Bracebridge, May 3.-The Muskoka Navigation Company's steamer Oriole careened in the Muskoka River about bend she was caught on the side by the current, which is very strong at this time of the year and slowly turn-

The accident was due to the strong current, which caught the boat turning a bend in the river, causing her to rock so violently that a great quantity of water flowed in the sides. This, together with the heavy load the boat carried, rendered her unable to hold her own, and Captain Corbett, seeing this, headed her for shore and immediately turned to getting the ladies off, a number of whom were pulled out thru the lower cabin windows.

The boat turned on her side a few minutes later and then the bow struck shore, when about half the passengers jumped off, and the boat swinging around, touched again when the rest got off. A few men getting in a hurry jumped off and swam ashore, but it was hardly necessary. The boat was rapidly carried down stream, the crew being unable to stop her until she filled with water, when she stopped about a quarter of a mile from where she first turned over.

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





Manitoba is Breeding Blooded Stock Tariff Keeps Out Cheap U. S. Horses

Prairie Province Tending More to Mixed Farming, and Ontarlo Should Profit.

Winnipeg, April ',-(Staff Corre rapidly forging to the front in Manitoba, and the Territories are not far The World of G. H. Greig, who holds the position of Dominion live stock sioner for Manitoba and the arritories. He is said to be an authority on the subject and a man of en observation. In a chat with The World, Mr. Greig talked entertainingly of the relations between Ontario and sers. He asserted that his philosopny taught him, that the best sign of the substantial progress of the rural districts of the west was to be found in the increase of diversified farming.

in the increase of diversified farming.

"Az rapidly as Manitoba farmers become prosperous they begin mixed farming," he said. "Wheat growing salving way in many sections to stock raising. It is noteworthy that last year most of the animals bred in Manitoba were disposed of at home. Of course, in some lines Ontario must be drawn upon. This is especially true on the point of convenience in the purchase of this breeding stock. A buyer can go to any Ontario railroad station and select a trainload for shipment west. This is done largely by the breeders of the Territories, because the rate is very intile more than from Manitoba points. Then, too, a buyer must show much more energy in order to secure a car-load of cattle at Manitoba points.

Prefer Ontario Stock.

"All this means that Ontario must

Prefer Ontario Stock.

"All this means that Ontario must be relied upon to a more or lees degree by the west. But breeding is maxing rapid progress here. Last year our live stock exhibit at the Winnipeg Exhibition was very fine. It will be better this year. These Manitoba farmers did not come west as amateurs in the business. Most of them are from Ontario farms. They knew the business as it is taught there. This is their starting point. Some animals are purchased for breeding purposes from the States. The disposition, however, is to go to Ontario in preference to traffic with the Western States.

"I cannot place too much emphasis on the excellent prospects existing for western farmers. Mixed farming is the hope of the country, and our farmers are learning the art rapidly. They are good judges of live stock, 2nd some of the finest blooded cattle and horses the Dominion produces to-day are numbered among the herds and studs of this part of Canada. The tendency is to-



of the Canadian horses until it has reached grave proportions. Until this year it has been customary to bring across the line a very small horse to be sold cheap to small farmers. It is claimed the customs officials know nothing of the value of horses and have been in the habit of rating these animals at \$25. That would mean a tax of \$5. The same animal going into the States would be taxed \$25. Thus the flow of small stuff has been steadily toward Canada.


New Tariff Basis.

Now the government has announced a new tariff. The terms have not been promulgated, but it is said that everything remains but the detail. It is determined to rate anything in the shape of a horse at the line on the basis of \$75. Many breeders declared it should be placed at \$100, but the government apparently has consented to make it \$75. Many petitions have been presented to the government in favor of making the duty prohibitive. As it is now, or will be any day, it will cost as much to import a scrub worth \$25 as to bring in a \$500 animal. Now 44s. 6d. would be equal to about \$5.10 delivered at the packing house for first-class hogs, and it would mean \$4.75 to the farmers."




