

## SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by  
Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the at-  
tacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet  
in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the  
balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the  
centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, imme-  
diately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf  
(which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first)  
for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we  
found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance  
in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had pen-  
etrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly  
begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we  
handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends,  
leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same  
place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and  
Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but  
the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by  
those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other  
wood work.

## Famous Bandit Leaves Fortune to Son of Victim.

New York, April 15.—Mr. John Frillman of Oil City, Pa., who was in New York yesterday, had an unusual tale to tell of a legacy. He said he was en route to Danvers, Mass., to deliver a sum of money to a man there whose name he preferred to keep a secret. This money, he said, was left by Jesse James, the outlaw, "Years ago," said Frillman, "Orrah Smith, of Allegheny, Pa., lived at a hotel in Omaha, which was frequented by Jesse James and his friends. He and James became close friends. One day James gave Smith a 45-calibre revolver. He said there was a note in the hollow place in the handle, but that Smith must not open the gun's stock until April 9, 1911. He gave Smith to understand that (James) wanted to provide for a boy, and told him he had deposited some money in a bank in Kansas to remain there until the boy grew up. He feared he would not live to see the boy attain manhood, so he entrusted Smith with the instructions.

Had Grown to Manhood. "Last Sunday, being April 9, 1911, Smith opened the gun and found the instructions. He followed them and located the boy, now a grown man, in Danvers, Mass. He deputized me to go to Danvers and tell the boy of his good fortune, and I'm on my way now. I believe the boy was the son of a man James had killed. "The Danvers man," concluded Frillman, "is married and has three children. The money, including principal and interest, now amounts to \$15,000. I don't know why James was so interested in the boy, unless it was sentiments connected with the death of the lad's father."

## Boy as Target For His Revolver.

Raoul Cercia, appeared this morning before Recorder Weir, charged with having shot Terence McEwen a little urchin, eight years of age, and who looks little more than six. The shooting was done with a 22 calibre revolver, and the bullet struck the boy in the hand inflicting a rather serious wound. This occurred in the vicinity of Schmeer Park, and the firing is supposed to have been done from the window of the accused man's room. Another boy was said to have also been hurt, by a bullet in the shoulder and he was expected to put in an appearance against Cercia this morning, but failed to turn up. Cercia was placed under arrest last night by Constable Smith, after a warrant had been sworn out against him by McEwan's father. When the accused was offered the option of being tried in the Recorder's Court or before the Court of Sessions, he elected for a trial by the Recorder, and the case was continued until next Thursday. During the past few days, boys playing in that neighbourhood were startled to hear the whistling of bullets over their heads and the sharp report of a light calibre gun. No harm was done at the time and no clue could be found as to where the shots were coming from.

## Slays Husband With an Axe.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., April 17.—Peter Napolitina, an Italian living near James Street, Little Italy, known here as Peter Naplesik, was killed last evening by his wife Margery. The woman admits the murder and is in jail. Napolitina was employed on the night-shift at the Steel plant. He was asleep in bed when his wife attacked him with an axe. The blow struck him on the forehead and nearly severed his head. Four blows followed, the last one all but severing the head from the body. The woman then went out on the street and told passers-by what she had done. The murder is the echo of the case last fall, when Napolitina returned home unexpectedly and stabbed his wife several times. She was for some months in the hospital. She evidently awaited the opportunity to get even.

We have been furnished with a circular entitled, Memo re the Proposal to form a Newfoundland Cricket Association. It is proposed to purchase from the St. George's Stock Co. the balance of their lease in St. George's Field, which runs till 1918, to register as a Limited Company, to improve the grounds, build a small pavilion, and buy cricket gear, practice nets, etc. The estimate of the cost is \$4,000.

The promoters believe that the running expenses can be met by current revenue, but it is proposed not to pay interest on capital or refund capital to subscribers, but to invite the latter to raise the money with the object of fostering cricket, and they do not ask anyone to subscribe with any other object in view.

The Football Association would become their sub-tenants, but they do not propose to use the grounds on Wednesdays or Saturdays, and on other week days only after 6 p.m.

We direct the attention of cricket-lovers to this proposal, which the promoters believe after a careful consideration of this and other schemes, is the most feasible one.

We should like to see this effort to revive the game meet with success, and with this desire, we commend it to the consideration of our readers.





 WASHINGTON, April 24.  
 The Reciprocity Bill was conveyed from the House of Representatives to the Senate to-day, and referred to the Committee of Finance. It cannot be taken up until the organization of that committee is completed.

 PARIS, April 24.  
 The French Government is preparing for every eventuality in Morocco. The War Office has advised that the first French flying column be organized at Bouznika, near Casablanca on the West Coast, for the relief of Fez. Already it has left for that capital.

Special Evening Telegram.  
 LONDON, April 24.  
 An anti-Home Rule amendment to the Veto Bill, proposing to exclude from the operation of the measure "any bill to establish a separate Parliament and Executive for Ireland," was moved to-day by J. B. Lonsdale, Unionist member for Mid Armagh. The House was crowded. In introducing the amendment to the Bill, which was intended to restrict the powers of the Lords over Legislation originating in the first Chamber, Mr. Lonsdale said that he desired to see the question of Home Rule removed from the controversy over the reform of the Lords. The Government was at the mercy of the Nationalists, whose object was to smash the constitution in order to dismember the Empire by driving Ireland into national independence. Ramsay MacDonald, the Socialist-Labour leader, supported the Nationalists, and contended that the Labourites were wholly in favour of the demands made for Ireland. He believed that the projected "Treaty of Peace with America had been made possible by the promise of Home Rule for Ireland." Premier Asquith gave the House to understand clearly that the Cabinet was unwaveringly of the opinion that the electors had returned them to power with full knowledge that they would give Ireland a measure of Home Rule. The opposition campaign of "Dollar Dictators" further emphasized the fact that Home Rule was an issue of the Election. He repudiated the suggestion that there was a trickery or deceit on the part of the Government, and left no doubt as to his intention to abide by his pledge, and introduce some sort of Home Rule. Mr. Balfour spoke in favour of Mr. Lonsdale's amendment. The Government, he said, had hidden Home Rule in the background during the elections. Now having attained power, they were going to force Home Rule down the throats of the people, who, he believed, if the issue were placed before them, would reject it, as they did in 1885 and 1893.

**Narrow Escape.**

Two boats that were seal hunting on Monday last had a narrow escape from perishing. In one was Mr. Rodgers and companion, and in the other Mr. Parsons (all of the Arm). They had rowed some thirteen miles off to the edge of the ice when the wind began to blow heavily from about North. Parsons' boat held to the edge of the ice till they reached Baccalen, when they were able to reach shelter. Rodgers' boat on the other hand attempted to reach the Arm direct. So heavy was the lopp that they were compelled to row their boats stern foremost, keeping her bow to the wind the whole 12 miles, and many times were in danger of being swamped as they had two seals in the boat.—Sun.

**Boy Miraculously Escaped Death.**

Victor Myatt, aged ten years, narrowly escaped being crushed to death shortly before six o'clock yesterday afternoon. The little fellow was playing around the Grafton Street Methodist Church and was amusing himself by swinging on one of the large iron gates in front of the Church when one of the immense pillars broke away from its foundation and fell into the street. The boy fell with the gate and pillar and it was at first thought that he had been killed. The boy fortunately was not struck by the post, but the gate fell on top of him. He was picked up and removed to the Victoria General Hospital, where it was found that he was suffering with a severe compound fracture of the leg, but otherwise was all right. Dr. Chisholm, assisted by Dr. Macdonnell of the Hospital staff, operated on the boy and plated the injured leg. How he escaped being instantly killed was a miracle, as the pillar and the section of the gate that fell weigh in the vicinity of half a ton.—Halifax Chronicle.

He was in the act of taking some boiling pitch to a boat he was repairing, and while doing so he accidentally slipped on the longers of the flake, and in falling part of the contents of the pot met him full in the face, causing ugly burns which will confine him to his home for several days. It was feared he would lose the sight of one eye, at first but can now see all right. One side of his face is covered with bladders, and how he escaped more serious burns in a miracle.—Sun.

Mr. H. V. Tuff, the popular hairdresser, who is leaving for Alberta in a few days, will give a farewell concert in the Methodist College Hall Wednesday night. 

## Newfoundland - Bought Fish Dutiable.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. The fishing interests of New England are vitally affected by the ruling of the Treasury Department, which has been sustained by the Customs Court in the case of the schooner Sarah G. Wharf. The Hague Tribunal gave the American fishermen the right to operate in treaty waters with foreign labor, but some fishermen contend that fish caught by natives of Newfoundland, for instance, could be brought by Americans into the ports of the States, duty free. In sustaining the Treasury Department's ruling, the Court defines the American fishery, holding that fish caught in Treaty water by any other than American owned or mastered outfit, must pay duty as imports.

## Debate on the Powers of the Lords

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The House of Commons sat late on the discussion of the second clause of the Parliament Bill, which relates to the curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords, and rejected numerous amendments seeking to exclude all sorts of measures from the operation of the bill. The anti-Home-Rule amendment, proposing to exclude any Bill to establish a separate Parliament and Executive for Ireland, moved by Mr. Londsdale of Mid. Armagh, was defeated by a vote of 281 to 120. Premier Asquith and Home Secretary Churchill, during the course of the debate, reiterated the intention of the Government to proceed with the bill for the reform of the House of Lords during the lifetime of the present Parliament. Mr. Churchill explained the fact that the Parliament Bill, although it would secure the predominance of the House of Commons, would leave the House of Lords with the power of vexatious interference with liberal measures, as in itself a sufficient security that the Government would seek to reform the Upper Chamber. Mr. Butcher, Unionist, York, moved an amendment, exempting from the operation of clause two, any bill affecting the continued existence of Presbyteries of the Crown. In opposing the amendment, Sir Rufus Isaacs, the Attorney General said the security of the Crown rested in the loyalty of the people. It would be an evil day for the Crown when it depended for its existence upon the veto of the Lords. The amendment was defeated by 273 to 169.

## Lancashire Apathetic.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The annual report of the British Cotton Growing Association just issued, sets forth a complaint that the work of the Association has been handicapped by the apathy and indifference displayed by Lancashire. The Government promised a subsidy for fifty years on the condition that the additional capital of \$750,000 be raised in Lancashire, but the report says this capital has not been subscribed.

## 22 Miners Entombed.

Special to Evening Telegram. ELK GARDEN, West Va., To-Day. Twenty-two miners are entombed in a mine of the Davis Coal Co. here, as a result of an explosion. There is little chance of rescue. All are Americans except one.



## The Coronation Fleet.

### 382 Ships in Royal Naval Review—Ten Dreadnoughts.

Three hundred and eighty-two ships of the British Navy will take part in the naval review by the King at Spithead on Saturday, June 24. The Queen will be present, as well as a large number of distinguished personages from foreign countries. The total of 382 ships includes battleships, cruisers, scouts, destroyers, torpedo boats, and submarines, but excludes the Mediterranean Fleet, the Fourth Division of the Home Fleet, the Sixth Destroyer Flotilla, and various squadrons in foreign waters.

Included in the great sea pageant will be thirty-six battleships of the Home Fleet, telegraphs or Portsmouth correspondent, and if the Hercules and the Orion participate, there will be ten Dreadnoughts at Spithead. Thirty-two armoured cruisers—four of them of the Invincible type—of the First, Second, Fourth and Fifth Cruiser Squadrons and the Home Fleet, twenty-one second class cruisers, seven third-class cruisers, eight scouts, and 150 destroyers of the various flotillas will also ride at anchor. Sixty submarines, some torpedo gunboats, and the royal and Admiralty yachts complete the total.

In addition to the British vessels, squadrons from Germany, Russia, France, the United States and Japan will be present. At the Diamond Jubilee review there were no submarines present, and only 165 ships in all.

There will be notable functions at Admiralty House, Portsmouth, where Miss Eva Moore, sister of the unmarried Commander-in-Chief, Sir Arthur Moore, will act as hostess. On June 26 and 27 the civic authorities will entertain the naval officers and men, both British and foreign, and a ball will be held in the town hall. The fleet will disperse on June 28.

### The Over-Sea Troops.

The entertainment of the over-sea troops who will be in London for the Coronation will commence on June 8, when a detachment of about 300 will go from South Kensington Station (Metropolitan Railway) to Southend, where they will be entertained by the Essex Agricultural Society, who are organising special sports on that day. On June 10 another detachment of the troops is expected to have a steamer trip on the river and attend a banquet at Gravesend, on the invitation of the mayor.

On June 12 it is proposed that the troops should accept the invitation of the Hospitality Committee of the Festival of Empire to an entertainment at the Crystal Palace. On Wednesday, June 14, they are expected to attend Ascot races, and on June 15 and 16 to visit Cambridge, Birmingham and Manchester. During the following week visits will be paid to Windsor Castle, Woolwich and Portsmouth. Those desiring of offering hospitality to the troops should communicate with the secretary of the Colonial Troops Entertainment Committee, 116 Victoria Street, Westminster.

The King has given permission for the school children of Windsor and the district to assemble in the Castle grounds along the roadway between

the Sovereign's entrance, at the top of Long Walk and the York and Lancaster Towers, on Saturday, July 1, when their Majesties arrive at Windsor from London. The children will number over 6,000, and they will sing a Coronation ode or the National Anthem as the King and Queen pass by. Their Majesties will stop near Queen Victoria's statue and receive an address of welcome from the townspeople and residents of the district.

### M. P.'s Coronation Gift.

Mr. T. R. Ferens, M. P. for East Hull, has presented to the town as a Coronation gift a fifteen acre field, on part of which his wife will erect and endow twelve almshouses. Mr. Ferens states that he would like the rest of the land to become a playing field for boys and girls, to be called King V. playing field.

The inhabitants of Kirkby Stephen, Westmorland, decided at a public meeting to have beacon fires on Coronation night on the Penine Mountains, by which the town is surrounded. If the night is clear it is expected that the chain of bonfires will be visible from Scotland.

Cambridge Town Council has resolved to meet the expenses of the local Coronation celebrations by a penny rate voted as the mayor's salary.

The Rev. F. A. Adams, rector of Doddinghurst, Essex, who has invented and patented a hat suspender for use under seats in churches and public buildings, has offered to equip his church with it by way of personal gift to commemorate the Coronation. — Daily Mail, April 7.
