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REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

On the occasion of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation the Session avail themselves, as usual, of the opportunity of submitting a statement concerning those matters that are especially entrusted to their care.

During the past year 22 families have withdrawn from the Congregation, 18 of whom have removed from the city, while 11 families have been received, thus leaving a reduction of 11 in our list of families. Within the same period the names of 22 Communicants have been withdrawn from our Roll, 18 by certificate and 4 by death, while 46 have been added, 15 having been received from other Congregations and 31 on profession of faith.

There are at present connected with the Congregation 267 families and 393 communicants.

During the year there have been entered on our Records 26 Baptisms and 28 deaths.

Last summer a valuable addition was made to the Kirk Session in the ordination of Messrs. James Gibson and Peter Larmonth to the Eldership. Mr. W. B. Smellie was also elected but, owing to his removal from the city, was unable to accept office. This increase to our number secures greater efficiency on the part of the Session.

From the Report of the Sabbath Schools, which is this year presented in separate form, it will be seen that our schools are in vigorous activity, with a total of 42 office-bearers, and 315 pupils.

That report does not include the two Bible-classes, one for young women, taught by Mr. Hamilton every Sabbath afternoon at 3 p.m., and numbering 27; the other, numbering 20, for young men, conducted by the Pastor on Monday evenings at 7.30. It might be expected that these classes, particularly that for young men, would be more largely attended.

The attendance at the weekly Prayer Meeting has shown a gratifying increase during the past winter compared

with previous seasons. Perhaps the programme of subjects, issued in printed form to members of the Congregation, has contributed towards this. There is still, however, abundant room for improvement, and it is hoped that an increasing number will take an interest in this valuable feeder of Church life.

The Session would draw the attention of the Congregation to the fact that the new Tune-Book, suited to our Hymnal and issued by authority of the General Assembly, has been adopted in the Church: and they would respectfully urge members of the Congregation to provide themselves with copies and to render all possible assistance in improving our service of praise.

The District Visitors have continued to render excellent service, not only in collecting the contributions of the Congregation towards the schemes of the Church, but also in distributing tracts, in taking copies of the *Presbyterian Record* to those members of the Congregation who have no pews, and in carrying monthly reports to the Pastor concerning cases of sickness, change of residence, or other matters of which it is important that he should be aware but of which he might not be as promptly informed were it not for their periodical visits.

The Session, in conference with the Temporal Committee, have had under consideration a proposal for the reduction of the Church debt. It is extremely desirable that at least a portion of the debt should be removed, even though it might be necessary to make part of the glebe bear a share of the burden. The Session fervently hope that the scheme which the Temporal Committee may submit will receive the liberal support of the Congregation and that ere long we may be free to give greater assistance to the general work of the Church.

The amounts contributed toward the Schemes of the Church have been allotted as follows, the desires of contributors having been scrupulously observed wherever these have been indicated upon their schedules, while, in allocating the unspecified contributions, the Session have had regard to the respective claims of the Schemes:—

REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church in General Meeting:—

The Temporal Committee present their accounts for the year now closing.

As the accounts for the financial year, ending 15 February, are sufficiently clear and need not be quoted, the figures in this Report will represent transactions between the first Monday in March 1881, and that of 1882. A falling off has occurred in the collection of Pew Rents and Glebe Rents compared with last year. For this year only \$381.00 have been collected from Glebe Lot Rents, being considerably less than ought to have been received. The causes of this are thus explained:—

One of the sub-lots became vacant, and was let for a low rent for part of the past year on account of expensive repairs being required.

For another sub-lot the tenant paid nothing last year, and for another only \$35.00 was paid instead of \$204.50.

Uncollected Pew Rents have always formed the subject of a paragraph of regrets in the Annual Report, and have been a source of perplexity to the Temporal Committee. We commend this item also to the earnest attention of our successors, but without any strong hope that what seems a chronic weakness will be effectually cured by any, even the most active remedies.

It is gratifying that the Committee, through the punctual payment of Pew Rents and the liberal contributions of many members of the Congregation, have been enabled to meet the annual liabilities.

It will be noticed that the amount credited to the Kirk Session on account of interest is larger than usual, being

\$2,607.00 this year, against \$1,564.35 last year. It seems necessary to explain that this does not arise from any appreciable increase in the amount thus contributed, but from the fact that three half-year's receipts from the Session are included in this year's accounts owing to the last payment having been made before the closing of the Committee's books, while in previous years the corresponding payment was deferred until after the said closing, and so had to appear in the accounts of the subsequent year. This will have the effect, if followed up, of harmonizing hereafter the accounts of the Temporal Committee and Kirk Session.

The same cause accounts for the unusually large amount on hand, which merely stands to meet the interest which was paid to Mr. Murray a few days later.

During last summer improvements were made in the system of heating the Church, at an expense of about \$400.00.

A By-law will be presented to you for ratification, having for its object a scheme for the reduction or modification of a part of the debt of the Church, which it is to be hoped will prove successful.

BY-LAW No. 10.

To enable the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, to issue debentures. Ratified by the Congregation in Annual Meeting assembled, 6th March, 1882.

WHEREAS The Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, were constituted a body, politic and corporate, by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, passed in the Thirty-First year of the reign of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria and chaptered sixty-one, under the name of "The Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, in connection with The Church of Scotland";

AND WHEREAS by the said Act the following lands and premises among others were vested in the said Corporation, namely:—"That parcel of land known as lot H in Concession C, Rideau Front, of the Township of Nepean, in the County of Carleton, known as the Glebe Lot, excepting that part of said lot reserved by the Ordnance Department on the Rideau Canal," in trust for the congregation of the said St. Andrew's Church in Ottawa;

AND WHEREAS, by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, passed in the Thirty-Eighth year of the reign of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, and chaptered eighty-six, it was, amongst other things, provided, that the said Corporation should have power, from time to time, to execute and issue debentures in current money of Canada to such an amount, in such sums, not less than fifty dollars each, at such rate of interest and time and place of payment of interest and redeemable at such times and places as might be determined by any by-law or by-laws made by said Corporation and ratified in the manner provided by section nine of said Act of Incorporation; PROVIDED ALWAYS, that the total amount of debentures outstanding at any time should not exceed thirty thousand dollars; AND PROVIDED ALSO, that all debentures, before being issued, should be registered by the said Corporation, in a book kept for that purpose, which book, should, at all reasonable times, be open for inspection by any holders of any such debentures, and that the money to be raised by the issue of the said debentures should be applied to the purposes mentioned in the first section of the said last in part recited Act;

AND WHEREAS, that portion of the said lands and premises hereinafter mentioned and described, together with other lands and premises, are subject to a mortgage bearing date the Eighteenth day of March A. D. 1876, made by the said Corporation to one Andrew Murray, of the City of Aberdeen, in that part of Great Britain known as Scotland, Advocate, for securing payment of the sum of six thousand pounds sterling;

AND WHEREAS, it has been deemed expedient, under the powers conferred by the said last in part recited Act, to issue debentures for

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the sum of thirty thousand dollars in the manner hereinafter provided, for the purposes mentioned in the first section of the said Act, or such one or more of said purposes as may, by the said Corporation, be considered advisable,

NOW THEREFORE, "The Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland," in meeting assembled do hereby enact as follows:—

1. It shall be lawful for the said Corporation to execute and issue debentures, in current money of Canada, to the amount of thirty thousand dollars, under the powers conferred by the said Act.
2. The said issue of debentures shall consist of six hundred debentures of fifty dollars each, to be numbered separately and consecutively from one to six hundred inclusive, duly executed on behalf of the said corporation; such debentures to bear date the first day of May next, be payable on presentation to the Treasurer of the said Corporation at the said City of Ottawa, on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, (except such debentures as shall previously be redeemed as hereinafter provided), and shall bear interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, payable annually on the first day of May in each year, on presentation to the Treasurer of the said Corporation, at the said City of Ottawa, of the proper interest coupon.
3. The said debentures, before being issued, shall be registered by the Secretary of the said Corporation in a book kept for that purpose, and such book shall, at all reasonable times, be open for inspection by any holders of any such debentures.
4. The said debentures shall be signed by the President and Treasurer and be under the seal of the said Corporation.
5. The said debentures shall be a charge upon the lands and premises following, namely:—Blocks No. one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven, twelve, thirteen and fourteen as shown and laid down on the plan of the sub-division of Lot letter H, in Concession C, Rideau front of the said Township of Nepean, drawn from actual survey by Lindsay Russell, Provincial Land Surveyor, which plan bears date the 12th day of December, 1868, and was registered in the Registry Office of the said County of Carleton on the 10th day of July, 1869.
6. The said Corporation shall have the right to redeem any or all of the said debentures on the 1st day of May, in any year; and the said right is hereby expressly stipulated and reserved as a condition upon which the same are to be issued.
7. The said Corporation may select the debentures to be redeemed, by lot or in any other manner they may see fit, and shall, before the said 1st day of May, give two months notice to the holders of the debentures selected by them for redemption, and such holders shall present the said debentures for redemption to the Treasurer of the said Corporation, at the City of Ottawa, on or before the said first day of May, and the said Corporation shall redeem the said debentures with all interest accrued thereon, to the said 1st day of May, and if any of the debentures shall not be presented on or before the said date, no interest shall be allowed, nor shall interest accrue thereon after the said date and such notice shall be sufficient, if in writing and mailed pre-

paid to the last registered holder of such debenture or debentures at the post office address appearing in the Register of the said Corporation.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the said Corporation have caused the said By-law made and passed at the City of Ottawa, in the County of Carleton, this sixth day of March, A.D. 1882, to be signed by the President and Secretary and Treasurer of the said Corporation and sealed with the Corporate Seal of the said Corporation the day and year aforesaid.

In presenting the Annual Report we have much pleasure in stating that we have had a successful year.

There has been an average attendance of eighteen at the meetings. These are held weekly during the season which closes in April and resumes in November.

During the year five entertainments have been held under the auspices of this Society. Of these, one was an evening of readings kindly given by Hon. Mr. Boyd, of St. John, N. B., another a lecture by Rev. Geo. H. Wells of Montreal, the other three were musical and literary evenings, with sales of work done by the members. The Society is most grateful to all who took part on those occasions, and who helped to make them successful and pleasant.

From the amount realized by the Society \$200.00 have been given to assist in defraying the cost of the new furnaces placed in the basement last summer; \$139.00 have been expended on the purchase of a new organ for the use of the Sabbath School and Prayer Meeting; and the balance of the funds will be allocated, at the closing meeting in April, to such purposes, charitable or otherwise, as may be thought most deserving.

It is desirable that a greater number of the ladies of the Church should unite in the work of the Society; this would increase its prosperity and usefulness, and would tend to promote that feeling of unity which should prevail among members of the same congregation.

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The Schools have been efficiently maintained throughout the year, and we believe that at no previous time has there been greater regularity, faithfulness and zeal on the part of the teachers than at present.

Meetings for business have been held from time to time as occasion required. The Normal Class for preparation of the lessons has been better attended by our teachers this winter than formerly.

On the last Sabbath of each quarter a Children's Service has been held in the Church, at two of which those pupils, to the number of 18, who had committed to memory the entire Shorter Catechism, received Bibles presented by Rev. Mr. Gordon.

On Friday evening, 3rd February, the Annual Festival took place, at which nearly 400 children, with a large number of their parents and friends, were present.

The contributions of the children, as per financial statement herewith submitted, have been devoted in part to the support of a Hindoo scholar in the Orphanage at Calcutta, but it is felt that more ought to be done for Missions by the Schools, and an endeavour will be made during the coming year to increase the interest of the children in Missionary Work.

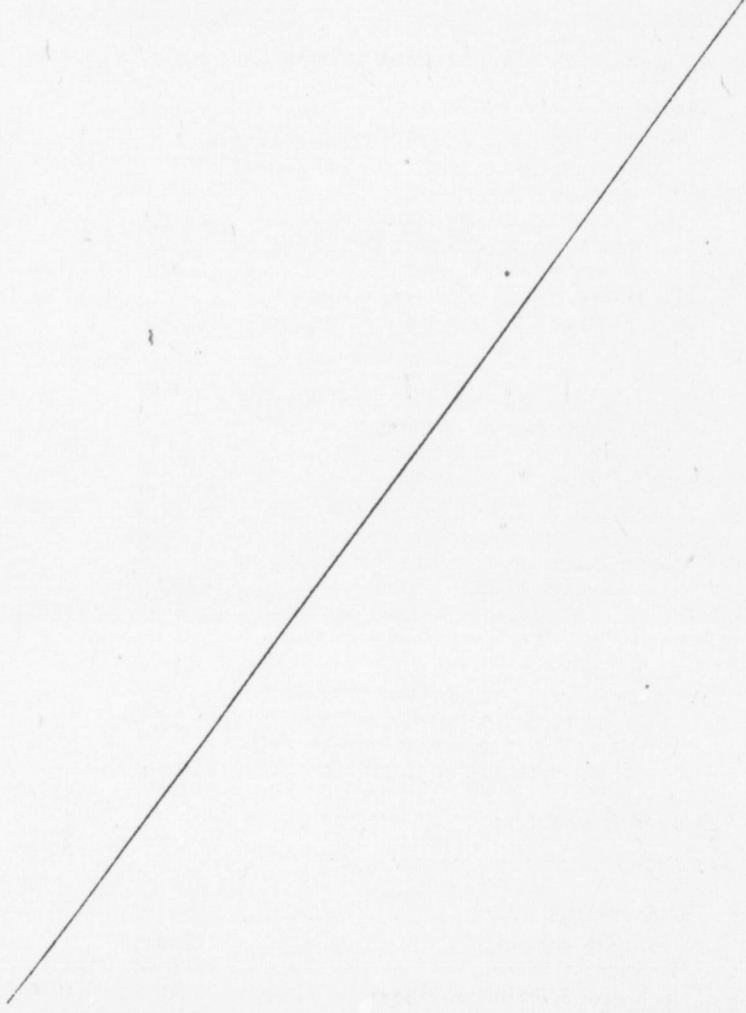
