Buffalo, Feb. 21. - At a curling match held here yesterday between the Four Brothers' Club of Toronto, and the Queen City Club of this City, the former won by a score of 86 to 55.

New York, Feb. 20. - At a special meeting of the Tammany Society to-night Augustus Schell was installed as Grand Sachem, and a committee was ordered to reorganize the Democracy in New York City.

Matamoros, Feb. 20. - The Government troops under Gen. Resiquera, Governor of Sinaloa, were routed in that state by Gen. Marquez, with a loss of four pieces of artillery and many prisoners.

CHAPTER XVII.

MRS. ALLESTON'S STORY.  
The intelligence paralysed us all. Our consternation and dismay were indescribable. While Percival and I thought principally of the awful position into which Edwin had brought himself, and punishment which would be by the law inflicted on him, the Squire was more concerned about the disgrace which had been brought upon the family, which would be rendered indelible by the exposure of a public trial. At once, therefore, he exerted his influence to have this calamity averted, and my father seconded his efforts in every possible way. How he reproached himself now for the haste with which he had proceeded, and what would he not have given to be in the position he was when he first discovered the false bill. On no easier terms could the clamour be obtained, and in truth the Squire eagerly acquiesced in the condition of expatriation, so incensed was he against Edwin, so anxious to have him obliterated from the presence and even from the recollection of the family whose name he tarnished, whose honor he had sullied.

He was to sail immediately from Liverpool, and Percival and I went to see him before he quitted London. Oh, the pain and agony of that interview. I have never thought of it—I cannot think of it now—without the saddest emotions. Ah, and more so now than ever, when the true meaning of his frantic distraction is known to me. We thought it proceeded from remorse and from the shame he felt at the ignominious, the criminal position in which he had placed himself; but, oh, Helen, his wild grief came from another and a deeper source.

Percival, I regret to say, was harsher with him than he ought. His proud Alorton spirit keenly felt, and could not help resenting, the wrong which had been given to the family honor, hitherto so spotless and unimpeachable, and his conduct to Edwin was cold and constrained. For my part I could not believe but extenuating circumstances existed, and that if we knew all the particulars of the case, and how the poor boy had been tempted to the commission of such a serious crime, there would be less to blame and more to pity than now appeared. Pressed for money by the Squire's obduracy, he had been induced to play—perhaps in the hope of winning, perhaps in order to drive care and anxious thoughts from his heart. Fortune went against him, and he drank deeply to drown reflection. He was in this state when the forgery was committed, and spoke as if he was not clearly conscious of it when it was done. But one important fact we learned—that during the fifteen months he had been absent from the Hall, he had passed under my father's name, and had called himself Waldegrave Winthrop. It was a name, therefore, he had often written without any fraudulent intention, and possibly in putting the signature to the bank bill he contemplated no deliberate crime.

I spoke some words to that effect, and I have never reflected on the painful matter through all these years without being glad that I did so, for, by the softness and grateful look in his eyes, I saw he received comfort from the charitable judgment. He was too proud to utter a syllable in his own vindication or with a view to palliating his crime. Though I was certain that, had he told us the whole truth, much of an extenuating character would have manifested itself. A glance, however, at Percival's cold and half-averted face caused him to shut up his opening confidence. I lamented this at the time, I lament it a thousand times more now. 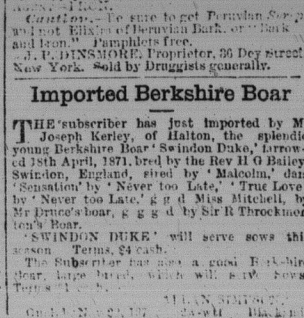
