From the meagre news received at Tahiti up to the time of the sailing of the Mariposa it is estimated that 1000 of the islanders lost their lives. 

## FEWER "PUBS" IN ENGLAND

New License Law Permits Magis- \$ trates to Close Many of Them.

ANGER AGAINST GOVERNMENT GROWS

London, Feb. 8.-Birmingham, Notingham and Manchester saloonkeepers are just now discovering that the new cense act is much more far-reaching than they ever suspected. It makes it possible for magistrates to obtain detailed information in regard to liensed public houses and the proprietors themselves, and to cause notice of objection to the renewal of old or the granting of new licenses to be served without incapacitating the magistrat s themselves from deciding thereon. It also settles the point that misconduct is not the only legal ground for refusing the renewal of a license. The nagistrates thruout the country are taking advantage of this, and are recing the number of public houses by efusing renewals wherever they think district is oversupplied with these

by the government is steadily rising. The government will undoubtedly feel the effect of it when it next goes to the country on a general election, for the Licensed Victuallers is one of the ichest and most powerful organiza-ions in the United Kingdom. At present the members are dealing with the maistrates' method of voluntary surrender. The latter declare that the number of licenses must be reducin a certain district. The license holders' organization then agrees as to which shall be sacrificed and compenwhich shall be sacrificed and compensates the sufferers. As an instance, the license-holders of Birmingham offered to surrender fifty licenses before February, 1904, provided it would not cost their society over £50,000. The justices accepted the offer.


