SERIOUS FIRE IN MONTREAL

Hudon, Hebert & Co., and Leeming, Miles & Co. Suffer a Large Amount of Damage.

Montreal, March 16.—(Special.)—Montreal has had another big fire, and the brigade has lost a valuable man. The following are the losses:

Hudon Hebert & Co. loss \$100,000; Leeming, Miles & Co. loss \$50,000; full insured. Sisters of the Holy Cross, estimated loss on buildings \$25,000; insurance \$10,000. E. F. Walter & Co. loss \$100,000; fully insured.

About 4.30 this morning smoke was seen issuing from the premises of Leeming, Miles & Co., wholesale druggists and importers of foreign supplies, at the corner of St. Sulpice and DeBrosses streets. An alarm was sent in at once, but so inflammable were the contents of the warehouses that Chieftains Dubois and Pierce say the place was one mass of flames when the brigade arrived. Two engines were started to work on Place d'Armes-square, and soon a mass of water was poured upon the burning. There the dangerous nature of the fire manifested itself. Explosion after explosion followed.

Fireman's Narrow Escape. Four times the lifesaving net was spread out from the premises of the firm to drop into, but the conflagration was not to pass without loss of life. At about 6 o'clock a terrific explosion, at the whole of the front of the top story of No. 53 DeBrosses-street, sent out into the air a cloud of dirt and brick, a group of firemen of No. 2 Station, who were busy with the hose on the street, were struck by the falling mass. One man was killed, and several others were injured. The burning brands, carried by the wind, were blown to the roof, and flames soon began to pour from the upper windows. Soon the upper two stories were on fire. Chief Bennett centered the electric energies of the brigade, in the hope of saving it, and by 8 o'clock tons of water were being poured into it. But the nature of the stock, wholesale groceries, rendered it most difficult to handle, and the damage that will be done by the flooding of so valuable and easily ruined merchandise will be enormous.

Details of Insurance. Messrs. E. Hurlbush and Alfred St. Cyr of Place d'Armes-square placed the insurance on the stock of Hudon, Hebert & Co. Mr. Hurlbush said this morning:

The fire broke out in the boiler room of the main building. It was fully 20 minutes after the fire was discovered before the engines reached the scene. From the fact factory the flames jumped across the street, and the main building of the Exposition was burned. Machinery Hall, with its valuable contents, was saved. The loss on the Exposition building will reach \$100,000, fully insured.

Still Another Fatal Blaze. St. Joseph, Mo., March 16.—The Norman shoe factory, and the Richardson, Roberts & Byrnes overall and shirt factory, Third and Fourth streets, were destroyed by fire late this afternoon, causing the death probably of several persons. All the victims are men, and were employed in the shirt factory. Loss \$100,000.

Car Burned. St. Catharines, Ont., March 16.—About 1 o'clock this morning fire broke out at the St. Catharines and Thorold Street Railway car barn, and threatened the destruction of all the company's property there. The loss will be between \$200 and \$300. It is supposed a live wire in the car caused the blaze.
