Tariff Changes.

There are several slight changes in the tariff made last week which affect the people in this vicinity.

Oranges and lemons formerly paid a small duty—25c a box—and will now come in free.

Market gardeners who have complained of the competition of American vegetables.

Market gardeners who have complained of the competition of American vegetables will be gratified with an increase of 5 per cent. duty upon such vegetables as onions, cabbage, beans, etc. Potatoes pay 15c per bushel duty as before. Melons formerly paid 25 per cent. duty; in future they will pay 3c a piece advalorem. A basket of muskmelons which used to pay ten cents duty will now pay sixty cents, and those who are tond of the delicacy will have to pay higher prices or wait until the Canadian musks ripen. Watermelons pay 3c apiece also, but the duty does not appear so high on a 25c watermelon as on an 8c muskmelon. The trade in early vegetables will be affected, and also in fancy groceries. Dates now pay a specific duty instead of ad valorem. ad valorem.

Perfumes and drugs are increased some-what, also leather goods, purses, etc., so that Christmas novelties will be higher. The placing of gasoline on the iree list is one of the most important changes, as most of the gasoline used in Canada is produced at the Imperial Oil Works in Sarnia. The change will not affect the output of gasoline, and the management have not yet come to a decision as to a change in the price. Inquiry at the

change in the price. Inquiry at the local hardware stores brought out the fact that the price of gasoline has not yet been reduced at the hardware stores in Sarnia, on account of a shortage of sup-ply on the American side, which makes it impossible to secure a supply conven-iently. At present the price in Port Huron is several cents lower than in Sar-nia, although there is no duty.

Water Glass for Preserving.

For years Supt. Graham of the poul try Department of the O. A. C. has ad vised the use of water glass as a means of preserving eggs. Comparatively few far-mers have adopted this method, but among Guelph housekeepers, the practice is common. One lady there puts down her egg supply for the year in April, when she can get two dozen for a quarter, and the eggs come out in per-fect condition a year later. "I would never think of using salt again," said another.

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


