#### Railway News

Philadelphia.—The Canadian Pacific Railway has opened its new offices here in the Cross Building at the corner of Locust and 15th Streets. Growth of the campany's business and the gradual movement of the city's most important business institutions in this direction were responsible for this move into larger quarters in the heart of the hotel, theatre and business district. The offices which have been handcomely fitted, accommodate both freight and passenger officials on Canadian Pacific rail and ocean lines, as well as representatives of the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault and the Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic Railways.

London. Ont.—This year the Canadian Pacific Railway has arranged to hold weekly first aid classes at London throughout the entire year and the instruction will be furnished by the employees themselves, many who have become very proficient in first aid work.

By this means those employees who have had previous instruction can drop into the classes from time to time and refresh themselves on to time and refresh themselves on the instruction, while the new em-ployees, especially those in train and engine service, whose duties may require them to be absent from the classes one week, will have the epportunity of taking the instruc-tion later on as the classes will con-tinue throughout the year. Medicine Hat, Alberta—An expenditure of about \$60,000 is represented by the extension to the Canadian Pacific Railway round-house and the construction of the Company's mechanical coaling plant, and that sum is about equally divided between these two improvements. In both instances the work has given much employment to local men and there is still a considerable amount of inside work to be done in connection with the extension to the roundhouse.

St. Thomas, Ontario—Work has been commenced on the construction of an extension to the present C.P.R. yards east of the city, in the form of an 800-foot repair track at an expenditure of approximately \$5,000. The grading work which is being done by Irwin and Son of this city, was started recently. The extension is necessary to cope with the increased business and also to facilitate the repairing of cars. - It is

"Letters forwarded by mail, also ost cards, acknowledging the pay ment of money, are regarded as letters and cards and are not subject to this tax.

"All insurance policies, wheth fire, marine, life or casualty, wherein the payment of money is acknowledg ed are taxable. "All insurance receipts acknow

ledging the payment of money, are taxable "Receipts drawn out of Canada, but

ot valid until countersigned in Car ada, are taxable. "Voucher checks and checks with

eccipts endorsed theron when drawn upon or addressed to a bank, are no taxable, as receipts. "Remitters counterfoil, being part

of a taxable express money order, is not taxable as a receipt."

Persons violating or evading the regulations are liable to a penalty not exceeding \$100.






