Ross \& Co., under the section above mentioned, asking for Webster's imprisonment, and the Judge presiding at the trial ordered that Webster be imprisoned for one month unless the debt and costs be paid forthwith.

## INSOLVENT ESTATES.

An article which recently appeared in the Glasgow Neis on the Bankruptcy question in Canada has been reprinted in several Canadian newspapers, and has been noticed at some length by the Mon. treal Gazette. The Glasgow News, while admitting the many imperfections of the bankruptcy laws in the United Kingdom, entertains no doubt that even a defective law is better than none, and such is the opinion of many among our own commercial men. The writer in the Glasgow News has evidently taken some pains to make himself acquainted with the laws in
our various Provinces, and his opinion is that no provision exists in the Dominion of Canada for the equitable distribution of bankrupt estates. There has been a general impression that the state of the law in the Province of Quebec, which is governed by the Civil Code of Lower Canada, is more satisfactory than it is in the other Provinces. Such is not the opinion of the writer in the Glasgow News, who affirms that, when a debtor is insolvent, a bailif's sale at 7 o'clock in the morning, an occurrence neither unusual nor illegal, has the effect of transferring all his property to another, It is said to be useless to complain of the price, as it is not the bailif's business to find an rudience. Such a sale takes place without notice to creditors, beyond what a single announcement in an obscure newspaper may convey, and in a majority of cases it is believed that it is only known to the judgment creditor, who of course in cases of fraud is selected by the debtor. It is said that in practice the costs attondant on the filing of the claims of all the creditors are so large that, when added to the Court fees, the whole amount realized is frequently absorbed without yielding any return whatever to the creditors. No provision exists for the examination of a debtor as to his estate and effects, or as to the disposition that he has made of his assets. The law in Ontario is said to be very little better for the creditor, as priority of execution still prevails there, and it is not difficult for a fraudulent debtor to give preferences. Ir the other Provinces creditors are equally at the mercy of debtors, and in conclusion the writer expresses a hope that public opinion will be brought to bear on the administration, sons to compel it to undo the injury that has been done, although the writer acknowledges that " the general character of Canadian home and foreign commercial policy is hardly favorable to that hope."

Our contemporary has criticized the article in the Glasgow paper with great fairness. He commences by vinclicating the lawyers from the charge of having suggested the repeal of the insolvency law from interested motives, and he states with perfect truth that there was a strong public sentiment in favor of the the mensure adopted by Parliament. We think that the Gazette is inclined to attribute the great losses that have been sustained too much to the reckless action of the wholesale merchants, and to their indifference to the proper administration of the law. It ought to be constantly borne in mind that, as a rule, the retail traders in Canada are not possessed
of large capitals, and great allowance should be made for the adverse circumstances which during the last few years brought ruin to many an honest and prudent man. It is a well established fact Lhat,owing to causes over which the people of Canada hat no control, there was a great inflation in the value of goods of every description a few yeurs ago, which continued for at least three or four years, during which the stocks of all the retail merchnnts in the country were replenished at the current inflated prices. Then followed a reaction and a material fall in prices, the effect of which was to reduce the value of the assets of our merchants to such an extent as in many cases to force them into insolvency. We do not think that sufficient allowance has been made for a depression in prices, which could not have been foreseen or guarded against by the retail merchants. It is, therefore, in our humble judgment an exaggeration to state that " men went into business with " the insolvency law as their chief capital. "They bought largely and sold recklessly, "and when the day of reckoning came " they simply went to their creditors, and "in about- eight cases out of ten they ob. " tained a composition at from 25 to 50 " cents on the dollar, the creditors actually " selling them another bill of goods on the " same day that they signed the composi"tion." We believe that, if such cases really occurred, the creditors were convinced, from a knowledge of circumstances, that the debtors were more unfortunate than criminal, and that the composition was entered into from $a$ conviction that they would yealize more out of the insolvent estate by the mode adopted than by placing it in the hands of an assignee. Sufficient allowance has not been made in considering this question for uncontrolable circumstances. The difficulty that presents itself is to frame a law that will guard ngainst cases of fraud, without pressing too harshly on the honest but unfortunate debtor.

It is suggested by the Gazette that a Iaw for the equitable distribution of estates is all that is at presentrequired, and that the debtors may be left to their fate. Now it must be borne in mind that if the body of creditors choose at any time to enter into a composition with an insolvent to accept 50 or 25 cents in the dollar, and to give him a discharge, there is nothing in the lav to prevent their doing so. It almost invariably happens, however, that some one or two creditors will refuse to concur with the majority in accepting a composition no matter how reasonable it may be, and hence it has been necessary to dispose of the inaolvent's estate through
an assignee. The main dificulties have not been in the discharge of the insolvent. We own that, in view of the facility that frauduleat debtors have in transforring their assets or a large portion of them with their persons to a foreign land, we doubt the practicability of enforcing a very severe law, and we should apprehend that its effect might be to induce men inclined to be honest to resort to practices which have long been followed by the fraudulent. At the same time we should see no great objection to the Gazette's suggestion that the two subjects should be kept completely distinet, and that the lav should provide simply for the equitable distribution of the estates of insolrents, were it not that such a measure would seem to preclude the possibility of a composition with the debtor unless there was an unanimous concurrence on the part of the creditors. The Grazettc seems to rely on the Council of the Board of 'Irade of this city for the preparation of a law, and this leads us to notice a passage in the article in the flasgow Nows which is very severe on the members of the Government, and not, we regret to observe, without cause. 'Che question of dealing with insolvent estates is one on which the Government ought to have a policy, and to maintain it as a unit. Instead of being prepared with any measure of their own, they have allowed private members to propose legislation, and they have been divided in opinion as to the mode of dealing with the bills introduced by those members. In England the various bankruptey measures have been invariably brought forward on the responsibility of the Government, and a similar course should be followed here. It is doubtless very convenient for a Government to have open questions, but if the public interests require that a measure should be adopted for the equitable distribution of insolvent estates, most assuredly it is only reasonable to expect that it will be brought forward on the responsibility of the Government.

## WHAT IS MONEY?

Such is the title of an article contributed to the Canadian. Monthly by Mr. G. Manigault of London, Ont. The writer is perfectly sound on what we admit to be the essential point in controversy, viz.: the convertibility into gold on demand of all notes constituting the circulating medium of the country, whether issued by the Government or by banks. He is, however, strangely inconsistent. He sdmits that " the country which enjoys the soundest currency at this day and for years back is England ; "and
we entirely concur with him in that opinion veydye proceds to declare that "the Ctovernment issues no paper money," and that "the Govarnment is not responsible for the debts of this great "Banking Company' (the Bink of England). Wo are indined to donbt whether the writer clearly comprehends the relations which subsist between the Government and the Bank of England. The great corporation in question is a Joint Stock Bauk like all similur institutions, although it is fiscal agent for the Government, paying the interest on the public debt, and being custodian of the pubilic revenues. Of course the Government has nothing whatever to do with this branch of the business outsite of its relations as a valuable customer of the Bank. It is, however, as an issuer of paper money that Mr. Manigault has brougit the Bank into the discussion, and he admits that the currency which it supplies is the soundest in the world. That currency is to all intents and purposes a Government currency, precisely us if it was issued direct by the Treasury. The issues are regulated by Act of Parliament, and are strictly automatic. Every note issued by the Bank of Englan! must be represented by Government securities or gold. If by any possibility the stock of gold held by the Bank of Issue could be exhausted, the Govermment debt to the Bank, and the Government securities held by it, could be available, and the holders of notes could only suffer loss in the event of the insolvency of the nation.

The writer in the Canadian Monlhly fell into a very prevalent error when he affirmed that " no people can safely con. fide in a currency of promises to pay on demand issued by the Government." If he had stated that unless a currency issued by the Grovernment were so regulated by Partiament as to ensure its convertibility, we should not have been inclined to take exception to his statement, but he infers that because during periods of civil war or revolution Governments have felt it necessary to issue inconverti. ble paper money, it follows necessarily that all Government issues must be unsafe. If the Government of Canadia were to come to an arrangement tomorrow with the Bank of Montreal uncler which the Bank would issue a fixed amount designated by Parliament, on the security of precisely the same description of debentures as are now held for the security of the Dominion issues, all further issues to be in gold alone, we should like the writer in the Canadian Monthly to point out wherein such notes rould uifier frome those issued by the

Dominion directly. Another fallacy of Mr. Manigault is in imagining that there is any special advantage in issuing large notes. The idea is to provide a larger metallic circulation, in other words to puti the country to a greater expense. The chief object of using bank notes is to economize the use of coin, and, if proper care be taken to ensure the convertibility. of the notes, there is no object whatever in prohibiting the circulation of emall notes. Mr. Manigault has, we admit, done good service by exposing the fallacies of the idvocates of fiat money.

## THE NAIL TRADE.

The boom in iron and hardware which began about a yearago and lasted through the greater part of the winter was looked unon at the time as merely the beginning of the recovery from the dull prices of the preceding five or six yoars, and so sudden and persistent was the advanoe in values on both sides of the Atlantic, that many in the trade fully expected that prices would keep on rising till they reached the level of 1872 . A mong those merchants who burned with high hope as to the future of the nail trade was a certain Montreal jobber, well known to the trade, who determiner to contract with the manufacturers for many thousands of kege, on which he evidently promised himself a fortunate reault. What if they were to advance $\$ 2 a \mathrm{keg}$ ! Appearances favored the idea. In fact he was determined to bull the market for nails.

The manufacturers did not enter into his plans, and, luckily for him, they did not. But he was determined not to be baulked; he would make the Combination sutler. He determined to manufacture the goods himself, and for that purpose engaged machinery and laid in a large stock of Nova Scotia iron and other materials. His emissaries were soon to be seon in the offices of jobbers far and near, arranging for future competition with the "combination." But no sooner had winter begin to relax its grip "o'or Camadian woods and lakes" than iron began to solten also-in price, and in a few weeks the Alladin's palace of many a harchware merchant on both sides of the Atlantic disappeared more rapidly than the beautiful snow. Our energetic jobbing manufacturer, among others, found himself in an awkward predicament, and the easiest way out appeared to be to cut under. His agents were instructed to agree to sell ten cents per keg below the price lists of the regular manufacturers, whatever their figures might be. Thus was declared war to the point of the nail,
and the three leading.manufacturers soon found themselves likely to lose their customers, or be obliged to sell at or helow cost. The trade was getting demoralized.

It is well known that profits on nails have been getting less and less for several years, until at last they have become like sugar to the grocer,-kept merely to accommodate the retailer's customers. With ten cents per keg off the manufacturers' wholesale prices there was still litile inducement to handle nails, and even when the calpenter or farmer wanted some nails he usually emulnyed the village storekeeper to bring him a keg from town, allowing him 25 cents for his trouble. The manufacturers, like large bodies generally, were slow to move, and the regular monthly meetings one after another brought no satisfactory solution of the difficulty. Towards the beginning of the present month, however, they roused themselves from their lethargy. They determined, notwithstanding the inopportune season to adopt a sauve qui peut (devil take the hindmost) policy, and accordingly down went the price of nails nearly fifteen per cent. all round, as may be seen on reference to our prices current. How long this condition of things will last it is dificult to forecast, but there is more likely to be a further reduction than any material rise. The increased uses for steel for rails, ship-building, etc., and its great power of endurance will probably have some effect on values. At any rate it is not probable that the energetic jobber who has been rasping the manufacturers of late will care to continue his policy of selling ten cents per keg lower than the regular prices adopted by the latter. Discounts for round lots are also demoralized, and a dealer can now buy a single keg as cheap as he can by the thousand. There is no doubt, however, that the recent reduction is in some measure due to the decline in iron, and one or two persons interested assign this as the chief cause.

We have been asked more than once to explain the change in the nomenclature of the different sizes of nails, which many smaller dealers find rather con. fusing when ordering goods. The following table, giving the corresponding brands and lengths, may be found of service in this respect :

The terms " 2 penny" " 21 penny," ©c., old style brand, corresponding with "3 penny," "4 penny," (E., new style, are but little used in the West, the length being designated instead. 'The former practice is said to have arisen from a corruption of the word "pound;" thus a fourpenny nail was formerly one of which one thousand would weigh four pounds; a thousand tenpenny nails would weigh ten pounds, and so on. We shall adopt the Measure plan in future in our quotations. The change, as shown in the foregoing table, was adopted by the manufacturers here to conform to the proportions employed in the United States, and for the purpose of avoiding confusion in any possible comparison of prices.

The so-called "combination" of nail manufacturers in this city is composed of three large and wealthy establishments, employing altogether not much less than 1,000 hands. Some three or four of the leading wholesale hardware firms also manufacture a great part of the nails required for their trade, buying the iron themselves and employing the manufacturers to cat it at so much per hundred. Apart from the idea of any monopoly, of which there can scarcely exist a shadow, it is of importance to the trade to have :ome fixed rate of prices, whether it be a fair legitimate figure, or fall into either extreme, and in this respect, apart from giving employment to a large number of consumers, the combination has doubtless been productive of benefit to the trade. The improvements in labor-saving machinery render it difficult now-a-days to maintain prices beyond a minimum profit rate.

## DUUUMENTS DATED ON SUNDAY.

We have had several letters of inquiry on this sulject lately, reference being made to an article recently pablished in a Toronto contemporary. According to the Provincial statute, cap. 104, an Act to prevent the profanation of the Lord's Day in Upper Canada, sec. 8 , "atl sales and purchases, and all contracts and agreements for sale or purchase, of any real or personal property whatsover, made by any person or persons on the Eord's Day, slall be utterly null and void." Reference is made to 8

Vic. cap. 45, sec. 2, of which the foregoing is merely a repetition.
At first sight the section quoted seems to provide for all contracts, withoat exception. A reference to the ease of Wilt ms. Lai, sen., und Lai, jr., U. C. Queen's Bench, Hihury Term, 13 Yie, which still remains unamulhed, will show that the giving or taking in security o: a Sunday is not void as a buying or selling within the statute 8 V. c. 45, s. 3. The decistion arose out of a case of Trespass-quare chausumfregit. First comit, entering and expeling phaintif; second comut, breaking and entering, cuttiag and taking away, grass, wheat, ic. Pleas. lat not guily; 2nul, that the cluse was not phintills,-nor the griss, corn, \&e.; 3rd, that the close was the frechold of the defendant, Lai, sen., wherefore he aud the other defendat entered, ise. Yerdict for phatatir on lst and 3 nd issues. Daumges assessed for certuin hall wheat taken by defendats $\pm 3 \overline{5}$, nad for residue of erops laken $\mathcal{f} 3 \overline{5}$; and for defentants on sad issue. It was by consent reserved at the trin as a ghestion whether, upon the evidence, the phianiff was entited to recover in respect to the fall wheat; if not the f35 wats to be disallowed, and the plantill was to enter up julgment valy tor the residue of the damages fund.
The question depended unon whether the bills of sale made by the platintiif to the elder Lai, of the crops on the ground (which included the wheat in guestion) was not void under the Statute 8 V., c. 45 , s. 2 , being made on a Sunday, as proved to be, and being not a transfer by way of absolute sale, but a mortgage to secure the payment of a certain sum of money due by phantif to hai, and so expressed to be made in writing.
O. J. Robinzon delivered judgment, intimating that the probation in the second clanse of the statute guoted did not extend to the ease of a mortgage, bilt only to the stle in the common aceephation of the term. The point was whether the transaction came within the statute, and was therefore roid as it must be if it came within the word sate or purchase. The giving or taking of secmerty mpon a Sunday, however opposed it may be to the spirit of the law, is nevertheless not illegal. A mortgige does not come within the meaning of the words "sate" or "purchase" in the second clatuse of the Act, unless the same comprelensive construction could be given to tho same words as used in the 3rd clanse. The verdict was rendered accordingly excluding the palne of the fall whent, which was held to have phased to Lat in security fur his debt; but not as a sale.

It was admitted at the meeting in June, 1879, that the :thitirs of the Bank were not in a satisfactory state. "the Board then elected apnears to have exercise 1 great care that matters should not get any wors:. The issets were carefully watehed, inat evary exertion mate to have them put into at g on shat en a possible. The fandun Branch was clased ; the Board's remmaration stopped, and the Stidf and expe:tses otherwise rednest, lut, with capita! and credit almost gome, new business could neither be obtutined nor undertaken, and the charges of manarement overiapped the profits mule. The most that contd be hopel for was the hiquidiation of the ifabilities when demmend, and this
has been done to the extent of half a million dollars, although payment of the eirbth call had to be asked for in order to accomplish this, and, if some had not responded even before the time of payment, it is questionable if the Bank wond not have had to close its doors.

During the seven weeks your present Directors have been in ollice they have not been idle. On entering on their duties they at once took charge of the cash and securities, and destroyed $\$ 340,000$ of the Bank's notes found on hand, made a thorough examination of the books and assets, and endeavored to siscertain the true position of the Bunk and its aftairs. In order to put all the Stockholders in the same position, and to give no one catase for complaint if his stock were written off, in the erent of his finilure to respond, your Directors feel it dutiful to call on all the Shateholders who had not done so, to pay up the 80 pet cent. of their Stock.
The every-day businesis of the Bank is reduced to very small dimensions, but your Directors hare found the overdue debts and locked up amounts to be hearr, and, on secount of their present inconvertible nature, almost impossible to value. These form. to a large extent, either claims agniost Mr. James Domrille, or companies with which he is connected. With the view of bringing these matters to an issue, legal proceedings bave recentiy been instituted.

## MONIREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS

Thunsbay, Oct, 14th; 1880.
Although there is a fair movement in the aggregrate, it is quite appurent that trade here is cunsiderably less act:ve than in the recent gast. A shrinkrge, bowever, is always expected about this: time of year, and it will soon be in order now for out merchants, and the newspmpers in turn, to take a retrospective glance at the season's operations, with a view to a comparison with previous corresponding periods. Wo believe thero is ulready abund.
ant evidence that this comparison will prove favorable in every res pect. As we have preriously remarked, one of the leading and most gratifying features of the present season's trade is the almost total absence of the purely speculative element, which has worked such disastrons results in previous years, and the consequence is that, with a ctendy legitimate demand for all leading staples, there is no unusual variation in values, and business is being conducted upon a much sounder, safer basis, mad, therefore, at greater profits, in the long ran. The late cheap, excursions to the city also proved a great lever in mising the activity of the fill trade to a height never before reachod in many departments, and should be repeated to a still greater extent next year. As the close of mavigution approaches, the movement of sorting-up purchases to conntry merchants is gradunlly becoming brisk, to avoid the inevituible adrance in railway treights. The receipls of Montreal harbor for this season, ip to date, show an increase of about $\$ 60,000$ as compared with the like period ol last yem, and the total amount of shipping shows no increase over lasi yen of about 130,600 tons. The continned ense of the moncy market jerhaps affords some ground for contidence in the stability of vilues, but the equal abundane of nearly all the commodities represented by money is a ginrantee that the geaeral public with not likely be severely taxed for the necessaries of life. The movement of grain and general produce has stmmatated some enquiry for advances, but the demand from commercinl borrowers contintes light, in proportion to the supply of lonnable funds. Goorl commercial paper is readily discounted at 6 to 7 per cent., as to name and date. Call and shor ${ }^{2}$ dated loans on good collaterals are oblamable at 3 to 4 , and time loans at 4 to 5 per cent. Sterling exchange rules quiet; the demand is good, but there is rery little offering, and mites are advancing, now quoted at $8 \frac{8}{8}$ to $8 \frac{x}{2}$ prem. for round amounts between banks, und $8 \frac{8}{8}$ do over the counter. Gold drafts on New York are also in good demand, with little offering; they are drawn at $\frac{1}{s}$ pren. Proluce bills are quoted at $7 \frac{3}{4}$ to $7 \frac{5}{5}$ prem. Stocks, after ruling quiet for several dhys, became more active on $r$ declining market on Tuesday inst, and have continued so up to time of our going to press. The majority of investors bave been selling out, but this morning a clique of speculators succeeded in advancing ralues for leading securities from 2 to 3 per cent., on the streagth of a report that the English and French bankers connected with the U. P. R. R. Syndicate had arrived in town, and would proceed to Ottawa tomorrow (Friday) to finally close the great contract. Whe advance was not maintained at the uflernoon Board, bowever, Montreal Bank selling down to $15 \frac{2}{2}$; Ontario at 85 ; and Merchnnts at 106. Montreal Telegraph closed at 128 a bid. Exchange Bank has sold during this week at 55, and yesterday at 54. The recorded sales on the Stock Exchange to-day were : Morning Board-78. Boots and Shors - The demand for heary bouts continues brisk, and wath rongher, colder werther will likely increase. One or two houses report that they are still very busy on September orders; another honse will be kent, busy for a month to come on letter orders in hatid, chietty from the "Old Country" Travellers are now startiug ont on their Fall sortingup trip, which is rapected to result well. several harge manufacturers complain of a scarcity of labor in the market; thm, since the cxodus of artisans of all chaseses last spriag shoematers are not easily ohtained by any means, important positions haviag to rematis unfilied for weeks, in some houses. One of these dealers remarked the other chay that for the first time in a long experience be camant now make all the groods he wants. It wonld not be difficult perhans to indace many of the eraft who left bere inst Spring to veturn. Une large nambucturing firm report that they have already refused orders tor Spring goods, at present prices, becan-e, with the increased cost of the raw waterina, they do not attord a reasomable profit. This has the riglit ring about it, and it otbers in the trade would have been ndvised, and had refueed orders at nonpayitg prices, instead of selling goods at below cost, they would not be in the position they are to-day. A few weeks ago the failure of a well-known boot and shoe firm here evoked sereral artiches, and pointed comments in the Jothnal on the ruinous practice of cutting prices, and it will be remembered that wo predieted the speedy downfall ot other weak concerns doing business on the same plan; this mediction is being fulfilled, the latest example being the falure of Messrs. Canon \& West. It is hoped that the greatest effect of this last failure will be to make leather dealers more cautious in granting eredit. Prices for all kinds of goods remain firm and unchanged; and remittances are uniformly prompt and satisfactory.

Oatrle.-The market on Mondiy last was better attended than in the previous week, and consequently good cattle were held at an advance. The market notobeing over-stocked, ready sales were effected at prices ranging from 4de to $5 d \mathrm{c}$ for choice shipping, and butchers paid from 4 c to $4 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$ for good beasts. As the demand is kerping fim, we expect ere long prices will again retain their former figure, which will result in the shipping of numbers of lots thint bave been bonght up during the past month by county dealers, and which are now being held, Taiting an adrance. Prices of hogs have also improred, sales during the week being at the rate of from 5 Ac to 61 c per lb . Reports from Anampolis, N. S., state that the hay
crop being light, as in former years, farmers ars fattening their stock and solling off as fust an possible, therefore depriving themselves of the means to improve the quinity of their stock. To-day's cattle matket was faibly ntteoded, and a few elluice bensts brought as high as ode por 1b., but this is an exceptional figno, the butk of ibe transitctions being from 3 fe to ja per lb

Dutgs asd Cimmiatis.-There is nu new fenture in the condition of things in this line calling for marticular renark. Business continues netive with a stendy demand for all staple goods, prices being fully mantained for heary chemicals. In the Euglish maticets considerabla dulness exitts, with somewhith lower figures pravailing for Soda Ash, but onlers to nay extent coming in would at once stiflen the murket.

Dex Goods.-There is but one report given by all oue latge deters, in answer to the nsual enguiries,-that trade for the past week has beea wather quict, ns is usual at this timo of year. There have been a few huyers in the matket from the districts of Ottawa sud Pembroke, also trom the Enstern 'Townships, and they all remort trade so firy quile satisfactory, with bright prospects. as intimated slightily in ndvance in our hast report, the Montreal travelless are nows all ont, and already a few sort-ing-up ordera have been received-froms them, sufficieut to ketp houses here busy. Country merchants have not, as a rale, yet bought coniplete stocks of woollen groots, for the winter trade, hat now that the famers have been generally successful will their ceops, at market, it is believed that, if the weather is at all favorable, a splendid sorting-up business will bs done in heary winter-wear here daring this and next month. The leading houses are now preparing for their buyers'semi-anmanl trip to England. During the week there hus been a fatir demand for zorting-up parcels experieneed from the eity retail trade, who have been kept tolerably bisy, but who complain somewhat of the recent fine, mild weather having caused a fultingoff in parchases of winter goods. Payments are uniformly reported very fair, indeen.

Damm Produce.-The butler markei rules quict, with prices about steady. There has been some business doing during the week in the choicest grades, and considemble accumulation. of all but the choicest. Where is a good demand from shippers for the very choicest yuality, but for other kinds buyers refuse to mame prices, and why? Because the latest mail and cable advices report that only the every finest butler, proyectly fresh, is saleable in the Englisli markets ; medium is unsulable, and common is "sick." Thase grades are being rapidhy superseded by butterine in the Einglish markets, and it is expected that it will soon take their place herealso. Liverpool dealers complain loudty. of the inferior condition of late shipments of Canadian butter to that market, and stock: there are rapid!y accumulating becanse the butter is unateable excent at concessions which would inflict heavy losses torshippers. Much of the stufturiving lately, it is said, has gone into store instead of consumption. Some of our local dealers complain of the defective quality of creamery butter received here recently. Factory men have apparently been bolding back their stocks for speculation in bigher prices, and now shippers pronounce their offerings very much of in flavor, and in some isolated cases no better than Kamonraska. It appears quite clear that if harmers and all others who have been speculating and lolding bark newly-made butter woild serve their own interests and avoid a blockade and serions downfall in prices, they mist commence to market all their butter while it is fresh and sweet. Round lots of creamery are reportad to have sold here during the weck at 27 c ., nnd one factory received 268 c for its late makes and balance of ssason. No sales have been reported within the past two days, although fine fresh duiry grades would reudily command outside
prices. It is sad that there are $20,000 \mathrm{Ibs}$. of butter at Usgoode station, Unt, awniting ship)ment to this city, the prices mid having been from 18c to 22 c . In New York dealers are somewhat more cheerfin this week, and renerally report an incrense of lusiness. Priers rule about steady, on both jobbing and wholesale phrcels, with the choice, and fancy grades held tirmly. Shippers, however, are amber protract ing negotiations, with a view to securing beetir terms. Cheese reminns quiet ind stefily, in both the local and New York markets, especially for the finest stock. In England the market continues to advance, the public citble being quoted to duy at Gibs. 6 d . There have been no recent sales reported in this market; but finest qualities are guoted at lat c. to lice, and mediam at Hide. to let e. At lugersoll on Tuesdiy last 16 fitcories viferer 15, ino boxes; one fatctory sold August at 123c., and bulance of the season at 13c.
Fuurs.-business has been considerably less active than during the previous week, buyers and sellers of Aphles being now somewhat apart in their viaws. The arrivals this week have been compmatioely light, and winter truit is reported mother slow of sale in his marke. A number of huleters have bee: forwardiar shimments of winter frut on consigument to Liverpool, Loudon, and Glasrow, weferving to liake the risk rather thas aceeph the mices generally ollered here, viz, from $\$ 1.70$ to $\$ 1.80$. Sales of round fots of assorted winter npples, satd to-have heen made on Tuesday hat, are reported, however, at S1.75 and Fis. There ate very few, if any, Fall Apples in the muket at time or writing, therefore quotations are only nominal ; the last
tes reported were at from St. 5 5 to 51.50 according to quality, but it is donthtul if any could now be had at the inside quotation. Thit shipments of Apples from this port to Great Britilin so far this season have been anprecedentedly large, comprising 30,357 barrels, agtiast mil up to the corresponding date of last year. last week the shipments momonten to nearly 19,000 burrels, but receipts this week have been checked by the dilficulty in obtaining a suticient number of ears in some parts of Western Ontirio. The latest mail advies from Liverpon report the market there at trifle lower, with increased supplies. The demand, however, contimued active for Buldwins, Kings Spys, Blush; Pippins. etc., at firm prices, but othri Kinds were easier. Camadian Famense sold in Liverponl at 17 s $3 i l$ to 175 9d, and other kinds at from lis git to 20 s pire barrel The senson is now over tor l'ears. The demand for Malaga lemons is fair, and prices rale at $\$ 4.50$ to 85 per box. Aimeria Grapes aro also in fair request, not are selling at Sis to $\$ 0.50$ pre barrel of about 45 lhs. Cirtuberries lave been amiving in lavere quatities. and the range of prices quoted for large barcels is from $\$ 7 \mathrm{~m} \$ 8$.

Funs-There isbut litud to report in addition to what lazs already been published in these columns. The manufacturers continue quite busy on orders, and will experience difliealty in mecting the demands of the conntry, for want of skilled latbor. All the common grades of manufactured furs are gradually stilleniar in values, owing to the advance in Burope, where there is some prospect of a still furmer rise in prices. The next sale of far seal will take pate in London on the e6ith inst., and will comprise 75,000 Alaska, and 10,000 Lobos fishad. Latest repnots received here from the large European dealers slate that a further advance on the alrealy very high price of this article is confidently expected. Persia: lamb, whech is being extensively used here this spason, will aiso be adeanced, owing to the ligher nrices in Rassia. The Buttalo tobe trade rales very quict, awing to the great cost of the article, and no movement is expected untilafter the arrival of "Jack Frost:" No raw fius, to speak of, we expected in the market until some time next moath; so that any attempl at quotations now would be purely speculative and unreliable,-the demand
being eatirely local for the first thirty days. It is expected that prices will generally rule low, however, and muskrals will inkely muet with a very small demand.
Fanigits.-The matket remins firm, under a tolemably good demand, but any contrats made or business doing now is for November shipments, as the tomatge for all the gratin being forwarded at present hiss been contracted for last month. d houdon vessel was earaged yesterday it 'ss: 3!, for leavy grain, forwad shipment. For henvy grain to Bristol tis. 3l. is asked, and to Glisiguw ins., but there has baen nothing done for these ports yet this week. The western markets, Uhiengo and Toronto, have evincerd signs of weakness during the week, but there is no perceptible change here jet. Lambskins rule steady and unchanged; receips from the Township, as well ts oflirines by local butchers during the week, have been fairly large, but all were wated at prices within ont range of quotations, arcording to quality.
