimentation, has satisfied me that even the moderate use of alcohol is objectional—that the habitual use of alcohol in any form is lowering to the intellectual and nervous power.'

President Eliot then went on to discuss the question of no-license, which was the particular matter with which the League deals. He said—
'Is it not a great interference with liberty, with the liberty that God gives man, to undertake to prevent people who want alcoholic drink from getting it? What is the justification of that interference with liberty? I found that justification in the experience of Cambridge under a no-license system. It seemed to me that it is a collective good, by excluding non-users of Cambridge, justified the abridgment of this individual liberty, particularly when that liberty was an illiberty to use something that was unwholesome.'

Economic Waste of the Saloon.
The Boston City (N.Y.) Times writes editorially as follows:
'The spread of the prohibition movement affects more than the political and social side of our life; it touches the economic conditions even more closely. The greatest waste of the American people is their neglect of their natural sources of wealth.
