The Mail's Manager on Trial for Publishing Lottery for sale. Constable Watt Swore that he went into Munday's place on Feb. 26. There was a poster in the window announcing the lottery. After disposing of a lengthy docket in the police court yesterday morning, Magistrate Denison announced that he would

proceed to hear the lottery cases, of which there were nearly 40. All the defendants being in court, the charges were read, pleas of not guilty were entered in every case and the court rose till 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

At this hour the court-room was crowded when the magistrate ascended the bench. The charges are divided into three classes: Offences against the lottery law with regard to the late masonic gift enterprise in London, the proposed orange kall gift enterprise and patriotic concert at Ottawa, and a prospective newspaper lottery in Detroit. The ma. The majority of the defendants in court yesterday were alleged to have aided in the orange lottery, a few in the masonic and only two in the Detroit affair. C. W. mr. Douglas testined that the orange lot-tery advertisements were charged to Ed-ward C. Barber of Ottawa. Witcess was shown a copy of the Mail of Dec. 25, with a lottery advertisement in it. He declined to identy the paper at as a copy of the Toronto Mail of that date, or say who was responsible for publishing said advertisement.

Mr. Fenton said he would summon the Mr. Fenton said he would summon the whole Mail office unless he got the witnesses who were supposed to know all about the reception of the advertisements at the office to answer. The case was apparently going to be blocked on technicalities. He asked that Thos. W. Dyas, advertising agent, W. J. Hambly, foreman of the Mail composing room, and Arthur Phillips of the press-room to be summoned. In a few minutes these gentlemen were in court.

Mr. Dyas was put in the stand. He testified that slthough he was advertising agent of the paper he did not know how the advertisement for the masonic lottery got into the Mail. He believed that it came by mail in the middle of the night, and was sent up to the foreman without anyone seeing it. These were ten or twelve foremen around the composing room, but he did not

sent up to the foreman without anyone seeing it. There were ten or twelve foremen around the composing-room, but he did not know which one received it. Witness looked upon Mr. Bunting as sole and absolute manager of the Mail newspaper office. Mr. Bunting had given witness orders to exclude all lottery advertisements from the paper. Mr. Dyas would not positively identify the exhibit before him as a copy of the Toronto Mail of Dec. 25, 1882. He thought it looked like one. This was all the light he would throw on the matter.

Mr. Hambly was sworn, but he was only asked a few unimportant questions.

Mr. Fenton announced that as none of those witnesses would testify against Mr. Bunting he would get around it some other way. He would prefer charges against Mr. Douglas and Mr. Dyas They would probably fall through and they would provably fall through and they would never be tried for them again. They would thus be at liberty to testify against Mr. Bunting. As there was apparently no prospect of going further into Mr. Bunting's case an adjournment was asked by Mr. Fenton. Mr. Bunting said he was leaving for Ottawa last night and would be gone for some time. After further argument March 12, with the understanding that it would be immedately laid over till March 19, was fixed for he next hearing.



CLERICAL PINANCIERING Financiering on the large scale by clergy men does not appear to be a success, generally speaking. Roman catholic clergymen have by some been credited with a good deal of worldly wisdom, more than the facts warrant, we should say. The gigantic losses incurred under the financial management of Archbishop Purcell and Father Purcell, of Cincinnati, and brought to light a out four years ago, are now paralleled by what we hear from Lawrence, a large cotton manufacturing town in Massachusetts. The story told is that Rev. Father O'Donnell, one of the first priests in the city, began thirty years ago the practice of receiving the savings of his parishioners, on which he paid from 4 to 6 per cent interest. He died in 1861, and a debt of \$150,000 is said to have existed then. But his successors zealously pushed ahead the various enterprises in which he had engaged. In 1870 the Augustinian society was formally incorporated to hold property for religious and educational purposes -a direct continuance of the work begun by Father O'Donnell in his savings bank, which has all the time steadily received deposits. An extravagant expenditure of money in churches, schools parsonages and the improvement of church property was entered upon. With a previous debt of \$150,000 the society incurred liabilities to the amount of \$200,000 in the construction of St. Mary's church, and a debt of \$40,000 was added by the uniting of two more parishes to that of St. Mary's. 

The Gazette des Hospitaux publishes some facts about animals of a most extraordinary kind, The writer, Dr. Delaunay, is one of the most remarkable authors on physiology in Paris.

"Dogs," he says, "get rid of their parasites by means of dust, mud or wet clay. The swallow will throw one little one out of her nest (if the fledgling be covered with vermin) in order to save the rest

"In the treatment of wounds the knowledge of animals is equally wonderful. "The soldier-ants have regular ambulance-corps, well organized. When Latreille cut off the antennæ of a red ant, other ants came to his assistance, and covered the wounds with a transparent liquid secreted in their mouths.

"A chimpanzee when wounded, first checks the flow of blood by pressing the wound with his hand, and then dresses it with leaves or roots of grass. If the limb of a wounded animal be hanging by a shred the creature completes the amputation wi

"A dog struck by a viper kept plunging his wounded nose for many days into a running stream. He got well. A hunting dog that had been crushed by a carriage dragged himself into a bed of a shallow stream and lay down in the water during three whole weeks—although it was winter. They carried him his food there. He got completely well.

"A terrier-dog that had had a lesion in his right eye hid away from the light and for two days kept licking the sole of his front right paw, and pressing his eye against the cool wet suiface.
