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THE ESTIMATES BROUGHT DOWN YESTERDAY.

A Number of Deputations Wait Upon the Government and Ask for a Variety of Things.—The Printing and Private Mail Committees Hold Their Initial Meetings.

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DENONOUNING THE FAKES.

No Real Danger of Much Suffering in Toronto.—The Hand-Suffering Plan of Giving Attacked.

Rev. John Gillespie, Secretary of the House of Industry, has written to Mayor Kennedy the following sensible letter with respect to the present fake system of indiscriminate almsgiving.

While not wishing to discourage the efforts of these generous citizens who are contributing to the fund of temporary organizations for the relief of the poor, nor to express any opinion upon the effect of indiscriminate almsgiving, it should be distinctly understood that the city should have an open door at the House of Industry and at its various depots for the relief of the poor.

The advantages of distributing relief through this board which includes in its membership Your Worship and the chairman of the Executive Committee of the Council, are:

1. Temporary relief by bread and fuel on applications.

2. Further relief after personal visitation by a duly appointed visitor at the home of the applicant.

3. The work of distribution is accomplished without any charge upon the fund.

4. The relief is given to about 60 districts and a visitor appointed to each; not one really needy person is refused relief.

5. And any contributions sent to the House for the purpose of increasing the grants will be distributed through the different churches, the Ladies' Relief Society, and other agencies, there is no real danger of much suffering in Toronto.

To the same effect. The Chief Commissioner yesterday passed the resolution that in his opinion the Commission the existing institutions are sufficient if adequately supported, whether by private donations or public grants, to meet the present emergency of dealing with the destitute in the city, it being taken for granted that increased energy is absolutely necessary on the part of the institutions dealing with the outdoor relief of the poor.

My policy in this is a farmer's country and we ought to be proud of it. We are gaining the markets of the world in agriculture. Our exports of live stock to England is between seven and eight millions annually; of cheese eleven or twelve millions, and we have created this trade in a few years, too. In Chicago the farmers of Canada fairly swept the board. Surely our policy is a true statement of the farmer's fair claim and his prosperity will be reflected in the prosperity of the rest of the country. What is the key note of my policy? We ought to relieve the farmer from paying high prices for his goods and to give him the cheapest possible transportation for his produce. Free the farmer from the burdens he is bearing. Do away with the combinations which are crushing out the life of the country. Depend on the farmers for the life of the town. Make your farmers happy, prosperous and rich, and the towns will be happy, prosperous and rich, too. Grind down your farmers and you will have the condition of things that exist today. We will have men waiting the street asking for work and begging for bread. Never has Canada been in the condition it is today. There are 6000 men out of work in Ontario, representing 30,000 people. Although the National Policy is not wholly responsible for this state of affairs, it has had some influence upon it. (Applause.)
