There have been thirteen Popes the name of Innocent. St. mocent, the first Pepe to asume the name, reigned in the ifth century, and it was during nis pontificate that Rome was destroyed by Alaric the Goth-Innocent V. was a native of Burgundy, where he was born in 1225. In early life he joined the Dominican Order, and became ioted for his eloquence in the oulpit and for his personal sanccity and zeal.

His name was Pierre de Tarenaise. He succeeded St. Thomas Aquinas as teacher of theology the University of Paris, and as made Archbishop of Lyons 1272, and then Cardinal Bishop of Ostia. His pontificate vas very brief, lasting only six nonths. The most noteworthy eature of his pontificate was the practical steps he was taking to ring about a reconciliation with he Eastern Church. He was proeeding to send delegates to the Freek Emperor in connection with the decisions of the Council of Lyons, which had just been neld, when he was taken ill and

If cities, towns, villages and other municipal bodies do not change their local time to correspond with the new Railway time, all concerned should keep in mind that while trains continue to leave Railway Stations on present schedule, such schedule will be operated one hour ahead of CHARLOTTETOWN - P.E.I. present local time. Therefore any municipality where local time is not changed to correspond with the new Rali Job Printing Done At way time, passengers must reach Railway Station ONE HOUR EARLIER than shown in current folders and public time posters,
