## Produce and Provisions.

**Codfish**—The exports of dried codfish this week were all from St. John's and totalled 15,694 qts, as follows:—

By schooner Lady St. John from the Nfld. Produce Co., 3,290 qts., to Oporto; by schooner Clutha, from Nfld. Produce Co., to Bahia, 4,914 qts.; by schooner Nancy Lee from the Monroe Export Co., to Pernambuco, 2,749 qts.; by S.S. Canadian Sapper to Barbados, and Domenica via Halifax from Nfld. Produce Co., and James Baird, Ltd., 400 qts., and by the S. S. Sable I. from the Monroe Export Co., 400 qts. to Halifax.

**Cod Oil**—Trade has been quiet as a rule, but with supplies unusually small. The demand still continues, but only at a reasonable price. We would recommend any person, who has any oil, to make the best bargain he can and hurry shipments along.

**Beef**—Beef for fishery outfitting this spring is comparatively cheap, and there are no indications of any change in the direction of higher prices, notwithstanding the big drain on live stock to the British markets now going on. The imports to St. John's this week were 175 barrels by the S. S. Bornholm from Halifax, and 200 barrels by the S.S. Sable I., total 375 barrels. The prices in the local market range from \$20.00 to \$26.00, according to grade, viz: Bos. Flank \$26.00; Bos. Packet, \$20.00; Family Special \$20.50, Boneless \$21.00, \$21.75, and \$20.25, according to brand.

**Pork**—The pork market is quite strong this week in Chicago where the quotation for May pork holds around \$21.00. The importations since last issue were 195 barrels by the S. S. Bornholm, making the total 6,402 barrels as compared with 3,055 the same date last year. It will be seen from these figures that the market here is well supplied for spring fishery outfitting. The prices of the different brands sold here are as follows:—Mess and Boston Butt \$30.00; Fat Back and S. Cut Clear \$28.00; Ham Butt and Spare Ribs \$31.00, and Family Mess \$42.00.

**Sugar**—The imports this week were 500 sacks by the S.S. Bornholm. The prospects are for firmer prices, as the overplus of Cuban sugar that had been keeping the market depressed the past three months, has nearly all gone into consumption. The export trade from Cuba the past two months has been the heaviest since the war years. The quotation in New York is 5 1/2 cents per lb. last week, and in Montreal \$6.50 per 100 lbs., but this week the price advanced 50 cents per 100 lbs. The local quotation is still \$10.65 per 100 lbs., but may importations will be higher.

**Molasses**—The latest news from Barbados shows a very strong market for Fancy Molasses. Large sales have been made to Canada and the United States, and no prospect of lower prices, but very probably an advance. The supply of choice Molasses will be very limited, as there is very little demand for Brown sugar from which this molasses is produced. Buyers everywhere call for white sugar, and the improved machinery for this grade leaves nothing but "black strap" or a dark acid substance not fit for human food. This "black strap" or refuse sells for next to nothing in all the West Indian Islands except Barbados, and the reason is that Newfoundlanders insist on asking for the old-fashioned "honest molasses," which is not to be had. Two cargoes have arrived here this week. The "Czarina" and "Ovee the Top." We hear of no lower price than 75 cents for old molasses, and 80 cents for new molasses of the highest grade.

**Potatoes**—New potatoes from Florida and Bermuda are now plentiful in New York and Halifax, and a drop of \$1.00 to \$1.50 per barrel has taken place this week. The St. John's market is now well supplied with imported, Canadian potatoes, 200 barrels by the Sabel I. and 50 by the S.S. Mapledawn, having arrived this week. Home-grown, too, are now beginning to move into town from the adjacent outports, and are being sold at \$3.00 to \$3.20, as against \$3.70 to \$3.90 for imported.

**Hay**—A few more days and the grass will be getting green, and farmers will be able to let their cattle out to graze. The demand for hay, however, will continue unabated among the cabmen and truckmen. There was none imported this week. The S.S. Mapledawn coming direct from Montreal on the 24th inst., will bring some large consignments. The price is still keeping up to \$20 to \$30 in Montreal wholesale for No. 2 Timothy, while No. 3 and mixed clover are quoted at \$26 minimum, on the railway track. The local price is \$35 to \$54 per ton for 1921, and at the rate of three cents a pound for single bales.

**Oats**—The market is quite and sales are steady at last week's prices. The imports this week were nil, but the first boat down the St. Lawrence due next week, will bring some big consignments. The local quotations are still \$3.70 for Mixed and \$3.80 for White wholesale, per 4 bushel sacks, single sacks \$3.90 and \$4.00. The P. E. I. stock will be coming forward in a few days, and the lower freight rates will probably mean a cut in present prices during the next two months.

### Patriotism

Not a single person who had the privilege of listening to the address of Rev. Mr. Forbes at Gover St. Church, when he spoke on the above embracing subject to the joint Societies attending public worship on Sunday last, should permit themselves to forget all or any portion of the definition of the words patriot and patriotism as applied by the preacher. In the ordinary accepted meaning of the words as given in any Standard Dictionary, a patriot is a fellow countryman, so that in an individual sense we are all, or should be, patriots to one another. A second definition of a patriot is "one who loves his fatherland." In that particular sense every man, woman and child of the race of a particular country, born in that country, must be patriots, and should be zealous in defending and supporting the causes and interests of their country. "Patriots have toiled, and in the cause of their country, bled nobly," says the poet, and that may be taken to point out those who placed country before self and gave their lives in great causes.

In conjunction with patriotism we have patriotism, the passion which aims to serve one's country, and to maintain its laws and institutions. And if it is the desire of each one to be patriotic, to inculcate patriotism, the latter must be founded in great principles and supported by great virtues. There can be nothing sordid or common about the virtue or possession of patriotism. Its range is wide enough to take in all the greatest graces of humanity. Your true patriot does not stop to consider whether or not he will derive any personal kudos from any action demanded by his country. No, the virtue of his possession is founded on great principles and supported by great mentality. If all that we aim at should be our country's, then we have had some noble exemplifications of patriotism and self-sacrifice during the years of terrible war. Patriots have lived and moved and had their being on the stage of life ever since the world was created. They have played their parts gallantly and have made history, dying in a blaze of glory in many instances, but in others passing out almost in obscurity, their names scarcely so much as a memory. But they recked not of this. They gave and in their giving made the world a cleaner, saner, safer place for those who came after them. Patriotism then is not merely a shillbibleth; it is something to be lived up to and cultivated, not only for the benefit of country or of mankind, but to the greater glory of God.

### Storm Still Raging.

HUGE DRIFTS ON TOPSAILS - CROSS COUNTRY TRAINS SNOWBOUND.

A snow storm has been raging on the Topsails since early Sunday morning, and up to press hour showed no signs of abatement. For a distance of ten miles drifts are standing to a height of from five to ten feet. All cross country trains are held up as a consequence. The storm broke in the early hours of Sunday, and within a very short while the Topsails portion of the line was covered with snow. It will take at least a day after the storm has gone down to clear the line. The express which left here on Sunday is held at Quarry and can proceed no further. The express which left Port aux Basques yesterday is delayed at the Gaff Topsails. The Kyle is waiting at Port aux Basques for the arrival of Sunday's express. It is probable that to-day's outgoing express will transfer its mails and passengers to Sunday's express at Quarry and return to town.

### Forty-five Years in Police Force.

To-day, April 19th, District Inspector Peet celebrates his forty-fifth year in the police force. Mr. Peet joined the Royal Newfoundland Constabulary on 19th April, 1877, under Inspector General Carly, and has served under five Inspectors Generals. His first visit to Bay of Islands was in 1878, on his way to Flower's Cove, his first station. Eleven years he was appointed to Bay of Islands and served here from 1889 to 1892. He has also served periods at several places in Conception Bay and other parts of the country and for a number of years on the city force at St. John's. In 1918, he was promoted to District Inspector, and again appointed to this station where he has resided the past few years. To-day he is one of the best known and most popular men in the police force. Forty-five years of meritorious service is a record any official might well be proud of. —Western Star.

### West Coast Fishery.

APRIL CATCH MADE GOOD.

According to a report furnished the Board of Trade from Rose Blanche the fishery up to April 15 showed that 6,210 qts. had been landed. The prospects were good but no bait was available. Boats for the week ending April 15th had two good days fishing and averaged 20 quintals per dory. Owing to there being no freezers or cold storage plants on the coast the fishery from this time onward will be hampered for lack of bait and the fishery will have to close until fresh herring put in an appearance. The fish being taken are of unusual size, and well livered. Halibut also are very plentiful along the coast, but there is very little sale and consequently the prosecution of this industry is not followed closely. All the Fortune Bay schooners have left Rose Blanche since the bait supply has been used up.

# An Open Letter on Railway Matters.

To R. C. Morgan, Esq., C.E., of Winnipeg, in the Dominion of Canada, and of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, City.

Dear Sir,—The Governor did not deny, neither did he get his Ministers, or anyone else, to deny on his behalf the allegation made public by his former Prime Minister. He dared not do so, because he was confronted by that gentleman, on the day of his resignation, with proof positive of his having been guilty of carrying on, behind the backs of his Ministers, intrigue with Ottawa and London in respect to Confederation. I have before me copies of letters written by the Governor on the subject, which were sent to Sir Robert Bond by the party to whom they were addressed, and who supposed at the time that Sir Robert was cognizant of what was taking place. I have also before me letters received by Sir Robert Bond from a very high official at Ottawa from which I have authority to quote the following extracts, namely:—"If the power of office and Government passes into Reid's hands"—"with the power of the"—"Behind them, you will inevitably be defeated in a second appeal to the country."

It is completely the creature "of Reid money, and Reid money would have to be paid back out of the slender means of Newfoundland. In a few years that means the practical bankruptcy of the country, bitter discontent amongst the people with consequent agitation towards American annexation, or at least an opportunity for American influence to secure both business and sentimental advantages, detrimental to the Empire and most dangerous to Canada."

On the other hand if the people of Newfoundland "find themselves in distress; at a later date were to make a demand for Confederation with Canada, such demand at such a juncture would mean that Confederation would be on Canada's terms, not Newfoundland's."

"And three years from now the Western Provinces might likely resent any money being spent to increase the political representation of the Maritime States, a factor which would further increase the difficulties. As a remedy for this condition of affairs I would impress upon you that the Reid political party can be forced to support you."

"Terms of union could then be more far less dictated by yourself."

"The Reid interests are controlled by 'Shannessy and the Bank of Montreal and both will run to serve to compel them to support your Ministry on a policy leading up to Confederation which, we know, is only possible under your leadership."

This communication was replied to by Sir Robert Bond (I have the copy of the letter before me) with the scorn and contempt which it merited. He said "let your blood be upon your own head." Of course, the words were a mere figure of speech, but the threat implied was carried out to the utmost. Constituencies, which only four months previous had returned candidates, by immense majorities, to support Sir Robert Bond's Government were now swung into line against them, by a power that moves with silent and irresistible force. The threat, "let your blood be upon your own head,"—found fulfilment. The old Liberal Chieftain was crucified "upon a cross of gold," provided from alien sources, but his exequiators were his own countrymen, who he had striven to save from the degradation and ruin which now, apparently awaits them. Turning over the pile of records before me I observe that the first Pearce offered to any man in this country, was, at that time, 1909, offered to Sir Robert Bond, and, was by him declined. Needless to say it was not tendered by the Governor of this Colony, but by a gentleman of far greater nobility and responsibility. I have disclosed these facts, in order to indicate the anxiety that existed, at that time, to avail of a unique political situation, and crisis in this country, to "round off the Dominion," and also to point out the ramifications of the Political Machine then working, and which is still working for, as I have said before, a common purpose. Perhaps some driving idiot, or some pious exponent of unctuous rectitude, may lift his hands in holy horror at what he will term the revelation of private correspondence. To such I say, the partial revelation made, can induce no man concerned in the correspondence, at this time when a full revelation might have caused very great embarrassment, to men in the highest position, Sir Robert Bond withheld his hand, preferring to go down to defeat, rather than to betray confidence and shatter reputations. He disclosed at the time, over his own signature, in the Evening Telegram, of date April 17th, 1909, a diplomatic synopsis of the facts, to serve as a warning to the public, and to challenge the Governor who had played him false to serve his own ends. By a full disclosure of the correspondence he might have shattered at a

Many of those engaged in cutting pit props or pulp wood have made very little money, and are demanding that something be done, in some instances the pit props setting did not present the opportunities that it was supposed to give, and consequently there has been quite a bit of discontent over the matter. A large number of men who were supplied in order to go in the woods at Pope's Harbour finding that conditions were not as represented refused to continue at the work. Some thirty or more were summoned by a large supplying firm for the value of the outfit. The men were greatly incensed when judgment was entered against them as they claimed that the conditions were not as represented and also they had no money except sums invested in the Union Trading Company.

Firstly as taxpayers we ask if the Breakwater here is costing \$500 per week. If so then we want to know how much every individual who has worked and is working on its construction received, together with the publication of names of those so employed since the start of the work. Then when this is done we will all know who's who and what's what. There is considerable ill-feeling among the working men of this place, for which they cannot be blamed. Many of these men have large families, but are merely receiving one third the amount paid others without any families, and it is said the latter are not in absolute need. If this is a square deal Mr. Editor, there is nothing more to be said. I do not blame these men altogether who are in charge of the work, as perhaps they do not know the difference. Carbonear is quite a large place and people neither know each other or each others circumstances very well. Some there are who only know you once in four years, and at that particular time you are the "white-headed boy" with them. That's playing the political game, I suppose, but we are told that this is not the way in which they are handling the Relief Work in Harbor Grace, where everyman is getting a fair show and working for his money. So far as I can see there is nothing very fair about the way in which public labor is being handled in Carbonear. Discord and strife is being generated by the ill-advised manner in which the money is being spent on those who are the favorites of the hour, and who can blame a poor man for asserting his rights and striking out for his fair proportion of the work. Unless a change occurs quickly there will be something doing.

The boy died shortly after, but the two girls reached womanhood under her care. She is survived by one sister and three nieces residing in Malden, Mass., a brother near Trinity, Nfld., and a niece and nephew at Norris Point. To these and her large circle of friends sympathy is expressed, but particular sympathy will go to her two step daughters, the Misses Harriet and Minnie Cox who lived with her. During this trying illness the former did not spare herself in the giving of constant and tender ministrations, while many friends—both male and female—did their utmost to alleviate the sufferings of, and to cheer the patient. ## Monster Procession Celebrates St. George's Day.

### Religious Service in Gower Street Methodist Church Attended by Thousands--Brigades, Scouts and Societies Parade City.

The accepted day of the festival of St. George, England's patronal Saint, April 23, has evidently come to stay in Nfld. Its commemoration on Sunday past, proved that a greater interest than ever is being taken by the citizens who are of English descent, and it has now been well established that the days of the trio of Saints, who are held to guide the destinies of the three kingdoms, St. George, St. Andrew, and St. Patrick, will continue to be perpetuated by the sons of the pioneers who came from the countries of England, Scotland, and Ireland.

**FRATERNAL SOCIETIES LINE UP.**  
 Despite the threatening weather, a grand response was made to the invitation to take part in the parade, and sharp at 2.45 o'clock, the Nfld. British Society with the Albert Edward Branch of juveniles, issued from their Hall and proceeded to Gower St. Church. Next in order came the Loyal Orange Association, Society United Fishermen, Sons of England, Independent Order of Odd-fellows and Gower Street Troop of Boy Scouts. These entered the Church in the order as given, the seating accommodation being well utilized, as it is estimated that about a thousand of all ranks made up the procession, the congregation being augmented by hundreds of others, while many could not get admittance. The banners of the S. O. E. and the Boy Scouts, were deposited on the Holy Table in front of the rostrum by officers appointed for this duty.

**SERVICE AND SERMON.**  
 Rev. E. W. Forbes, M. A., B. D., Pastor of Gower Street Church, conducted the service, Miss Tait presiding at the Organ. The floral decorations of rostrum and choir were very handsome and appropriate. Crossed Union Jacks (miniature) were set immediately in front of the clergyman, the Green and Gold of the Scouts colors harmonizing with the other foliage and plants. Service opened with the singing of the Doxology, in which everyone most heartily joined. After the Invocatory Prayer came Kipling's "Recessional" followed by other prayers and the Anthem, beautifully rendered by the Choir. The offering amounting to \$121.85 was donated to the Methodist Orphanage, and was laid in the sanctuary with dedicatory prayer. The Scripture Lesson was from Nehemiah, Chapter 1. The hymn before the sermon was that beginning with the words "Where the

flag of Britain flies." Taking for his text the words from the second and third verses of the second chapter of the book of the prophet Nehemiah, "Why is thy countenance sad, seeing thou art not sick, etc." Mr. Forbes delivered a most inspiring address, the subject being patriotism. Space forbids any detailed report of an oration such as it has seldom been our pleasure to hear, but the message delivered on Sunday will not have fallen on deaf ears, but will prove inspiring and helpful, especially in times of distress when the thought of the great words uttered by the preacher returns to the minds of those who heard them.

**CONCLUDING CEREMONIES.**  
 Prayer was again offered after the sermon, by the pastor, subsequent to which Mr. H. Courtney delighted the audience with a Solo, "Land of Hope and Glory," in which his fine voice was heard to great advantage. The singing of His Majesty, King George V. of the National Anthem was the last number prior to the Benediction, and thus was concluded a most hearty and reverential service of Thanksgiving, one that will be remembered, one that will not fail to leave its impress on the devotional spirit of the day and hour, and one that was most helpful in every respect. On leaving Church, the C. L. E. Cadets took up position at the head of the procession, with full band under Capt. Morris. With these and the M. G. B. Musicians accompanying sweet strains, marching airs being played by the drums and bugles of the Boy Scouts, the line of march was taken up to the Government House, where the principal officers were received by his Excellency. Messages of loyalty to the Crown and person of His Majesty, King George V. were conveyed to Sir Charles, who promised that they would be transmitted immediately. Cheers were next called for the King, Royal Family, Empire and Governor, all being given with a will. This concluding the formal-ceremonial of the day, the parade fell in and leaving Government House grounds by the East gate, debouched over Oranmore, Duckworth and Cochran Streets, up Water and Queen, over Theatre Hill to Orange Square, christened for the occasion, where each unit broke off and returned to its own Hall. A feature of the parade was the huge silk Union Jack of the Newfoundland British Society, which headed the procession, and was drawn by prancing steeds, which must have been aware of their proud position, in charge of Mr. Thomas Votsey.

### ON ARRIVING IN NEW PLACES



Did you ever set out on a journey to a new place without being filled with the highest expectations?

And did you ever arrive at a new place without a queer sinking of the heart, a kind of emptiness and let-downness, a vague disappointment to find no hands playing to welcome you and the place not essentially different from the place you left?

I have set out on quite a few such journeys in the course of my life, and never (but once) did I not experience this feeling, even when the place, after further knowledge of it turned out to be delightful.

afternoon. Fortunately that turned out to be impossible. The most feverish searching would not reveal any chance of making a connection.

**A Surprise Walk.**  
 And so we stayed, and late in the afternoon the people began to struggle in from their day's activities. We met them and liked them. Supper was delicious. We found there were some splendid tennis courts near at hand. Some of our new friends took us on a walk that did not lead to a dump. We found our rooms cool and comfortable, slept well, awoke to a beautiful day, a healthy appetite and a zest for life. We decided to stay a few days and stayed, of course, our full time and had one of the nicest vacations we ever had.

Since then we always say "Remember S.Y." when we arrive at a new place and begin to have that disappointed all gone feeling.

**Arriving at Night.**  
 It is possible I always plan to arrive anywhere at night. There is less sense of anti-climax when you arrive just in time to get your supper and go to bed. You don't feel as if you ought to start doing something, as you do when you arrive in the

morning or afternoon. And then you go to sleep, wake up fresh the next day ready for anything. "Every day is a fresh beginning, every morn is the world made new."

Of course even the most charming place is likely to bring some element of vague disappointment. Looking forward to the unknown is always a dangerous business. No place could ever be so wonderful "as all the dreams we had." Except perhaps that magic one in a lifetime when any place would be wonderful.

### Fishermen-Farmer.

Farmers are already making the first move in agricultural work, viz.—hauling manure to the farms. The necessity of putting forward extraordinary efforts this season to raise as large crops as possible, is probably greater and more urgent than ever before, not excluding the war years. The problem of finding food enough to live on comfortably will be a trying one for the people of Newfoundland for the next three or four years till times will have become normal, and the prices of necessities decline near the level of the pre-war times. It is incumbent then on every fisherman in the country who has a farm or a garden to make every effort to have the same cultivated and sown before the fishery begins.

Flour will probably be not less than \$10.00 a barrel again next fall, and the more potatoes a man can raise the less flour he will need to buy. The procuring of good seed potatoes will no doubt be a difficulty with many, but any man should not hesitate to invest his last dollar in getting good seed potatoes. If some men would expend as much energy in cultivating their land for potatoes, turnips and cabbage, as they do in looking for Government work and Government assistance, they would be better off and more independent.

The man of spirit and industry will prefer to till his land and raise his own crops, to depending on the Government for a doler of work at pit-props and pulp-wood, which returns are gone as soon as scoured, and leaves a man in hand to mouth poverty all his life. The fisherman farmer who has the great spirit in him to raise all the vegetables his family requires and who in addition can keep a few sheep and a cow will never trouble the Poor Commissioner or waste his time in working on the roads for the government throughout the summer.

In the old days, not more than a generation ago, it would be a disgrace

for an able-bodied fisherman to be working on the roads.—Trade Review.

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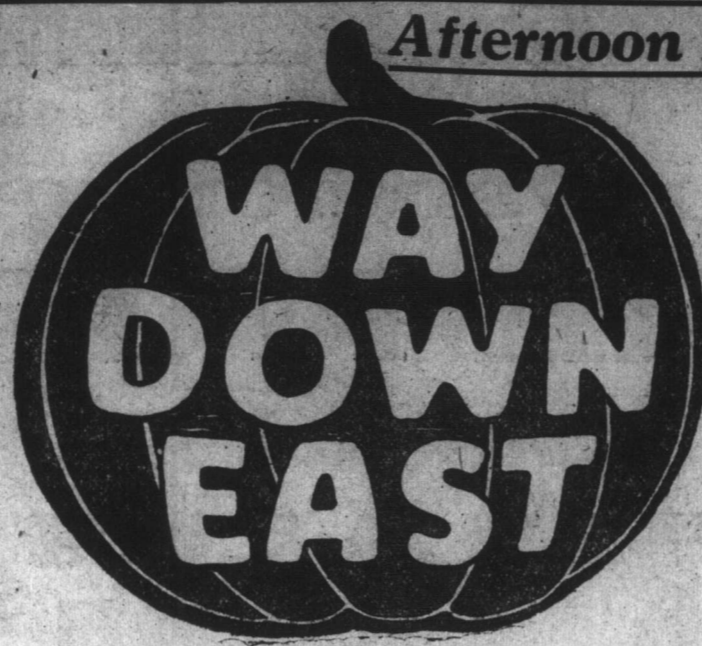

He was a jovial companion, always charitably disposed towards his neighbor, always kind and considerate even to a fault. These characteristics during life made him a general favorite, and whether it be on the deck of a banker, in the club room, or in any society, he was a man amongst men. He was always of an industrious mind, and by hard work and faithful endeavour has built up a comfortable home. He leaves a wife and six children, three boys and three girls to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate loving husband and father. May he rest in peace.—COM. St. Lawrence, April 21, 1922.

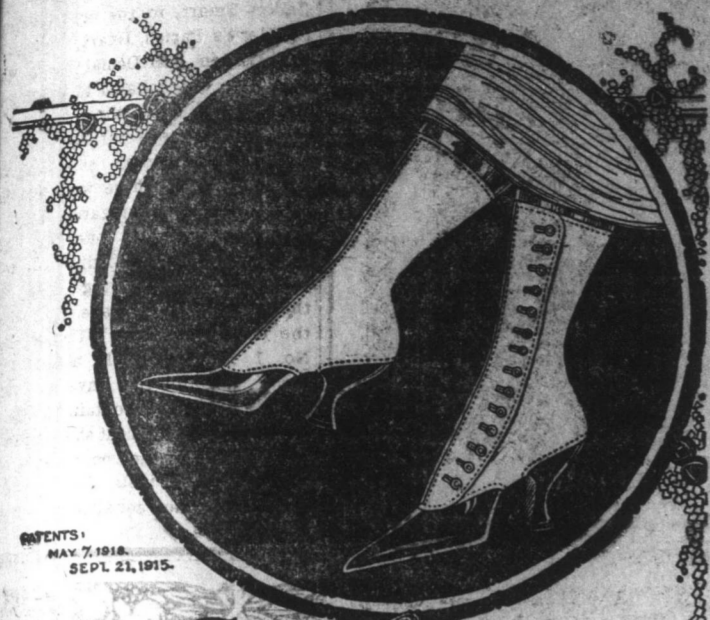
Rev. Canon Smart, Rector of St. Mary's Parish, Heart's Content, was a passenger to the city by train yesterday.

### Catching Fish

#### With Birds.

**JAPANESE USE CORMORANTS.**  
TOKYO, April 10, (Associated Press).—On a moonlight night, illuminated by blazing torches, Edward, Prince of Wales, will be taken for a ride along the River Niagara to witness the strange cormorant fishing industry while on his visit to Japan as guest of the Imperial Government. A curious method of catching fish with birds instead of hook and line is practiced in Japan from time immemorial. 28 men, four boats and 64 cormorants constitute a working unit of the picturesque fishing fleets to be seen in many sections of Japan but particularly along the Niagara river. The cormorants are trained when quite young and will continue work for 15 or 20 years. When well trained and properly handled, the fish will average about 150 lbs. per hour. The master fisherman, distinguished by a particular hat, stands in the bow of the boat, which he strikes up and down no fewer than 12 birds with remarkable skill. Another fisherman, a member of the crew is stationed between the two, armed with a bamboo pole which he strikes up to the birds at their work at the time encouraging them by shouts and cries.

### ORNITHOLOGICAL TRAP.

Each cormorant has a ring of metal or bone around the base of its neck, permitting it to swallow the small fish as food but effectively stopping those of marketable size from passing through. Round the body of the bird is a cord to which is attached in the middle of the back a short strap of stiff whalebone, with which to lower the bird into the water or lift it out again, and a thin rein of spruce fibre, twelve feet long. The master lowers his 12 birds into the stream and holds the reins in his left hand, manipulating them with his right as occasion requires. The second fisherman does the same with his four birds while the third man begins his volleys of noise. The birds start diving and ducking with wonderful swiftness and the fish come swimming towards the blazing light. The master has a busy time handling his 12 strings to prevent them tangling while the birds are dashing hither and thither.

### THE DOYEN OF THE FLOCK.

When one of the birds becomes engorged, it swims about in a foolish, helpless way, with its head and swollen neck erect and the master hauls it in. He forces its bill open with his left hand, still holding the other lines, and squeezes out the fish with his right, after which he returns the

bird to its work. This is all done with remarkable dexterity and quickness that the other birds have not had time to become entangled and immediately the whole team is again perfectly in hand. Each bird has its own number and knows it. No. 1 or "Ich" is the doyen of the corps, the senior in years as well as rank and his companions according to their age come after him in numerical order. Ich is the last to put into the water and the first to be taken out the first to be fed and the last to enter the baskets when the work is over. Ich has the post of honor in the eyes of the boat. He is a solemn, grizzled old fellow, with a pompous air. The others are placed alternately on either side of the gunwale according to their rank, and should the law of order of precedence at any time be violated, a terrific rumpus occurs among them. After the fishing is over each cormorant is taken out of the water, the master can tell by its weight whether it has had enough to eat during the hunt, and if not, the bird is fed with the inferior fish that have been caught.

LONDON, April 9.—(Canadian Press Cable).—After several weeks of trial, the well-known financier, Ernest Terah Hooley, was sentenced in the Central Criminal Court on Saturday to three years' penal servitude for conspiracy to defraud persons who were induced to buy shares in the Jubilee Cotton Mills.  
Of five other defendants, two included Fletcher, ex-Mayor of Derby, were acquitted. Land agent Demery and Solicitor Wallis were sentenced to twelve and ten months respectively in the second division. The judges took under consideration the suggestion that Wallis was struck off the rolls. Ex-Mayor MacDonald, of Inkington, who was recommended for mercy, collapsed in the dock. He was bound

We have placed in her cherished grave a small sod of blessed earth from "Crough Patrick" to remind her, that in her earnest pleadings before God's great throne she must not forget the dear land of her birth. Her life brings us back over four score years. Born in Dublin on October 31, 1841—when yet only sixteen, at the shortest, possible notice she surrendered all natural ties, which make the young heart glad, and crossed over the wide ocean to make her home in Newfoundland. In 1868 she entered the Convent of the Presentation Order at Cathedral Square, St. John's, and on August 19th, 1861 was professed in holy Religion by the late illustrious Bishop Mullock. She spent seven years in St. John's, and on the 11th of September, 1865, came to Femeuse where she lived for eleven years. On the 9th of August 1876, she came to Renewa as one of the chosen band of five with Mother Joseph O'Donnell as superioress to found the Convent just then erected. Even since Renewa has been her home. During all these years she has given her great zeal and energy, her time and her talents to the promotion of education in this district; to the uplifting of Holy Church, and to the interests of our Holy Faith. To many she has given the first seeds of Christian virtue. While instructing others she did not forget her own soul. She was a model Religious, a strict observer of her holy Rule, a lover of Prayer. At any time during her free moments she might be seen absorbed in prayer before the altar. Simple in disposition, amiable with a refined sense of the virtue of gentleness, charitable towards all, ever ready to help others, meek and mild like her Divine Spouse, is it any wonder that she won the esteem and affection of those with whom she came in contact, and was a friend of all? She was one of the few to whom God gave the great privilege of celebrating her Golden Jubilee of her Religious Profession, which she celebrated with joy on September 19th, 1909. After a life so good why should she fear death, or parting from a world with which over sixty years ago she had parted forever, to serve a higher and nobler Master whom she had then espoused. Nor need she fear to hold in her cold dead hands the Vows which for so many years she so faithfully kept, and the Cross which she carried with such patient submission during her long life. Her death was marked by the same virtues for which she was remarkable during life; the same calm and peace and holy resignation which marked her life made her edifying. The same qualities that made her in life a valiant woman, made her valiant in death; and her soul so beautiful in life was surely beautiful and precious in death for "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His Saints." Let us now sympathize with the people and especially with the members of her own community who will sadly miss their dear Mother Stanislaus. May her earth lie lightly on her, and may her soul rest in peace.—COM.

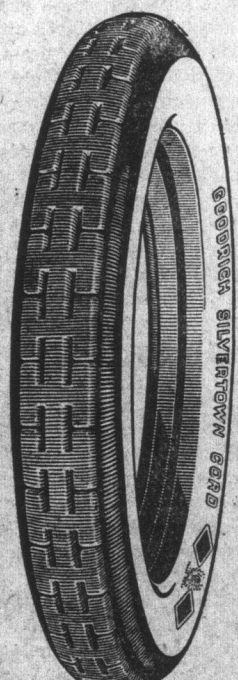

### Mount Pearl Wireless Station.

#### GOVERNMENT SHOULD ACQUIRE IT

It is again rumored in authoritative circles that the admiralty contemplate the abandonment of the Wireless Station at Mount Pearl. Here is an ideal opportunity for the Newfoundland government to acquire, free of charge, the unrestricted use of this station, and to use it as the hub of a system of communication which would embrace the people of this Island. From casual glance one would imagine that such a scheme would involve a large expenditure of capital, which it is unanimously agreed the Newfoundland Govt. cannot afford, but upon a closer scrutiny, the expense would be infinite small in comparison with the very large sums expended in an unsuccessful attempt to keep up communication between the isolated outposts scattered along these rockbound shores.

With the advent of the new system of wireless known as "Continuous Wave," only a very small amount of electrical energy is required in order to transmit messages many hundreds of miles. Some time ago an American boy spoke directly across the Atlantic by means of a wireless set constructed by himself, and utilizing less electrical power than that consumed by the ordinary 100 Candlepower Electric Light. So that a similar type of transmitting set installed at the four farthest points around these coasts would have no difficulty in working direct with this city. These wireless stations would be operated by the regular landline operator in the Outport in conjunction with his other duties.

#### SAW THE ADVANTAGE.

Some time ago a merchant at Ramen Island realizing how handicapped his business was through lack of communication, purchased two small wireless sets, installed one in his store and the other at the end of the telegraph line. This installation proved so satisfactory that the Postal Department not only purchased it from the merchant, but also purchased four other complete sets, by means of which communication is at present being carried on between island and mainland. Suppose four wireless sets were erected at St. Anthony, Bonne Bay, Grand Bank, and Port au Port. Each of these stations would be capable of working direct with Mount Pearl, or with one another. The local landlines passing through them would gather the messages from the smaller villages in their vicinity; they would then be sent by wireless direct to this

city, or to the wireless station nearest their office of destination. In this way constant communication would be maintained with all parts of the Island irrespective of weather conditions. The estimated cost of one of these stations, including erection, would be eighteen hundred dollars, and the maintenance cost practically negligible. Telephone conversations could also be carried out between any of these stations.

#### WORTH WHILE TAKING UP.

At the present moment communication with Bell Island is very poor, and messages often have to be sent to Spaniard's Bay, and carried over by boat. Shortly either a new cable will have to be laid, which will cost the Government at least \$25,000 or a small wireless set installed at less than five hundred dollars, which would route its messages through Mount Pearl. Only one wireless operator would be required in order to operate the station at Mount Pearl, as their high powered set would not be used, and the traffic passing through this station from the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Coy., Grand Falls, The Dominion Iron and Steel Coy., Wabana, The Copper Mines at Tilt Cove, and the Limestone Quarries at Port au Port, as well as other up to date companies, who would install sets at their headquarters, would not only cover the maintenance cost, but also materially increase the revenue of the Post Office Department. It is therefore hoped that the Government will accept this wireless station, thereby solving the problem of communication in this Island, greatly reducing the upkeep of the Telegraphic Department, which last year amounted to over \$300,000, and also adding a large source of revenue to the depleted treasury of this country.—O.M.

**KING AND CABINET WARNED.**  
LONDON, April 24.  
The Greek National movement, in Smyrna, to bring about the independence of that country, is making headway, according to the Constantinople correspondent of the Times, who adds that the King and the Athens Government have been warned not to interfere.

**SEED ACREAGE INCREASED.**  
MONTREAL, April 24.  
The total acreage being prepared for seed in the three prairie provinces is 28 per cent. greater than last year, according to the Canadian Pacific Railway Agricultural Agent. The total is 16,443,843 acres. Plenty of farm help is obtainable from the unemployed in cities.

**FIRE INSURANCE TO GO OUT.**  
MONTREAL, April 24.  
Judgment was delivered in the Practice Division of the Superior Court here yesterday afternoon, ordering the winding up of the Strathcona Fire Insurance Company.

**J.P. ACCEPTS.**  
NEW YORK, April 24.  
J. P. Morgan, yesterday, announced acceptance of the Allied Reparations Commission's invitation to become a member of the committee which will consider the flotation of the international loan for Germany. He will sail for Europe about the middle of May.

**AGREED IN SECRET.**  
RIGA, April 24.  
The Russo-German Treaty, which started the Genoa Conference, was agreed to in Moscow after secret negotiations between Premier Lenin and Admiral Paul Von Hintze, one of the leading diplomats of Emperor William's regime. It was stated here yesterday on good authority.

**INTERNATIONAL FINANCES.**  
LONDON, April 24.  
The Bank of England is to call a meeting of representatives of central banks of the world, pursuant to a decision of the financial representatives at the Genoa Conference, and will invite Federal Reserve Banks of United States to participate, says a Trade paper, quoting Sir Robert Horne, who has just returned from Genoa. The newspaper adds there is reason to believe United States will consent to join the Conference.

**DUAL ALLIANCE.**  
LONDON, April 24.  
A Central News Despatch from Genoa declares the Soviet Russia is negotiating secretly with Hungary, giving mutual support against Rumania and the little entente.

**STRIKE OFF.**  
DUBLIN, April 24.  
The 24-hour strike terminated to-night with three monster demonstrations in protest against the military, but without disorders. A mild sensation was caused by posters proclaiming a workers' republic, which proved to be bogus, as the apparent object of the posters was to alienate employers and divert attention from the success of Labor's protest. All classes assembled to-night and approved Labor speakers, who declared the people would not submit to the rule of the gun, and urging preparation against a counter-revolution.

**OLD MEN KILLED.**  
BELFAST, April 24.  
Two men of 75 years old were killed to-night in East Belfast.

**ECONOMIC AGREEMENT.**  
LONDON, April 24.  
Negotiations between German and Polish representatives, regarding an economic agreement in Upper Silesia, are practically completed, according to the exchange telegraph.

**A NEW TWIST.**  
GENOA, April 24.  
A new twist developed in the economic Conference, when it was reported that Russian delegates argued for completing the wiping out of war debts, and also the relinquishment of all arrears of interest on the pre-war debt.

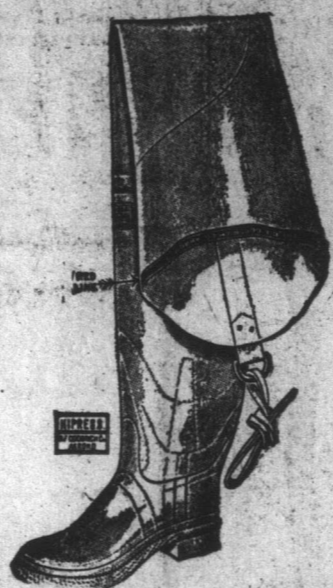

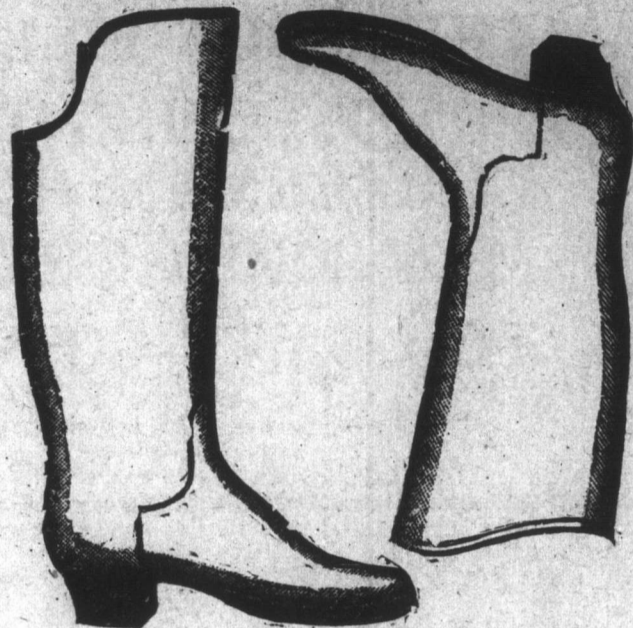
