ENGLAND MUST TAKE THE SWORD

A High Member of the Chinese Foreign Office Declares That Russia Can Be Beaten Off in No Other Way—China Prefers British Influence, But Is in Russia's Power... Pekin, Aug. 30.—A high member of the Tsung Li Yamen (Chinese Foreign Office), who is a British sympathizer, complained, in the course of a recent interview, that Great Britain's assurances of support against Russian aggression were belated...

"Why," said this functionary, "withhold such a declaration until Russia has secured Port Arthur, and France obtained considerable concessions in the south? The disintegration of the Empire has begun; and to-day the necessity for strong action is less urgent than when Russia first obtained a foothold..."

He admitted that China had broken her promises to England, but this he argued, was because Russian pressure was too strong to be resisted. He complained of "British ignorance of Russia's line of action," and asked: "Why does not England approach Russia directly with a declaration that Russia's interference in China will be regarded as a casus belli? It is useless to punish helpless China and to participate in the disintegration of the empire..."

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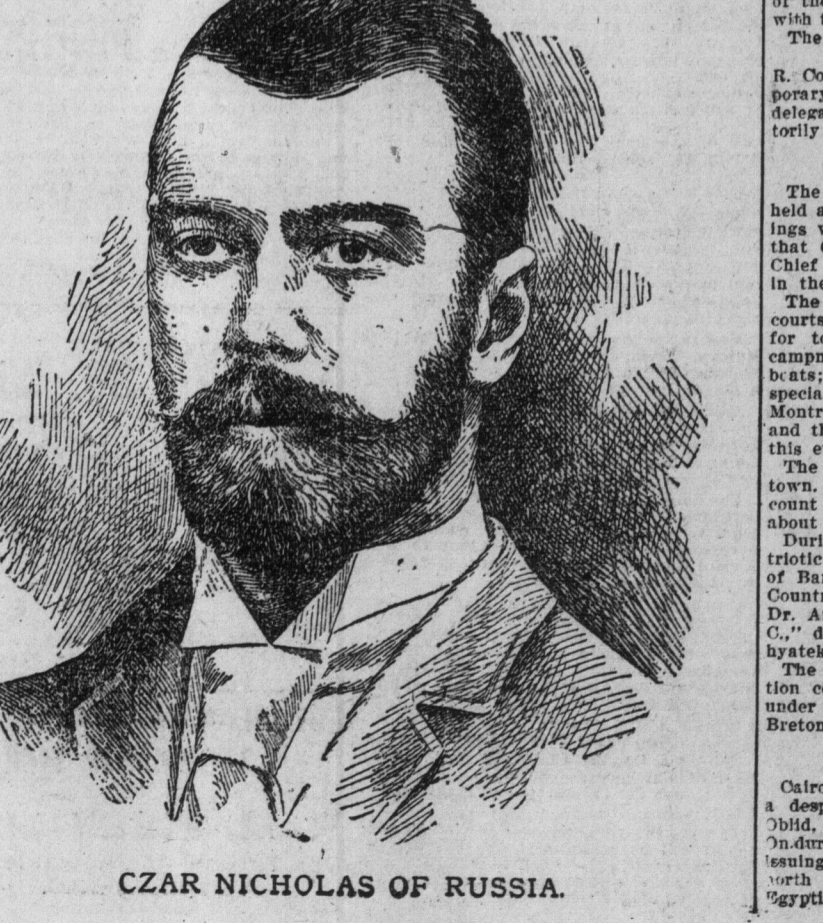

WILL ANYTHING RESULT

From the Conference Suggested by Emperor "Nicky"?

The Proposal is Regarded as Being Unfriendly and Inconsistent With the Franco-Russian Alliance, and the General Belief is That It Will be Shovel-The Car That Easy.

London, Aug. 30.—The Berlin correspondent of The Daily News says: Germany will accept the conference suggested by the Czar, but expects nothing to result from it.

Mr. Jackson, secretary of the United States Embassy, does not believe in the practicability of the proposal. He sums up that speaking for himself only, he felt sure that the United States would not permit the Philippines' question to be submitted to such a conference as he did not believe it would be possible for any power to begin the work of disarmament.

Intended to Revert to the Subject. The Paris correspondent of The Daily News says: "The subject was long on the mind of Emperor Frederick, who feared the time would come when Europe, exhausted by militarism, would be at the mercy of the industrial competition of the United States. A diplomatist assures me that Emperor William intended to revert to the subject of disarmament while at Jerusalem in the coming autumn, to attend the dedication of the Church of the Redeemer."

"In addition to taking the wind out of the Kaiser's sails, the Czar is the only Russian sovereign who has traversed Siberia, and he must have seen such a population of political malcontents as might easily be induced by American Japanese and other influences to declare for independence.

"The greatest objection to the circular is that such a clever person as Count Muraviev signs it."

Mooted by a Former Czar. According to various correspondents of The Daily News, the Russian Emperor's proposal is the result of a project of Alexander III. of Russia, which was mooted to Emperor Frederick of Germany, but not publicly, owing to the passionate status of the conference over France on the subject of Alsace-Lorraine.

Conference Will Be Held Anywhere. One correspondent says: "Emperor Nicholas has had in mind the prospective activity of the United States and Japan in the world's affairs, and has ascertained that the feeling is absolutely determined to impose upon China a complete military and naval reorganization. I understand that if only four powers attend the conference will be held without the others."

What the Newspapers Say. The newspapers here continue to devote a large amount of space to commenting upon and criticizing the Czar's peace note. While naturally differing in regard to the reasons actuating the emperor, they generally agree that the outcome will be a conference of the powers, if not one of the sovereigns themselves, probably at Constantinople.

Curiously enough, in support of this view, to-day's official Hamburg correspondent publishes a telegram from St. Petersburg containing the report that Emperor William of Germany and the Czar exchanged views in regard to the establishment of a lasting state of peace, "which was fully demonstrated by the identity of the monarchs' wishes."

Czar's Note Satisfactory. Bristol, Eng., Aug. 30.—The Trades Union Congress has unanimously passed a resolution expressing satisfaction at the Czar's peace note, and calling on the British Government to give effect thereto, "as militarism is the great foe of liberty and is a crushing burden to the toiling millions."

In other quarters it is alleged that the Czar's pronouncement was directly inspired by Queen Victoria, whose greatest hope is that her reign may not again be disturbed by war. The Queen, confessedly, has long sought to restrain Emperor William, and it is not unlikely that she used her great influence with the Czarina to secure the Czar's support.

The Togue Shape. The touge shape of reds-green shirred mirror velvet is particularly a favorite. This hat has a conical crown, a rolled rim in the same shade as the velvet. From both sides of the centre front is a long, narrow, shirred ribbon, which is caught sharply back to the crown by a large rosette of reds-green satin ribbon, clasped in the centre with an empire gold buckle set with brilliant diamonds. The hat is held in place by smaller buttons of the same design.

CHICAGO WHEAT WAS STRONG

Despite a Considerable Amount of Bearish News

Such as Lower English and Continental Cables, Lower Cash Wheat in the West and an Increase in Receipts—Bradstreet's Available Notes and Gossip.

Tuesday Evening, Aug. 30. The bearish influences in the speculative wheat market to-day were the lower English cables, a break of 8c per bushel in Paris, a decline of 1/8c cash wheat at Duluth, and increased market deliveries in the Northwest, bringing the primary receipts up to about the level of those of last year. The Chicago market, however, stood the test, and after covering a range of about 1c per bushel, the September and December options closed 1/2c above the previous final figures.

On the Liverpool Board to-day, spot red winter declined 1/2c per cental, and the September and December options went 1/4c and 1/2c per cental, respectively. On the Paris Board, cash wheat declined 2c, flour at the same time advancing 2c.

Corn was steady and 1/4c per bushel higher at Chicago to-day, and 1/4c higher at Liverpool.
