

When Mr. Hobart was elected Vice-President, he answered the question, "How much are you worth?" by saying that he did not know exactly. He thought that, under favorable circumstances, the various securities and other property in his possession would sell for \$3,000,000, or terhaps more. A forced sale at that time, he said, might yield as little as \$1,500,000. Since 1896, however, a resumption of keneral prosperity has advanced the value of nearly every interest with which he was connected to a marked degree. It is estimated that the increment of his estate invested within the last year and the enlarged value of the securities will bring the total of the estate to about \$5,000,000.

Mr. Hobart, in his last illness, did not allow the fact to be ignored that he carried life insurance, placed with several large companies, to the total of \$350,000. Payments were made promptly by Mr. Bell, who signed cheques in Mr. Hobart's name, after the latter became too ill to attend to details of business.

Mr. Hobart spent a larger proportion of his income than most men of millions. His salary as Vice-President of the United States just paid his house-rent in Washington. His bequests to charities are believed to be large.
