

WAS A DOUBLE SUICIDE

Worthless Lives Ended Together on the Roadside.

Dr. Stuart, who was accompanied by a friend, saw the pair, who he thought to be men, lying in great distress. Walking over to them he found they were both unconscious.

NO STATUTE TO CROMWELL

THE IRISH MEMBERS CARE THE LAW.

JUSTICE CHARACTERIZED THE PROPOSAL AS AN INSULT TO IRELAND—MORLEY FOLLOWS WITH AN APOLOGETIC SPEECH—THE GOVERNMENT REPEATED BY 229 TO 83—THE SEALING BILL AGAIN.

London, June 17.—In the House of Commons today Sir Edward Grey, Under-Secretary of State, announced that the Government had decided to repeal the Statute of 1702, which prohibited the importation of Irish linen into Great Britain.

Mr. Morley followed with an apologetic speech, in which he explained the Government's position and stated that the repeal of the statute was a necessary measure to protect the interests of the linen trade in Ireland.

The Government's proposal was met with a storm of protest from the Irish members of the House, who regarded it as an insult to Ireland and a violation of the principles of free trade.

THAT STATEMENT BY WELTER

FALSE ON ITS FACE IT AVAILS HIM NOTHING.

IT CAUSED THE GOVERNMENT-GENERAL TO Delay Signing the Order-in-Council Until Late Last Night—How the Condemned Men Passed Their Last Hours.

St. Thomas, June 17.—Whatever sympathy the public may have heretofore entertained for William Welter, one of the murderers of W. H. Hendershott in Wardell's woods on Dec. 14 last, has been forfeited by the lying statement he made on the eve of his execution, the gist of which was published in this morning's World.

Welter was generally thought that he was the dupe of the elder prisoner, John Hendershott, uncle of the young man who was so ruthlessly slaughtered for greed, and to whose daughter he was engaged to be married.

Notification that Welter's sentence had been commuted was received with satisfaction until that statement was made. Now the universal opinion is that his death is deserved, and that he is equally guilty with his companion.

Mr. Spencer will stay with the prisoners until the fall night. Both are resigned to their fate, though very agitated and crushed in spirit. "Conscience heart" for their aim, as Mr. Spencer puts it, though still protesting innocence of murder. They are not as perturbed as yesterday, and have even their meals on this, their last day, as usual. No one has visited them save the sheriff and his deputy and chaplain.

The scaffold, which was completed Saturday, is a very substantial affair, and is erected at the rear of the jail in what is known as the woman's ward. The platform is eight feet square, and stands seven feet from the wall, and are two trap-doors, fastened by large screws at one side, and these are held in place by two cross-bars of iron, which extend underneath, and are fastened in a staple by a small iron pin. The two pins, or bolts, are attached to an iron lever, which extends three feet above the floor, and when the lever is pulled the bolts are pulled out of place, and the doors drop quickly, followed by the bodies. There are steps to be ascended to reach the scaffold, which are on one side of the door leading from the jail into the yard. The cross-bar upon which the platform has been made, has been made from the platform to the end of the execution is 14 feet. Below the platform all has been enclosed, and when the bodies drop they cannot be afterwards seen by the spectators present. The execution will take place about 9 o'clock.

It was to the effect that the murder had been committed by Welter, and that Hendershott had come upon the scene shortly afterwards, discovered the crime and shot and killed Welter. It was also stated that Hendershott had threatened to kill him if he told what he had seen and knew.

No attention will, of course, be paid to these letters, and the bodies will be interred in the jail yard.

Signed by His Excellency. Not Until Late Last Night Was the Final Order Made.

Ottawa, June 17.—It was not until after 10 o'clock to-night that word was received from Quebec that His Excellency had signed the minutes of council recommending that the law be allowed to take its course. The case of Hendershott and Welter, the formal notification was immediately telegraphed to the Sheriff of Elgin County. The delay in receiving Lord Aberdeen's concurrence in the minutes of the Privy Council was due to the statement of Welter that another party had committed the deed. County Crown Attorney Donohue wired the Minister of Justice that such a statement had been received by him, and like Mr. Donohue, the Minister attached no importance to it. It is currently reported, however, that parties in St. Thomas telegraphed directly to Quebec about the matter, which caused His Excellency to ask for further information from his advisers. Telegrams were passing to and fro between Ottawa and Quebec all day, until finally the Governor-General was satisfied that everything was all right, and the order was signed. It is reported that the name of the individual whom Welter says committed the deed is Wardell.



THE KIEL CANAL.

Warships Gathering for the Opening Ceremonies on Friday—Fears for the Banks Caving In.

Berlin, June 17.—The coming gales at Kiel to celebrate the opening of the Baltic and North Sea Canal are the principal topic of interest at present, all other questions being relegated to the rear for the time being.

The celebration may be said to begin on Friday next, when it is expected that not less than 27,000 sailors will be assembled on the German and foreign warships that are to be present on the occasion.

Several floating postoffices will be among the warships, and a fleet of steam pleasure yachts will be present. The press steamer will not be in the procession, and the newspaper reports have strongly criticized the arrangements made on their behalf.

One of the contracts made with a Hamburg firm for providing the foreign crews calls for 2 daily supply of 14 tons of fresh meat, 2000 bottles of wine, 2000 bottles of spirits, 10,000 bottles of beer, and 6000 gallons of beer in barrels and 2000 gallons of milk.

Several regular ratlines are also in operation, and Sir Donald Currie, with Mr. Gladstone on board, gave a dinner on his steamer on Friday night when a land parade, which took place on Saturday, was held in honor of the Kaiser.

French and German fleets will meet off the southern coast of Denmark and go to Kiel together.

Out of Sofia. Symptoms, Headache, loss of appetite, tired tongue and general disposition. These symptoms, if neglected, develop into a land parade. The Kaiser's visit to Kiel is a civil holiday. The canal joins the Hudson and East Rivers and shortens the route from the Hudson to the sea by 12 miles. It is six miles long, five feet deep and fifty wide. Eveningly it will be widened to 350 feet and deepened to 18. It cost \$2,500,000.

Paris, June 17.—It is reported that the French and German fleets will meet off the southern coast of Denmark and go to Kiel together.


