IMPORTANT RAILWAY TOWNS TAKEN BY SUCCESSFUL FLANDERS ADVANCE

BRITISH HAVE TAKEN MENIN IN THEIR FLANDERS ADVANCE

Northeast of Lens They Reach Neighborhood of Haubourdin—Good News From Along the Whole of the Western Front.

London, Oct. 15.—In the fighting in Flanders the British have captured Menin, a railway centre of great importance about four miles northwest of Turcoigne.

Northeast of Lens the British have advanced to the neighborhood of Haubourdin, about three miles west of Lille, and to the south have crossed the Haute Deule Canal, south of Pont-a-Vendin and taken several villages, according to the communication of Field Marshal Haig issued tonight.

Since Sunday morning eight of the German front line divisions in Flanders have been flung back broken and confused while probably all or most of the divisions held in reserve behind them received a heavy grueling.

Between Lens and Armentieres it is reported there are signs of an enemy withdrawal from the front line.
