

General News.

There are 115 cholera patients in the hospital at London. At Montreal there is a better outlook than for the past few days. The sanitary condition of Paris is excellent.

Railway, was arrested, having been detected in robbing letters and forgery. He was released on bail of \$2,000, which he succeeded in obtaining.

The correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says the conference has given a favorable reception to England's financial proposals regarding Egypt. It is expected that the deliberations of the conference will reach a successful result. Earl Granville, foreign secretary of state, on Saturday received a despatch from Gen. Gordon giving assurance of his health and position of Kings College, and to solicit a subscription for the maintenance of a Professor of Divinity. The motion was finally withdrawn.

A motion was passed to enable any parish in the diocese to hold its regular session in its parish, if suitable accommodation could be furnished. The Synod reserves the right to accept or decline the invitation. Windsor and Charlotteville delegates each promised accommodation in their respective parishes.

The report of the W. & O. Committee shows that owing to a lack of funds the amount of allowance to the widows of the clergy had to be considerably reduced.

Rev. W. H. Snyder, of Malone Bay, was appointed rural dean of Lunenburg, in place of Rev. Dr. Owen, deceased.

His Lordship recommended that a Canon be adopted admitting women to the office of the Church. The canon was adopted.

A committee was appointed to take into consideration the advisability of shortening the church service.

Resolutions of sympathy were passed on the funeral of the Rev. H. L. Owen, by the Rev. J. T. Moody, Rev. G. E. T. Morris and Hon. Arthur M. C. Cochrane who died during the past year.

Resolutions of congratulation and thanks were passed to the Rev. Mr. Brown late editor of the Charlotteville Standard, and to hope he may soon be restored to health. His Lordship in supporting the resolution spoke of the trial as being the most successful church paper ever run in the Maritime Provinces.

Synod closed on Friday afternoon.

Terrible Shipwreck. The wreck of the schooner L. & W. E. Block, which was on the coast of Nova Scotia, was reported yesterday, was one of the most disastrous disasters in our history for many years.

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The Anglican Synod.

The Synod of the Diocese of Nova Scotia held its annual session in Halifax on the 27th inst. A large number of clerical and lay delegates were present.

Rev. Dr. Partridge was elected secretary in place of Rev. J. D. H. Brown, who has left Halifax through illness.

His Lordship the Bishop, in his opening address, said that since the last meeting he had ordained 14 deacons, 11 priests, and received 3 priests from other parishes and confirmed 2,459 people—574 males and 1,885 females.

Referring hopefully to King's College, he said that \$25,000 had already been received. He referred to some changes now under consideration in the Divinity students' educational course in the College; said that there should be more definite preparation than at present. Mission work was dealt upon at some length, and earnestly urged upon the attention of the Synod.

Lordship's charge to the clergy was the most able one, and was listened to with the greatest attention. A resolution was passed to the effect that the Synod should be held in the Diocese of Nova Scotia, near Guys, a report that an Italian family which had been in London, had been lodged in a disused convent, and had been converted to the Catholic faith. Church dues were to be increased monthly, and the names of persons arrested with guns, knives and sticks, and toward the church, and were to be reported to the authorities.—Cable to New York papers.

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The Cholera Plague in Toulon.

The cholera outbreak produces effects as tragic and sometimes as comical as were ever described in any account in history or fiction of the plague since almost 400 years ago. Toulon is almost deserted. Out of 60,000 taxpayers, 40,000 have fled. The many who remain are the marines, for when the admiral allowed them to leave on good cause shows, every marine produced a cholera case. Labor is suspended, commercial intercourse cannot be maintained, and the supply of provisions has almost stopped. The laboring people have no money to buy. All this tends to enormously increase the plague. The refugees usually occupy houses in the suburbs, utterly unfit for habitation, and the cholera spreads to wash the lines of hospital patients, the work done by prisoners and inmates of pardon. Some families have in their flight, left their belongings and securities in the hands of the cholera-stricken. The cholera is to keep off thieves from the plentiful harvest around.
