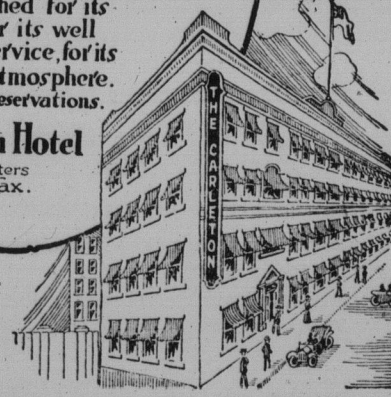

With reference to the amount of Thirty Dollars to be refunded to D. M. Charlton. The Committee has investigated this matter and found that Mr. Charlton on May 20th, 1924, suffered a severe loss by fire which necessitated the reduction of an assessment on his property of \$1500. The Committee thereby recommend the sum above mentioned to be refunded. This amount is made up by the current rate for the 1924 assessment.

The Committee further recommend that action be taken by the Council to guard in future against the appearance of the Rate Rolls of uncollectable poll taxes, thereby causing a loss to the Municipality of quite a material amount. On every uncollectable poll tax a loss of three dollars is sustained and on every poll tax uncollectable for persons over sixty years of age a loss of one dollar.

From the reports of the Tax Collectors this year the following has been compiled:

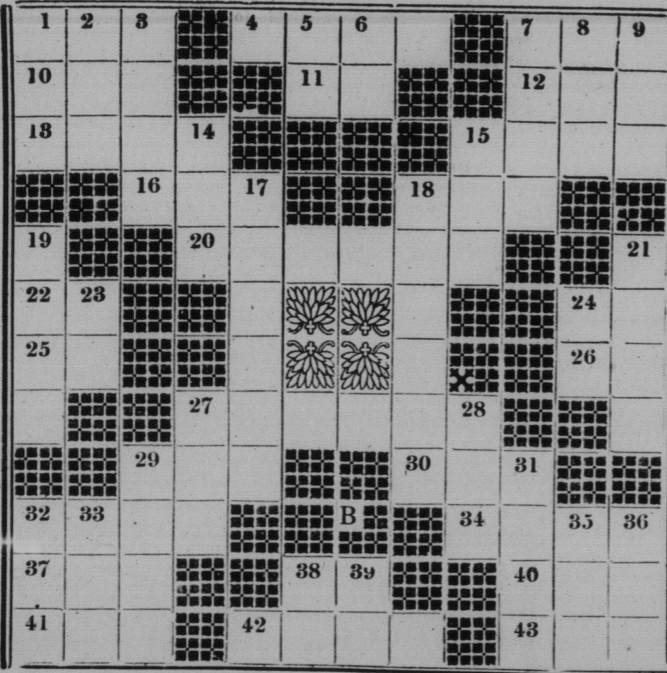
