











BEAT ANTI-TRUST LEGISLATION IS THE AIM OF STANDARD OIL CO.

Number of Telegrams, Signed John D. Rockefeller, Received by Legislators in Washington—President May Call a Special Session.

Washington, Feb. 7.—It can be stated by authority that unless anti-trust legislation at least reasonably satisfactory to the administration is enacted at the present session President Roosevelt on the fifth of March will call an extraordinary session of the 58th Congress. The President himself has told members of Congress of his desire and of his determination that the anti-trust legislation be enacted.

It is further stated that the determination of the President was reached only after careful consideration of the strenuous efforts that are being made to defeat any anti-trust legislation by Congress. These efforts have covered a wide range. They were characterized to-day by one prominent Republican leader, to quote him directly, "as the most remarkable of which I have had personal knowledge during my public life."

Brought to an End. These efforts culminated during the past 24 hours, it is now deemed in direct appeals from the Standard Oil Company, thru its president, Mr. John D. Rockefeller, to the members of the Senate, not to enact any anti-trust legislation at this time.

No less than six United States senators have received telegrams signed "John D. Rockefeller," urging that no anti-trust legislation be enacted. It has not been possible to obtain a copy of these despatches, which it can be said are practically identical. Substantially they read as follows:

"We are opposed to any anti-trust legislation. Our counsel, Mr. [Name] will see you, if you must be stopped." As stated, these telegrams (and it must be clear that the substance and not the exact wording is here given), were signed, "John D. Rockefeller."

Yesterday morning one of the counsel of the Standard Oil Company arrived in Washington and called immediately on members of the Senate, as indicated in the telegrams. He did not remain long.

Scarcely had he made known his business than he was informed a bit curtly that his presence here was undesirable, and he left with an intimation that he had better return to New York.

Talked in Lobby. During the afternoon information concerning the receipt of the messages leaked out, and became the subject of some quiet discussion at the Senate. The news also reached the House, some of the prominent representatives learning the gist of the despatches. Then it became known that this was not the first time that the Standard Oil Company, thru its attorneys, had endeavored to influence legislation in Congress at the expense of the public interest.

to obey the commission in this respect. Rebating by carriers is made punishable with a fine of not less than \$1000, and corporations violating the provisions of this section are forbidden the use of the instrumentality of interstate commerce. Carriers are prohibited from knowingly transporting the articles produced and manufactured or sold in violation of this act. In case of prosecutions no person is to be excused from testifying on the ground that such testimony would tend to incriminate him, but for such testimony the witness is not to be prosecuted. The Federal circuit courts are given jurisdiction in cases of violation, and it is made the duty of the district attorneys to institute proceedings to prohibit violations and individuals damaged by violations are given authority to sue.

SOFT COAL MINERS. For 1903 They Will Receive an Increase of 12 1/2 Per Cent.

Indianapolis, Feb. 7.—The miners and operators of the competitive district agreed today upon a scale of wages for the ensuing year. Briefly, the miners in all of Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, and Western Pennsylvania are to receive an increase averaging 12 1/2 per cent. The new wages will form a basis for all other bituminous mining districts.

In addition, the operators verbally agreed that outside day labor should be increased 12 1/2 per cent. in Ohio, Illinois and Indiana, and that in the Pittsburgh district there shall be an increase of 12 1/2 per cent. except where prices have been advanced during the present year. In these cases sufficient increase shall be granted to bring the amount up to 12 1/2 per cent.

At the meeting of the Scale Committee the Indiana miners agreed to withdraw the short-bill from the Senate, where it is a special order for Monday.

Charged With Sheep Stealing. Sir Charles J. Jacob Brown and Charles Jones of Victoria, after three sittings of police magistrate's court at Simcoe, were Friday sent up for trial at the next general sessions before a judge on a charge of stealing sheep. SAME TACTICS PURSUED ELSEWHERE. Demand for Telephone Access to C.P.R. Stations at Port Arthur and Fort William Refused.

The World was informed on Saturday that the C. P. R. are pursuing exactly the same tactics at both Port Arthur and Fort William, where municipal telephone services have been installed, and where they have refused in consequence of their contract with the Bell Telephone Company, to allow the municipal system to be put in their stations at either of these towns. The demand for telephone access to the C. P. R. stations at Port Arthur and Fort William is based on public convenience, and especially the convenience of people who are customers and clients of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Nevertheless, the C. P. R. authorities have so far refused to allow the municipal telephone system to enter their stations. The Mayor of Port Arthur stated on Saturday that the Canadian Pacific received, in consideration of the "fence out" of the municipal system, some \$100,000, and that the C. P. R. people, connecting all their employees with a well-known citizen, who was discussing company, is it simply monstrous that a public utility, which was established to benefit the people of Canada, or any portion thereof, should be so treated.

WHENCE THE SOLICITATION? MAY BE MORE WAR IN CHINA. Journeymen Bakers' Union Desires to Know Who Asked for Another Outbreak.

TYPOS LEAVE IT WITH THE COUNCIL. ARMS ARE BEING SECRETLY LANDED. Canton is the Centre of Activity and Foreigners Are Daily Being Menaced.

San Francisco, Feb. 8.—G. J. Kavanaugh, a newspaper correspondent, who has been stationed for some time in the southern provinces of China, returned to this country to-day on the steamship China. He reports that the natives of South China are making active preparations for rebellion and war, and, profiting by the failure of the Boxer troubles in the north, have shown more shrewdness in their preliminary arrangements. Canton, up the river from Hong Kong, appears to be the centre of activity, and the foreigners are made daily aware of the serious trend of affairs.

According to Mr. Kavanaugh, arms are being secretly landed in China by filibustering expeditions, in which American, German and English figure prominently. The identity of those who have undertaken this work, or who are prominent in its execution, is, of course, hard to determine, but high Chinese officials, as well as many intelligent foreigners resident in the country, are aware that adventurous citizens of the United States are arming the Chinese. Former American soldiers are employed in drilling the natives. An uprising in some of the provinces removed from the principal coast cities is expected to take place soon, and the directors of the country, who have thus far shown a different spirit, is awaited with anxiety.

That there is a growing antipathy to Americans owing to ill health, an attack made on Dr. James Young, surgeon of the steamer China, by the natives of Canton, is being given all their loose change to beggars, the mob began to stone the "foreign devils" and the Chinese struck Dr. Young on the head knocked him down and rendered him almost insensible. His commotion drew weapons and held up the mob while the doctor was removed to the boat.

ASTIGMATISM CURED. Operation on the Muscle Removes a Defect of Vision. New York, Feb. 8.—A surgical operation on the eye, with the effect of curing astigmatism, is described by Dr. George J. Bull, in a special article in the New York Medical Journal, published to-day.

Astigmatism, or "astemia," as Dr. Bull calls it, is a defect of vision caused by irregularity in the shape of the eye, usually in the cornea or crystalline lens. It produces a disability to the eye, which produces this effect, the doctors in this city say this is rare. Dr. Bull's patient, besides astigmatism, had a weak eye, and the cornea was troubled with inequality of the muscles, and he had had peroperative treatment, which was entirely unavailing, so that the patient was able to see all the "hex" in the clock face. Dr. Bull described the effect of the cure: "She put her hands up to her face to see if she had her glasses, and finding they were not there, could hardly believe her eyes."

Dr. Bull says that the operation has given great satisfaction, and seems to have had an excellent effect, but he is of the opinion that such an operation is undertaken only in exceptional cases. It is possible, however, says the doctor, that the case may be of value in other diseases of the eye due to tension, which may be cured by operating on the muscles.
