LONDON, June 4. - Contrary to custom the House of Lords will hold a sitting to-day to receive a message from King Edward with reference to peace in South Africa. It is expected that this message will announce the conferring of a title upon Lord Kitchener and the granting him a reward for his services. This reward will probably be £100,000 (\$500,000).

It now appears that Lord Kitchener will not return to London for the King's Coronation, and Joseph Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, has said that the government does not propose to have the new South African colonies represented at the crowning of King Edward. Transvaal and Orange River representatives could hardly reach London in time for the function.




