LAREDO, TEX., Dec. 19.—Pablo Quintana, mayor of New Laredo, Mexico, who was arrested in that city last night, was charged with complicity in a train robbery, was released by order of Gen. Gomez. The populace paraded the streets in the interest of Quintana and appointed a committee to wait on Gomez. Though the penalty of the offence charged is death, the release was effected unconditionally, except a promise of the committee to produce Quintana committed in the state of Tamaulipas, and the governor has made a demand for the surrender of three men now imprisoned at Monterrey. There is likely to be a conflict of authority.
