GUITEAU FACING JUDGE. SECRETARY OF STATE BEANS IN THE WIND. NORTHWEST TOWN PLOTS. CRAIG STILL IN THE BOX. THE SECRETARY TELLS WHAT HE KNOWS ABOUT THE MURKIN CONTRACT. A BRAKEMAN KILLED. LIVELY TIMES IN CHILL. U. S. MINISTER HURLBURT AND GENERAL LYNCH. THE Relations of the United States With Chile Affected - The Peace Commission - Terrible Ravages by Storm. PASADENA, Nov. 17. - Great excitement was produced in Chile by United States Minister Hurlburst's letter to General Lynch. The papers generally denied the genuineness of the document, or if that were to be accepted, refused to accept Hurlburst's opinion of the United States' government. The excitement extended to official circles and the Chilean minister of foreign affairs addressed a note on the subject to United States Minister Kilpatrick. In reply Kilpatrick categorically contradicted Hurlburst's letter, and the Chilean minister's colleague and quoted from his instructions, which he said, were the same as Hurlburst's. The publication of the letter was the first intimation to Hurlburst that his utterances were openly contradicted by his colleague. Hurlburst immediately telegraphed to Lynch, and the latter has been led away by his friendship for Chile. He is much disturbed, and it is understood that he is preparing an answer to Kilpatrick, including quotations from his own instructions given long after Kilpatrick received his letter and circumstances of the temporary effect on American interests had. Kilpatrick has just received from a long and dangerous illness. THE CHILIAN PEACE COMMISSIONERS arrived at Lima on Oct. 26. They will treat with any government the consider commission of the majority of the people. Just now the Chilean government is in the ascendant. THE STORM OF OCT. 26 leveled the entire town of Manzanilla to the ground. Buildings were blown to fragments and several vessels in the harbor were lost. The loss is estimated at over half a million of dollars, independent of the shipping destroyed. THE FIRE RECORD. HALIFAX, Nov. 17. - A fire broke out in the St. Lawrence Hotel, at 6 o'clock this morning, and building the Colin McKee house and shop, the masonic hall and several small buildings were burned to the ground. The loss amounts to \$25,000 and the insurance \$15,000, in the following companies: Queen \$7000, North British \$2000, Royal \$2000, Imperial \$1000, Lancashire \$1000, Commercial Union \$1000, Halifax \$800. MONROE E. BIRCHIE and W. W. HULLMAN are the Ottawa workmen's delegates to the Toronto conservative convention. A team of horses belonging to Mr. John Bell, G.C., of Belleville, ran away yesterday morning. Miss Bell was thrown from the carriage against a lamp-post and very severely hurt. Her condition is very precarious. A young man named Ben O'Connell narrowly escaped drowning at Belleville on Wednesday night. He was in a ducking stool on the bay and his boat capsized. He was rescued in an exhausted condition after being twenty minutes in the water. MR. DUNN'S FEES. OTTAWA, Nov. 17. - In the supreme court this morning judgment was pronounced in the case of the Queen v. Dunn, an appeal from the decision of Judge Fournier, in the exchequer court, awarding Mr. Dunn \$8000 compensation for services before the fishery commission. Judgment reserved. THE MURDOCH CASE. All the Evidence Heard - Judgment of the Court. On the opening of the case yesterday Mr. Watt went into the box and said, with regard to his statement that he had seen Mr. R. J. Belford and Mrs. Murdoch in the necropolis, that he might have been mistaken in Mrs. Murdoch's identity, and could not now swear it was she. His lordship said he was under the impression that Mr. Watt was mistaken. Mrs. Murdoch who was subjected to cross-examination by Mr. Murphy denied all the charges made against her. James A. Blake's evidence was not very important. Edith Bronson, Margaret Simpson and Mrs. McCarthy were called to show that Murdoch went with a woman to a house of assignation formerly kept by Edith Bronson. The two former were positive, the latter hazy. Murdoch was put into the box and denied the charge. A. B. Aylesworth and A. J. Bullock were called to prove an alibi. Counsel then addressed the court and judgment was reserved till to-day. Persecuted Jews for America. Zion church, at Bay and Adelaide streets, has been sold for \$15,000. The congregation will erect a new edifice at Grenville and Elizabeth streets.

Mr. Christopher Robinson, Q. C., holds that the water-works contract is a good one, binding the contractors and their sureties very securely.

Somebody left an infant on the doorstep of 138 Keele street last night. The police took charge of the waif and are now looking for the somebody.

The boy then disappeared, and was not heard of until yesterday, when Mr. Boyd received word from a friend in Michigan that the missing one was there. Mr. Boyd has gone after the runaway.

While Thomas Madden was descending the stairs in King & Brown's establishment Wednesday evening, he misadvised his step and fell down several steps to the floor. An open knife that he held in his hand at the time entered his left side just below the heart and penetrated several inches. His fellow-employees removed him to his boarding-house on Adelaide street.

The wound is very painful and regarded as serious. Madden is 18 years old and has no friends in the city. He came from Colingwood about a year ago.
