



A Rotating Garage

LONDON, Nov. 14-(C.P.)-One of he chief difficulties of putting a car in a crowded garage is getting it out again several hours later. There is soon to be in the West End a revolving garage, from which any of 600 cars can be withdrawn in two minutes, J. B. Mitchell of Knightsbridge, who designed the garage in connection with which a private company is now in formation, explains the sys-

"The first new garage, the site of which has been acquired, will be a four-story building. Each of the five floors will be divided by three rings into three concentric circles. On the inner and outer circles will be the stalls for cars, and the central ring

will be a track which will revolve. "When a car is driven into the garage it will be put on one of the revolving sections (taken to the upper floors by lift, if necessary) and the revolving section will turn until the car comes opposite a vacant stationary stall, into which the car will be driven. The revolving floor, which will run on ball bearings, can be turned around completely by two men in 30 seconds. To get the car out the process is merely reversed."

Swans Pay a Surprise Visit

Kingsville, Ont., Nov. (C.P.)-Jack Miner's bird sanctuary here was the calling place recently of a flock of about 200 wild native white swans on their way south for the winter. The manoeuvres of these birds on Lake Erie near the Miner farm, were witnessed by many interested bird lovers. White swans, which in their wild state were almost extinct in Canada a few years ago, regularly make the sanctuary a port of call on their way north in the spring, but seldom stop on their way down. "To draw a distinction between intelligent investment and speculation, it should be emphasized that successful investing involves far more attention to the meaning of fundamental trends and general economic conditions than does the ordinary speculation. The person who intentionally places his capital to work for incipal should be more concerned with possible changes in general conditions and with the broad underlying currents of trade and finance than the man who frankly goes into a speculative proposition for the purpose of quickly increasing his capital. The speculator is almost invariably one who is looking for quick profits. Ordinarily he does not expect or intend for any great period of time. Underlying influences affect his position, of course, but if his speculation is a wise one, its strength may be so great should such come along.

The investor, theoretically at least, vestors for a period and then become every investor who does not give proper consideration is in danger of Mayor W. C. Mikel, of Belleville, unknowingly becoming a speculator thinks is a high-grade investment. but the time may quickly come when to his surprise he finds himself the holder of a speculation.-John Moody, in Forbes Magazine (N.Y.)

No Confederation for Newfoundland

Union With Canada Not Even Discussed To-day, Says H. D. Reid-Is Strongly Opposed—Head of Reid Newfoundland Co., Says Island Richly Endowed and Prospering-Inland Development.

(Montreal Gazette, Nov. 13, 24.) An optimistic view of Newfoundland's climate and possibilities, both agricultural, sporting and mining was given yesterday by H. D. Reid, of the Reid Nfid. Co., who is at Mount Royal Hotel, on a business trip. Mr. Reid, whose family during the past thirty years have built Newfoundlands railways, coastal steamers and the dry dock and electric railway and lighting system at St. John's, Nfld., took a glance over the situation in the Ancient Colony, although emphasizing that he was not a politician, but a plain business man, with a business man's outlook

"Last year we gave up all our transportation business in the Island," said Mr. Reid. "We passed over the railways, the dry dock and the steamships to the Government. We now only own the 2,150,000 acres of land, or the interest pertaining to them, which we got for operating the railways, and which we are now developing.

Asked as to plans for developing this large area, Mr. Reid replied with emphasis: "At the outset I want to say that the prevailing idea that vewfoundland is mistly barren land, with continual snow, fog and outcropping rocks is merely a myth.

"Newfoundland has the most beautiful climate during the summer months that can be found on the globe, while in winter it is less cold than neither Montreal or Quebec. Its scenery can only be described in one word, magnificent, with its wonderful fjords and islands all around the coast. As a sporting resort it is something beyond belief, its rivers teeming with salmon, trout and other fish, all free to the fishermen. Inland there are deer, caribou, partridge, black duck, wild geese and any amount of other attractions for the enorteman, and the visitor can get sportsman, and the visitor can get all the hunting and fishing privileges on payment of a very small fee, making it a country exceedingly attractive to lovers of the outdoor

"Further than that," said Mr. Reid. Newfoundland has a goodly supply of water powers and pulpwood, close logether, while its mineral wealth is surprising. Among those best known are the Bell Island iron mines, which supplies ore for the British Empire Steel Corporation at Sydney, C.B., while copper mines at Notre Dame Bay have been worked profitably for nearly a century.

"Six years ago," said Mr. Reid, resource department, under the direction of scientific experts, to examine the country for minerals, water powers and the development of agricultural possibilities. These had so far been largely of a prospecting nature, but had resulted in promising discoveries of outcrops of hematite iron, chrome iron, coal, gypsum, mica, galena, asbestos and other minerals which gave promise for future

"Situated off the Gulf of St. Lawrence, practically midway between Canada and Great Britain," said Mr. Reid, "Newfoundland has many advantages, both in labor and shipping. It has an industrious population, many of whom are miners, while the great fishing industry whose workers are employed fishing in summer supply labor for the pulpwod forest work in winter.

"Of course our main source of wealth in Newfoundland is from the fisheries, which have been carried on for centuries, and are still as good as ever," said Mr. Reid. "At the same time I do not think it will be many years before most substantial and permanent wealth will be secured by the development and exploitation of the inland resources of

"As to our Government," remarked Mr. Reid, "we have our times of excitement, like everybody else, but from the point of view of business and the investment of capital, I think our Government is as safe and sound as any in the world. British constitutional fair play with security for capital, the business man and the worker prevail."

Asked as confederation with Canada, Mr. ...d replied:

"There is absolutely no talk to-day of confederation with Canada, and personally I am strongly against it. We, in Newfoundland, are richly enfowed, both on land and in the seas. The people are well off, and the financial position of the Island is good. It is up to the politicians and the statesmen of the Island to carry on independently, and I think they can and will."

Mr. Reid will remain in the city a lew days.

Shipbuilding in Great Britain and Ireland

MOTOR SHIPS INCREASE. The tonnage of new vessels comnenced in Great Britain and Ireland during the quarter ended September shows a drop from 375,210 tons at the end of the previous quarter to 252,-745 tons. Only 78 ships were started during the quarter as against 119 launched, meaning the creation of a corresponding number of empty building berths. According to figures published by Lloyd's Register of Shipping and reported to the Bankers Trust Company of New York by its English Information Service, the total vessel tonnage under construction in Great Britain and Ireland on September 30 was 1,468,408, comparing with 1,271,195 on September 30, 1923, but showing a falling off from 1,516,746 tons at the end of the June quarter. On September 30 ships having a gross tonnage of 1,112,604 tons were under construction in These included 43 oil tankers with a gross tonnage of 290,220. The tonnage of steamships comemnced in Great Britain during the September quarter was 168,395, and of motor ships commenced throughout the world (261,444) exceeded that of steamships (257.660). The tonnage of motor ships under construction throughout the world is now equal to 58% of the steam tonnage. Of the combined tonnage building in Germany, Denmark and Sweden, nearly

It is quite easy to induce artificial parthenogenesis in frog's eggs: and the frog is the highest animal, so far cluding as we know, in which this occurs. The frog's eggs, artificially stimulated in various ways, e.g., by a trace of butyric acid, or by being pricked with a glass needle and then washed in blood, develop readily and normally. Though they have no father, they develop into little frogs. A similar parthenogenetic development occurs in natural conditions in summer green-flies, in many small crustaceans, in most wheel-animalcules or Rotifers, and in the eggs that give fowls it has been reported that the egg | ments at 80 dollars per page. sometimes begins to develop without being fertilized, but only early stages of development have been observed. It is obviously necessary to be quite sure that the hens laying these parthenogenetic eggs have isolated for a long time, away from any cock. But there is no reason to doubt that a fowl's egg may begin to develop parthenogenetically, as observed for instance, by Oellacher (1872) and by Lecaillon (1910). The same is true for pigeon's eggs, and a Trans-Atlantic Mail very satisfactory account has recently been given by G. W. Bartelmez and Oscar Riddle.
