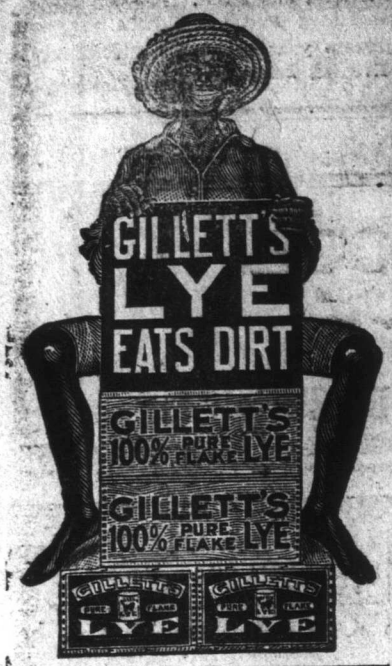

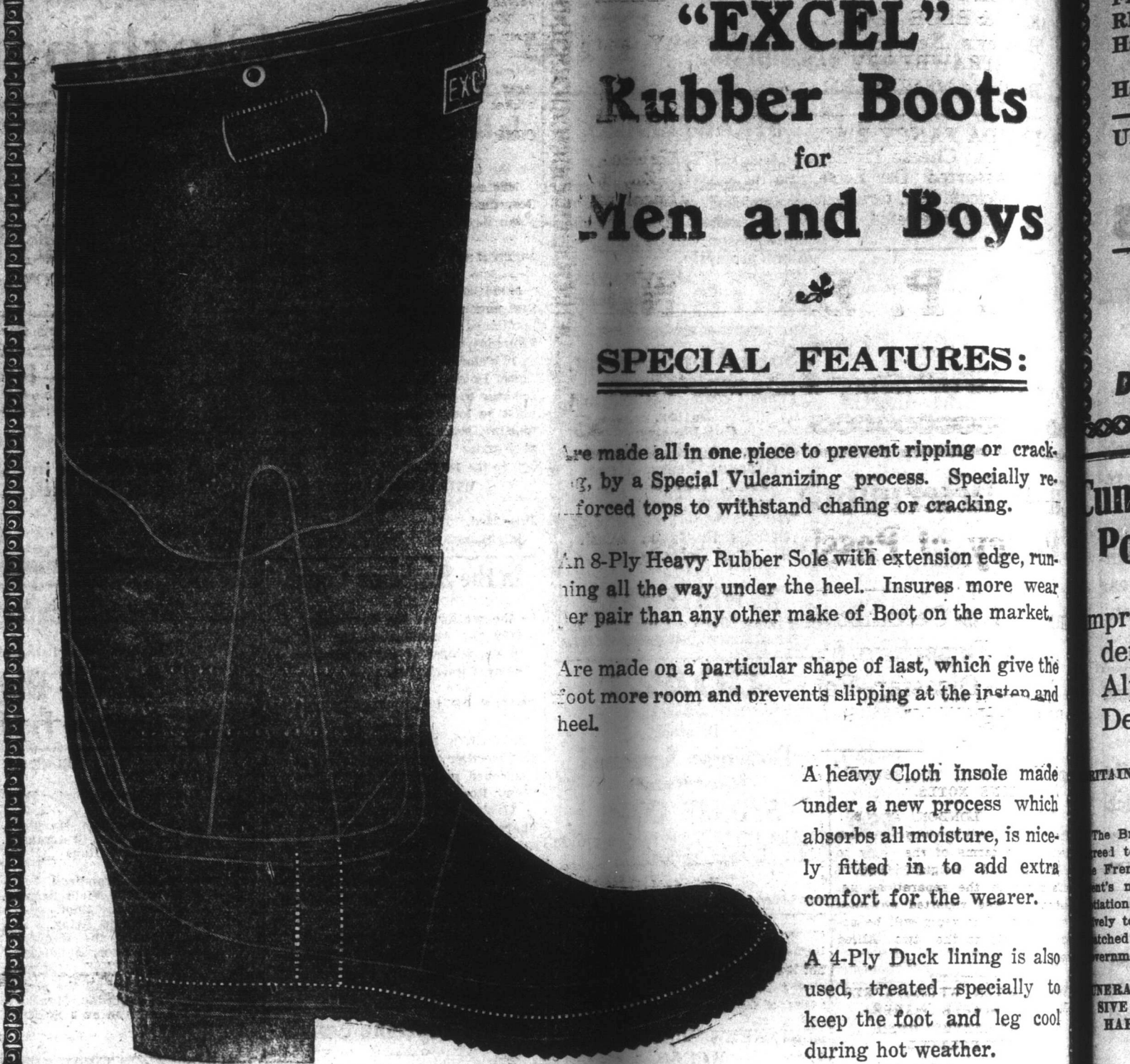

"What we cannot do and will not do is to abandon a German land and betray our fellow countrymen. We refuse to work under the bayonets of our oppressors." Sub-

ABANDONED SWIM 3 MILES FROM SHORE.

DOVER, Aug. 9. George Michel, French swimmer, abandoned his attempt to swim the channel at six fifteen to-night when he was within three miles of the English shore.

HEAT PROSTRATION IN WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. One hundred and seventy-five persons were prostrated by heat here yesterday while watching the funeral of the late President. All are expected to recover.

CUNO'S SPEECH HAS NO EFFECT.

LONDON, Aug. 9. In Chancellor Cuno's speech before the Reichstag, there was nothing he said that would seriously affect the British Cabinet and it still failed in dealing with a serious problem. Some of the important features were adopted without unanimous vote, and will be the subject of contention at Geneva. Text provides for general treaty to be signed by all the members of the League whereby they agree to aid members who are victims of aggression or threatened invasion. This agreement so far as it implies the use of military force is of continental application only, no signatory

Try Common Sense

In commenting upon our editorial of Tuesday last when we sought, not so much to find a name for the dilettant and unsystematic methods which we apply to the prosecution of our fisheries, as for a cause, the Advocate refers to the Regulations which were tried (and found wanting), and claims that their failure was due to the opposition that was aroused for no other than political purposes.

It may be that was the case on the part of a few individuals. Our politics would make a sorry picture could they be painted. The words of Wilson Macdonald the poet—

"If I were given three things to damn I would damn creed three times"

might more aptly have been applied to politics, particularly to ours, and every individual in the country could have with advantage committed them to memory.

But there was something more than that. Most of us will readily admit the necessity for regulations in our industry, and many of those which were originated by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries of that day were unquestionably well considered and admirably suited to the purpose. Unfortunately the fundamental principle of supply and demand was ignored. The conditions in the foreign markets had not been fully considered, and an attempt was made to bully our customers into purchasing on our terms. Had there been no competition, as was the case during the war, and had it been necessary for them to buy from us or starve, our threatening attitude might have succeeded—for the moment. But the mines had been removed from the North Sea and once more the fishermen of Europe were pursuing the "lawful occasions." Was it not natural that our customers, who had been made to pay through the nose for so long, would treat us with scant consideration when they could buy elsewhere, or obtain a satisfactory substitute for our fish?

Regulate by all means, but base the regulations on common sense. We have already referred to various evils (the Trade Review terms them peccadillos, but what's in a name?) which have existed in the past and are in existence to-day. We send to the West Indies as an article of food fish that we should turn from with repulsion were it placed on our own tables. It cannot be that we are unaware that slavery is no longer in existence, but we do forget that the people of the West Indian Islands are an enlightened and educated race to-day, although they are of darker complexion than ourselves. By the simple method of paying the fisherman less for the cure that does not measure up to standard, far more will be accomplished than by furnishing him with a book of rules. He knows good fish from bad, and will soon produce a superior cure when he finds that he is paid more for it.

We are groping in darkness for what is apparently a Hydra-headed monster, and in our blundering progress it may be that we shall fall foul of its deadly attack from some quarter, but if our sincerity is admitted, as our contemporary graciously suggests, and if assistance is at hand in the form of a stout lance in the hands of a redoubtable knight to aid a venturesome squire, success is assured.

The Franklin Motor Car Owner Explains.

The owner of the Franklin motor car which was referred to in these columns on Thursday last has communicated with us to explain why his car was without a number plate on Regatta Day. He states that he applied to the City Council for plates but was refused them as he was not in possession of a licence for cars under the Motor Vehicle Act, which he was of the opinion did not apply to him. From our personal knowledge of the owner we are confident that as he remarks, had he been responsible for an accident he would have been the first to report and certify it if possible. But from the above remark, and from certain references in his letter to unfairness and hitting below the belt, we cannot but feel that he is under a misapprehension. The personal element does not apply. Because he would act in a perfectly honest manner is no guarantee that some one else of less principle would do likewise. It is surely not news to him that the practice of removing number plates or obliterating them is frequently adopted by unscrupulous persons. We are attempting through our columns to assist the motorist who is confronting with the law and to protect the citizens.

Praiseworthy Action

OF THE MOTOR ASSOCIATION. Upon the recommendation of Dr. Rendell, Superintendent of the Sanatorium, the section of the Topsall Road leading past that institution is to receive a coating of Tarvia. The necessity for this was brought to the attention of the Motor Association by the Superintendent who emphasized the necessity of protecting the patients from the dust of the road, which made it almost impossible for them to remain in the open air. Dr. Macpherson strongly supported the suggestion, and the Motor Association in conjunction with the Roads Commission decided to have the work done. Arrangements were made whereby the Municipal Council undertook to do the work and the Motor Association to supply the Tarvia. The Council estimated that the cost would be about one hundred and thirty-eight dollars, and the Association voted one hundred and fifty. The work will commence immediately. The undertaking of this laudable project by the Association and the City Council will meet with general approval. Further improvements to the Topsall and Portugal Cove roads have been decided upon, and the Roads Commission have approved of the plan. A sum of three hundred dollars will be expended on the former and two hundred dollars on the latter. The continuous rains during the summer have caused considerable damage to the surfaces, and unless repairs were made immediately a far heavier expenditure would have been necessary later on. Motorists generally are beginning to realize the good work of the Association, and of the necessity for supporting it. Fifty new members have recently enrolled and a considerable number have signified their intention of joining up immediately. Roll up, gentlemen, and do your bit.

The Mount Cashel Band Concert in aid of Child Welfare has been postponed until next week.

In Passing.

With the suspension of the rules as moved by Premier Warren yesterday an early closing of the House is looked for.

Possibly the Assembly will prorogue no new-business will be brought forward and very little remains on the order paper to be transacted.

Should the government insist on the appointment of Mr. Alex Mews to the position of Deputy Auditor General a general protest will be made by Mr. Higgins and the Opposition which will no doubt occasion considerable debate.

We understand that several members of the Government are also opposed to the appointment but are prepared if called upon to sink their personal feelings in this respect and stand by the party in passing same if called upon.

There is considerable doubt as to Mr. Mews landing the job as it is rumored that the Government views with alarm the unpopularity of such an appointment, so much so that more than likely another position will be found for the late editor of the Advocate.

It is likewise reported that a certain outpost magistrate has been summoned by the minister in charge of a department to submit proper explanation as to why he received ten thousand dollars from the late administration and for what purposes the money was expended. The magistrate pending an investigation will be suspended.

Speaking about investigations, it is highly probable that Premier W. R. Warren, K.C. will make a statement in the Assembly this afternoon relative to the commission which will enquire into the alleged scandals which forced Sir Richard to resign the Premiership.

The Executive on Tuesday decided upon three gentlemen to form the court of enquiry and they have been invited to act, but according to information received two of the three selected by the executive have refused to lend their services to the state on such a matter and that on the event of the Government's failure to secure an impartial and competent commission in this country it will be necessary to seek elsewhere.

Up to the present nothing has been done in the appointment of a Controller but we have the assurance that before the House closes the Government will fill the position.

The first official act of President Coolidge was to sign a proclamation announcing the death of President Harding and call upon the republic to observe to-day Friday as the day of mourning and prayer. The funeral of the late President takes place at Marion, Ohio to-day.

The death of plasterers in New York has sent their wages up from \$12 to \$14 a day, Christian G. Norman, chairman of the Board of Governors of the Building Trades Employers' Association, said yesterday. Still dissatisfied, Mr. Norman declared, plasterers on several jobs have quit because they were not permitted to earn \$19 a week for overtime and Sunday work.

The sudden death of Pres. Harding has raised the question whether Americans should expect the chief executive officer of their republic to tour the country. It is pointed out that two Presidents in succession have broken down fatally on one of these enormous trips, where an incredible number of speeches must be delivered, and an incredible number of "hospitable" functions must be attended. Most men are beyond the prime of physical vigor when elected to the White House, and it must be remembered that few of them can tackle a program of endurance like that of Theodore Roosevelt.

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TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS LAUNCH A NEW ORGANIZATION FOR BOYS.

MONTREAL, Aug. 10.—The launching of a new movement for boys under the name of Columbus Esquires, was definitely decided yesterday by the Knights of Columbus at the forty-first Annual International Convention of the Order. The movement will be conducted through the twenty-eight hundred councils of the organization. Approximately sixty thousand dollars will be expended in education of two men from each metropolitan centre who will take special courses for two years in boy leadership. It is estimated that there are at least between one and two million Catholic boys, between the ages of fourteen and eighteen, who will be eligible for membership. In no case will a branch of the Boy Organization be established unless the Bishop of the Diocese approves of it. The movement will be distinctly not in competition with the Boy Scouts.

CAPT. LEWIS OF MARVALLE ADMITS LEAD WAS NOT USED SUFFICIENTLY.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Capt. Lewis of the Canadian Pacific liner Marvalle, which sank off the coast of Newfoundland on May 20th, admitted yesterday at the inquiry into the loss, that if the lead had been used more there would have been a wreck; but he felt quite satisfied about the position of the ship just prior to the accident. The admission was made in answer to a suggestion from Butler Aspinall, K.C., representing the Board of Trade, that the lead should have been used more. Chief officer Moore said he thought the ship was North of her course when she struck. This was because there had been several ice warnings and the ship was moving close in to the shore in the hope of avoiding ice. The enquiry was concluded yesterday and judgment will be given next Thursday.

JURY RETURNS VERDICT OF ACCIDENTAL DROWNING.

NEW GLASGOW, Aug. 10.—A coroners jury last night returned a verdict that Ralph Simpson, Stirlarton railway man, whose body was found on the shores of the East River yesterday, after he had been missing more than a week, came to his death by accidental drowning.

UNAUTHORIZED DOCTOR CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER.

MAHONE, Lunenburg County, N.S., Aug. 10.—Clarence Boehner, sometimes known as Dr. Boehner, who now faces a manslaughter charge in connection with the death of Martin's River, near here, Sunday, of Mrs. Jean Clark, came before Stipendiary Magistrate Holloway here yesterday, but at the request of the Crown his hearing will not be held until next Wednesday. Meanwhile he is in jail in Lunenburg. Mrs. Clark, wife of Joseph Clark, Amherst had been suffering from cancer, and it is understood that she received treatment from Clarence Boehner, who had been credited with successful treatment of the disease. The charge against Boehner reads: "That on the fifth of August, Martin's River, he did unlawfully kill and slay Jean Elizabeth Clark, contrary to the provisions of the Criminal Code."

UNITED ACTION OF ALLIES STILL POSSIBLE.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—The net result of to-day's Cabinet Council which discussed the terms of Great Britain's reply to France and Belgium with regard to German reparations, appears to be that the negotiations between the Allies still are proceeding and that no approach has yet been made to anything like separate action.

L.O.O.F. ELECT GRAND MASTER BRIDGEWATER, N.S., Aug. 10.

W. A. MacKay, Truro, was elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows of the Maritimes Provinces and Newfoundland here yesterday. J. J. MacKinnon, Charlottetown, was elected Grand Secretary.

EUROPEAN POWERS MAY HOLD NAVAL DEMONSTRATION IN CHINESE WATERS.

PARIS, Aug. 10.—A naval demonstration in Chinese waters by the European Powers is under consideration owing to anarchical conditions in the Chinese Navy. The French Department of Marine is preparing to send two cruisers if the demonstration is decided on.

GERMAN GOVT. DETERMINED TO CONTINUE PASSIVE RESISTANCE.

BERLIN, Aug. 10.—Passive resistance in the Ruhr and Rhineland which Chancellor Cuno yesterday informed the Reichstag would be continued until France decided to create an atmosphere conducive to negotiations on an equality basis, is now approaching the stage where its further maintenance along peaceful lines will depend wholly upon the Government's ability to keep their resisting population well fed. The falling mark, the curtailment of local food supplies due to natural shortages, and the interrupted rail facilities, and also the punitive measures which increasingly are being imposed by the French now, are contributing to the growing irritation

and restlessness among the miners, steel workers and civil service employees.

LLOYD GEORGE TO VISIT CANADA.

TORONTO, Aug. 10.—According to latest word received at Baptist offices here Hon. David Lloyd George, who is expected to attend the Brotherhood Convention in Toronto, will sail from Liverpool on October 3rd and reach Quebec 10th. It is understood he will visit Winnipeg, Chicago, Detroit and New York, sailing from the last named port for England.

COMMUNIST ATTITUDE TOWARDS CUNO HOSTILE.

BERLIN, Aug. 10.—Communists were active again yesterday when various committees interviewed Social Democratic Deputies and demanded the resignation of the Cuno Cabinet, and threatened to strike or adopt passive resistance methods to enforce their demands. A vote of confidence to be taken to-day, and Communist efforts are not expected to effect it.

At the Memorial Service at St. Thomas's Church for the late President of the United States Warren G. Harding, which takes place at 3 p.m., the following is the order of service:—Hymn—"O God, our help in Ages past." Opening Sentence of the order for the Burial of the Dead:—Psalm—Domine retugium, Dominus regit me. Lesson—Ecclesiasticus, 1-15. Following the hymn "Let Saints on earth in concert sing," the address will be delivered by Rev. Canon Bois. The service ends with the Benediction and "The Dead March." Invitations to attend the ceremony have been extended to His Excellency and Lady Alardyce, the city clergy, Consular Representatives, officials of Newfoundland, representatives of the press and the public generally.

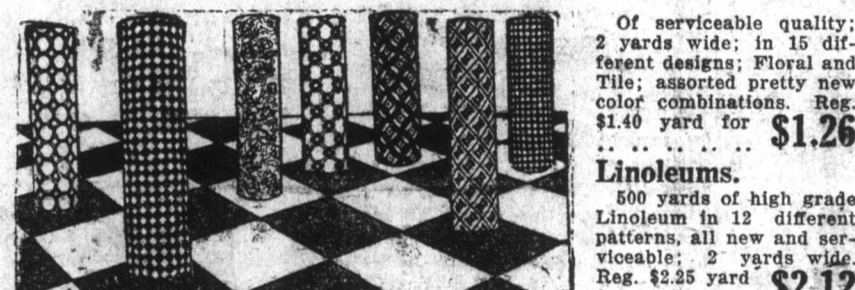

Mr. Higgins in opposing the Bill stated we, in view of the work done the past few months, might abolish the department entirely. He did not object to the principle of the Bill, as he believed that it was well to have some head of a department wholly responsible during the absence of the present Auditor General. But it should be an official beyond reproach so far as politics are concerned. He asked were not the present employees capable. He and the Opposition would resist the bill going through the Committee stage with all the physical force at their command until an assurance was given that Mr. Mews would not receive the appointment. The present employees notably Messrs. Donnelly and Brian were sufficient, and being in the department for a score of years it was unfair to have Mr. Mews thrust in over their heads. He objected also to employees of the Audit Department taking extra amounts for the auditing of Public Accounts. The spectacle of an auditor taking \$200.00 for checking the Model Farm account and \$75.00 for checking the Pit Prop account was disgraceful. He considered the appointment an outrage and by voting it you are going to destroy any confidence that is coming to you as a new administration by one of your first official acts in forcing it through. He said that in no way was the applicant superior to two or three of the officials already in the department who have done the work for many years. Who will have confidence in a down right partisan of the late Administration? You take this offensive partisan and put him into the Audit Department to aid and assist Commissioners in discovering the unlawful acts of the gentlemen whom he supported to the day of his appointment. That was not fair proposition. He could not support it and with the help of his supporters on the Opposition benches he would resist it to the last.

When the Bill again comes up further debate is predicted.

The Speaker read an invitation to the members of the House from the American Consul to attend the Memorial Service to be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at St. Thomas's Church in memory of the late President of the United States, Hon. Warren G. Harding.

The House then adjourned until this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Mistakes Poets Have Made.

All the blunders in literature are not confined to living authors. Milton's lines, "Thick as autumnal leaves that strew the brooks in Val-lombrosa," are familiar to everyone, but, as a matter of fact, the Val-lombrosa forests are all of pine trees, so that there are no leaves, and pine needles do not fall in the autumn, but towards spring.

In "Comus" he writes:—
"And in the violet embroidered vale
Where the lovelorn nightingale
Nightly to thee her sad song mourneth
Well."

Unfortunately for the poet, the male nightingale alone sings and the female is voiceless.

"Outlast Immortal Rome!"
Another classic writer who allowed his metre to get the better of his sense was Pope, who wrote:—

"When first young Maro, in his noble mind,
A work 't outlast immortal Rome de-signed."

He had overlooked the fact that, if Rome was immortal, nothing could outlast it.

The Necessity of a Prominent P. M. G.

The idea inaugurated but a few years ago of placing at the head of postal affairs a "Minister of Posts" has been proved on the part of the public and the servitors of such a Minister to be imperfect. The following substantial reasons show the altogether incompetency of the office as a benefit to the service:

(1) The changing of Government means the removal of the Minister of Posts from his office; (2) At a time when he has become conversant with the affairs and duties of his place and (what is more important) when he has become familiar with the several branches under his jurisdiction, and knows the value of his staff.

(3) A Minister of Posts under existing circumstances, cannot—or does not—give his best services to the business for which he is supposed to be responsible, for as a member of Parliament he has to cater to, and look after the interests of his constituents, and this nearly always to the detriment of his legitimate business—as Minister of Posts.

Some little while ago I visited this Minister's office to transact some post office business with him (personally) but the place was crowded with constituents, and I had to forego the negotiation of what was for me a very important postal affair.

Let me hasten to add that in every case the gentlemen under the Minister of Posts are always willing (and able) to arrange official matters, but none the less are the points I have enumerated to be adjusted if the service is to render all that its public upkeep demands of it.

As a matter of fact the office of Minister of Posts is an utterly useless one, the whole work revolving on the Deputy there and his staff.

In former days there was a very close connection with his staff by the permanent P.M.G.; he had time to get to know his staff and value them and be of them. To-day, his position being movable, no such knowledge or confidence can exist, or if it does and is about to be shown for the mutual benefit of public and staff, the Minister in question fades away, an apt illustration to fit the pithy theory of Flannigan's "On again," off again," gone agin'."

The day this mythical—also practical—office is cancelled, and a permanent Postmaster General appointed, the service will be benefited and a new era of better conditions for the public will have begun.

I think that Pope earned his A.B. in the most important study of mankind. And I think people haven't changed much since the days of Pope.

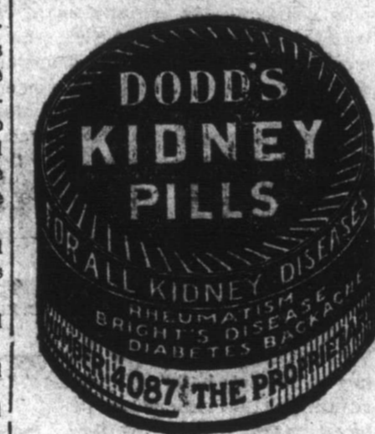

Municipal Council.

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the St. John's Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon.

Mayor Cook presided. Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

The meeting was a very short one, routine matters only being discussed. The Inspector General informed the Board he had made arrangements for the policing of Bannerman and Victoria Parks, as requested.

F. A. Mews called attention to the need of having repairs made to the fence west of Renne's Bridge. As the road at this point is very narrow it was suggested that the property might be possibly utilized for dumping purposes, which would widen the thoroughfare and remove the danger to vehicular traffic.

The owners of the same are to be notified. H. A. Maddock, Sudbury Street, asked if it was the intention of the Council to have sidewalk and surface drain placed in this street. The Engineer is to report on the matter.

The attention of the Board was called to an article which appeared in the Advocate of the 8th inst., in which the Council was criticized for the present condition of the city streets.

In this connection it must be borne in mind that the Council is doing all possible in the work of road repairs and other City Works, but its limited revenue will not permit them to keep the roads up to that high standard all would wish. Some fifty miles of road have to be looked after and repaired within the city limits, and considering the heavy motor and vehicular traffic over these roads, a great deal of money would have to be expended to keep them in good condition.

As it is the estimate for the present year will involve an expenditure of some \$86,000.00. Out of this allocation the work of rebuilding and repairing of bridges must be undertaken. The Council does not object to criticism, provided the money is forthcoming to do all work that is required, and if citizens want better roads, as suggested by the writer of the article referred to, the Revenue of the Council must be increased. The road grants outside of the city of St. John's are distributed on a per capita basis, and as the city, for its population of 37,000, only receives a Government Grant towards its roads of \$5807.50, it was unanimously agreed that the Government be asked that the road grants for the city be distributed on the same basis as that of the other outlying districts. This would bring the City Road Grant up to \$70,000, which

if available would put the roads in the condition that the writer of the article in question so much desires.

The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer, conditional upon the Municipal Act being adhered to.

Dwellings—W. Muford, Alexander Street, provided he pays his proportion cost of Sewer extension; W. P. Gobbie, Extension Brasill's Square.

Health report for week showed 11 new cases of Scarlet Fever, 9 Diphtheria and one Typhoid in the city during the past week.

City Engineer informed the Board that Contractor Quigley had completed the work of trenching and back filling on the pipe line road to his entire satisfaction. Pipe layers were now at work placing the pipes in position and the service will be in working order in the course of another few days.

The matter of the removal of the houses at the junction of LeMarchant Road and Pleasant Street was talked over. The Engineer and Secretary will negotiate with the owners as to a compensation. The taking down of these houses will be a great improvement to this section of the city and will remove one of the great dangers to vehicular traffic.

The Secretary submitted statement of Revenue received during the past week. It was ordered legal proceedings be immediately taken for the recovery of outstanding City Taxes, Dog Licenses, Horse Taxes, etc.

Reports of Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor and other heads of departments were tabled.

Accounts for week were presented after which the meeting adjourned.

During the afternoon several dory crews had a spin, but the row proved very difficult, consequently the regatta did not remain out very long. A large gathering of people visited the course and remained till dark.

Amongst those present at the Lakeside were the roundtrippers from the Sierra, who eagerly looked forward to the event of the day. The high wind which was blowing, however, did not deter the people from enjoying themselves. The wheels of fortune and the various side shows were largely patronized, and a rushing business was done in this connection. High teas were served by the ladies of the Parish in the tents erected for the purpose and were well patronized. The Committee in charge of the Regatta hoped that the wind would moderate sufficiently enough to run off a few races after tea, but that proved impossible. The Committee held a meeting last night and decided to run off the first part of the program this evening, weather permitting. The opening event will take place at 6.30 when some ten crews will start in the dory race from the bays at the bottom of the Lake, followed by the Cabmen, Amateurs, Fishermen and Intermediate. The balance of the races will be conducted on Monday evening at 6.30. The dance held in the Parish Hall last night was largely attended and thoroughly enjoyed by all. The dance will be repeated to-night.
