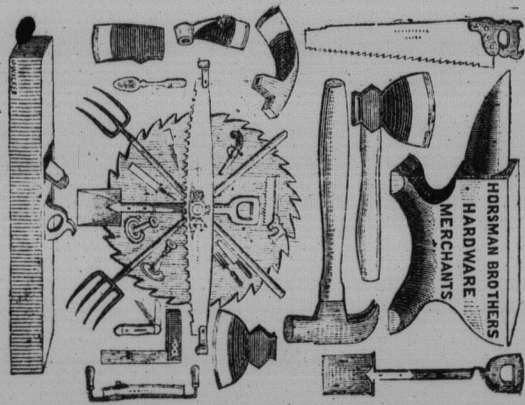

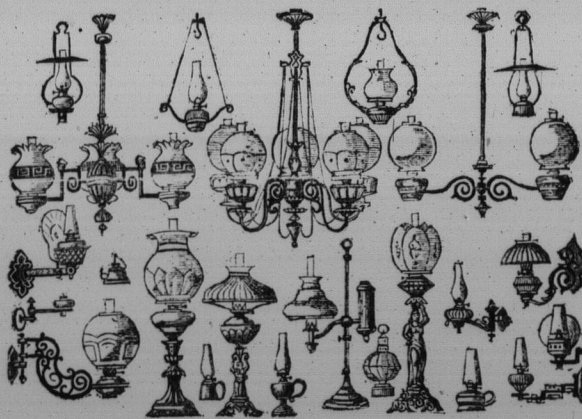

Frightful Catastrophe

at Fall River, Mass.

A Large Cotton Mill Burned!

The Lives of 700 Men, Women and Children Imperilled.

MANY BURNED OR KILLED BY JUMPING FROM THE WINDOWS.

Buffalo, Sept. 19.—Grant's mills at Fall River, Mass., were burnt this morning. The building contained some 700 men, women and children, many of whom perished in the flames. Others jumped from the windows and were killed. The cries of the women and children were heartrending. It is impossible to get the number killed, but no doubt it is large.

Tilton's Latest Statement.

Moulton not on Hand.

New York, Sept. 19.

Moulton has not yet been arrested. He is said to have left the city.

All the papers publish Tilton's latest statement, and express the hope that it may be the last.

London, Sept. 19.

The steamship *Kenilworth* from Philadelphia collided in the Mersey with the Dublin steamer *Windsor*. Both vessels were damaged.

The Council of the loyal town of Paris refused to pay \$200 on account of Lord Dufferin's visit.

FOUND DEAD IN SEAFORTH.—A man named Robt. J. Baird was found dead on Thursday in a hut belonging to Mrs. Mulligan, a short distance below the station at Seaforth, and marks of violence were found upon his person.

ACCIDENT IN MEAFORD.—On Thursday night one of the hands, named Heath, while working in Mr. Brown's saw-mill in Meaford accidentally fell against a circular saw, and was so severely injured that his life is despaired of.

ACCIDENT AT FREEPORT.—Mr. James McParlett, of Freeport, while attempting to shoot off a gun a few days ago, burst it and the contents and a part of the gun flew away, glancing over his face and injuring one of his eyes.

The work on the C.V.R. line is progressing rapidly through the western part of Dumfries. It is expected that the whole line from Mr. Barrie's farm to the Village of Ayr will be graded ready for the ties and rails before the frost sets in.

The Imperial Government has ordered a list of Canadians who served under the flag of 1812 to be made out, and this is being done by the Militia Department at Ottawa. A good many are said to be already inscribed, and all who are entitled to be enrolled, and not yet so, should lose no time in sending in their names.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS IN BERLIN.—On Tuesday last a young man named Hanneberger was charged with unlawfully ill-treating a mare belonging to Judge Lacourse. Hanneberger drove the mare to Doon in a double wagon, and, on returning with a load of tiles, the beast—either from her neck and breast being sorely irritated with the harness, or from natural fractiousness—refused to pull, whereupon her driver threw off part of the load, and vigorously plied the whip, leaving its marks everywhere upon her flanks and cutting open an old sore with the lash. A farmer named Cohen, who saw part of what occurred on the road, gave evidence in favor of the driver, who, he said, did not use the whip over severely, especially as the mare was allowing a companion to do all the pulling. But on the whole, the poor beast seems to have been very badly treated, the whipping she was subjected to having been stupidly excessive and altogether unjustifiable under the circumstances. Hanneberger was fined \$1.00 and costs, and, we think, got off very well.

This is the second conviction for cruelty to animals that has taken place within a few weeks.—There have, we know, been other cases of cruelty, and the only pity is that the guilty parties should themselves have gone unwhipped of justice.

When a few more of these persons, who have less humanity in them than their own beasts of burden, are made to feel the strong arm of the law, they will begin to discover that there is an "Act for the prevention of cruelty to animals" of all kinds.—Telegraph.

BRUTAL CONDUCT.—On Saturday afternoon last, Mr. Jas. Woods, of Fordwick, caught a man named Murky Klam in the act of mutilating one of his mares. After doing so, he followed his mate, which took to the river, and he was unable to get close to the mare. He then returned to finish his fiendish act on the animal he had first attacked. When Mr. Woods discovered him he was in the act of trying to pull the entrails from the mare. The prisoner, noticing Mr. Woods, started down to the river. Mr. Woods overtook him, and called to him to stop, but he would not, and Mr. Woods knocked him down and arrested him. On Monday he was tried at Lakelet, before Mr. Hazlewood, J. P., and committed to Goderich jail to stand his trial.

FENCES BURNED.—Mr. Wm. Ellis, who lives near Hespeler, had fences destroyed by fire to the value of \$100 a few days ago. A neighbor of his named Strome had been attempting to burn the body of a deceased equine in rather close proximity to Mr. Ellis's fence. Hence the destruction of property.

RUNAWAY.—About two o'clock today, a horse, attached to a light wagon, belonging to Mr. Michael Hart, got frightened while having a collar put on him in front of Mr. Beattie's harness shop, West Market Square, and started off at a quick pace, but had not proceeded far when he came in contact with Mr. Walter West's buggy, smashing the shafts and harness of violence were found upon his person.

The farce of Barney the Baron at the close provoked much merriment. The Herndons appear to-night for the last time this season in the play entitled "Under the Gas-light."

SECOND DAY.

A resolution to prepare a book of discipline for the United Church—known as the "Wesleyan Church of Canada," was referred to a committee.

The following statistics show the numerical strength of the individual and also of the United Conferences:—The ministerial staff in the New Connexion is 21; in Eastern British America, 217; and in the Canada Conference, 701. The number of communicants in the New Connexion is 7,587; in the Eastern, 20,950, and in the Canada Conference, 73,701, making a total ministerial agency of 1,009, and a membership of 102,338, in the newly organized General Conference.

Local and Other Items.

BERLIN ITEMS.—Berlin observed Wednesday as a public holiday and the citizens migrated to Guelph. The Telegraph has a circulation of 600. The three men who stole "pies and 'ings" from a cellar here recently have got 21 days in gaol. 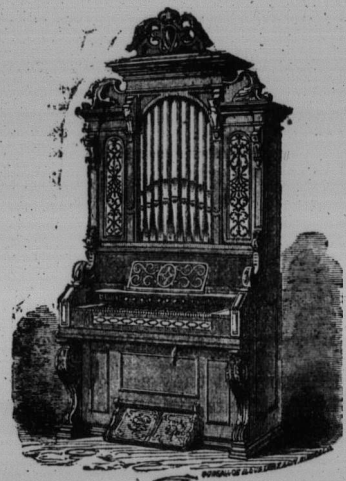

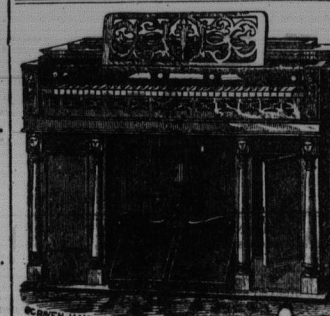

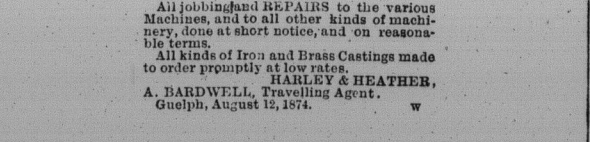
