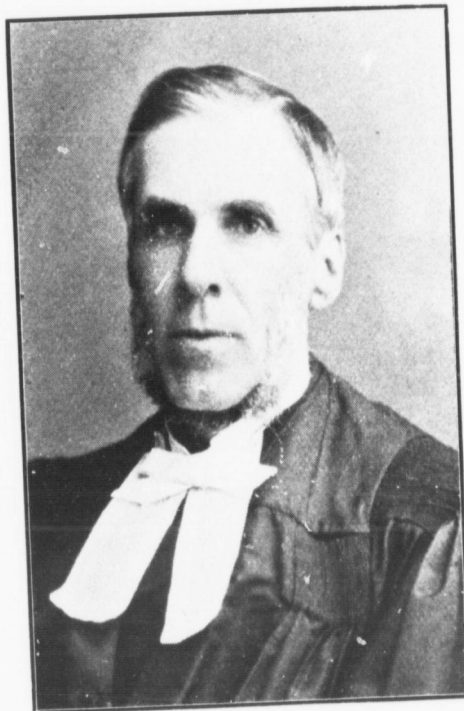

Introduction.

To the Members and Adherents of St. James Square Church :

The opportunity of writing a brief introduction to the following group of Reports, and of speaking in this way a personal word to those among whom I labor, is an invitation which I gladly accept.

I congratulate you all, and most heartily, upon the record of the past year.

In things spiritual, there has been a gratifying advance. Notwithstanding an unusual draft made upon our membership, our Communion Roll shows a slight increase; for the additions, happily, were larger than they were in 1896. In equipment for work, also, an advance has been made,—as is evidenced in the enlargement of the Session, the inauguration of the Young People's Association, and in other kindred ways.

It is worthy of note that, during the last four years, 286 persons have been received into Church fellowship, and have participated with us for the first time in observing the ordinance of the Lord's Supper. That is to say: fully one-half of the present membership of the Congregation have been added within the brief interval named. This fact is mentioned because it is significant. Many of these communicants had indeed, previously, been members of the Church: they came to us, bringing with them certificates from sister-congregations; but that 286 persons, among the membership alone,

should have joined us within the short period of four years, and yet have increased our Roll merely by fifty, draws attention to the ceaseless flux which is characteristic of a Toronto Congregation. It draws attention also to the ceaseless diligence which is demanded of a city Pastor, if he would keep himself barely acquainted with all the members of his flock; for it is proverbial that adherents change their Church connection even more frequently than do the members.

In things financial, likewise, there is abundant ground for my extending to you my hearty congratulations. I thank the Managers very warmly for their zeal and pains in looking after the temporal interests of the Congregation. The past year has proved a trying one for most people, and it has been an especially difficult year for some (as I know) among you; but it cannot be said that there has been any diminution in your liberality. On the contrary, as regards at least our Missionary contributions, we have seen the tide touch one of the high-water marks in our Congregation's history. In this connection, however, I observe that the monthly offerings, obtained through the Missionary Collectors, show a decided falling off,—a fact which must not be overlooked, and a shrinkage for which provision and remedy must be devised without delay. Your recent splendid free-will offering of \$1,140.37, while it revealed your generous readiness to make response to a special appeal, revealed also your ability to make a somewhat larger monthly contribution through the Collectors; and stated giving, not spasmodic giving, is the hope and necessity of the Missionary cause. As regards our expenditures for the maintenance of the Congregation itself, the Managers have to report an unwelcome deficit; yet, after all, it is nothing very serious, and I have reason to entertain the hope that it will not be repeated. If those who now give exclusively to Missions will only begin at once to give also towards the ordinary revenue of the Congregation, and if those who already give to both funds will begin to allot a *slightly* larger proportion of their gifts towards meeting current

expenditures, the problem which annually perplexes us will have been completely solved. And then shall be brought about that more satisfactory condition of affairs wherein, while we shall continue annually to forward a liberal cheque to the Treasurer of the General Assembly, we shall *not* (so far as our own expenditures are concerned) be found ending each year with a balance upon the wrong side.

Among the outstanding events of 1897, there are three which must not be omitted from our survey. (1) The re-organization of work among the young people of the Congregation. This movement,—which has been eagerly endorsed, and which has already succeeded far beyond our most sanguine anticipations,—is certain to tell for good, in fully a score of ways, in strengthening and increasing the effectiveness of our Church. (2) The visit of Rev. Donald MacGillivray, the Missionary whom we support in China. We have had several opportunities of hearing from his own lips what God has wrought through the instrumentality of the Canadian band in Honan. As a Congregation we have been glad to greet him as a brother-beloved, and as an earnest, courageous preacher of the everlasting Gospel. In this connection, may I bespeak for the Missionary Collectors, whenever they call upon you, a generous and genuine welcome. Their task is not always an easy one; gladden their hearts, and quicken your own zeal in this self-denying enterprise, by giving them your names for a monthly contribution to one or more of our Missionary Schemes. And (3) the frequency with which, during the past year, death has visited our households. Happily, in our sorrow, we sorrow not “without hope”: on the contrary, we give thanks ceaselessly for that victory over death and the grave which Christ hath obtained for us, and for all who sleep in Him. In tenderest sympathy I commend you to Him who is able to comfort and sustain each stricken one that is among you.

Of the many kindnesses which I have received at the hands of members of the Congregation, during the past

twelve months, I desire to make cordial acknowledgment. You scarcely understand the stimulus which such words and acts afford me. Nor are they helpful only at the moment. They invariably make an impression upon the memory; and thus they easily live on, continually renewing the joy which at the first they awakened.

As to the future, I do not think I need say anything. I am glad we have such abundant cause to await that future hopefully, and to anticipate its coming even confidently. The recommendation of the Managers, (viz., that a considerable sum of money be specially provided to pay for some very desirable improvements upon the Church Property,) will, I am sure, be cordially endorsed and loyally supported. Likewise other recommendations, contained in other Reports which here meet the eye, we must honestly seek to carry into effect as soon as possible. Meanwhile, let us "be steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as we know that our labor is not in vain in the Lord." Having been permitted to review the past, let us now return to our work; and let us, as we resume it, take it up with a will. In the name, and under the protection, and with the conscious benediction of the Highest, let us now press forward.

The Annual Meeting.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 19TH, 1898.

The forty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held this evening in the Lecture-room.

After devotional exercises by the Pastor, it was moved by Mr. Robt. Carrie, that Mr. A. A. Allan be elected Chairman of the meeting. Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. M. Gray, that Mr. R. A. Grant be Secretary of the meeting. Carried.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting having been published in the Annual Report were taken as read, and the Secretary having read the minutes of the Congregational meetings of April 14th, 1897, and January 12th, 1898, all minutes were confirmed.

The report of the Board of Managers and the Treasurer's Statement were then read, and on motion of Mr. R. C. Steele, seconded by Mr. Wallace Anderson, the same were adopted.

The ballots were then distributed for the election of Managers, and at the request of the Chairman the Secretary explained that at the urgent request of Messrs. H. W. Nelson, Wallace Anderson, T. O. Anderson and S. F. McKinnon, the Managers, with much regret, allowed their names to be taken off the list of nominations. A letter was read from Mr. J. W. Woods declining election, and Mr. Steele asked the Congregation not to re-elect him.

The Chairman asked Messrs. W. E. Long, C. S. Macdonald, A. G. Murray and Jno. Ferguson to act as scrutineers for the election of Managers.

While the ballots were being counted the following resolutions were carried :—

Moved by Mr. John Gowans, seconded by Mr. W. E. Long, "That the thanks of the Congregation be given to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer and Secretary, for the way they have discharged their duties during the year."

Moved by Mr. Robt. Carrie, seconded by Mr. Geo. Douglas, "That a cordial vote of thanks be given to the Organist and the members of the Choir for their services during the year."

Moved by Mr. Thos. Woodbridge, seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, "That the Rev. L. H. Jordan, Principal Kirkland, and Messrs. Gray and Grant be appointed to attend to the printing of the annual reports of the Congregation."

A resolution moved by Mr. W. S. Ormiston, seconded by Mr. Thos. Woodbridge, "That the names of subscribers to the ordinary revenue of the Congregation, and the amounts of their subscriptions, be published in the annual reports," was lost.

The Report of the Session was presented by Principal Kirkland. The Communion Rolls of the Congregation showed a slight increase during the year, the membership on January 1st being 562. During the year there had been 64 additions to the roll, while 59 names had been removed by death, withdrawal from the Congregation, and other causes. On the 23rd day of May there had been an addition of four Elders to the Session, which now numbered nineteen, and a needed redistribution of districts has since been made. Reference was made to the visit of Mr. McGillivray, the re-organization of the Young People's Societies, the new Book of Praise, and the appreciation by the Congregation of "Life and Work." During the year eleven of the Congregation had been removed by death, among them being Mr. Andrew Telfer, for many years an elder; Mrs. Ewart, for so many years President of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society; and Mr. R. R. Cathron, one of the oldest members of the Congregation.

The Report of the Missionary Association was presented by Mr. Joseph Henderson, and was a brief summary of the Report to be presented at the Annual Missionary Meeting next

week. The total contributions for the year, from all sources, for Missionary purposes, were \$5,654.60.

Mr. John Paton presented the Report of the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary. There were eleven meetings during the year, with an average attendance of sixty. The contributions for the year had been \$437.29, and a box of clothing for the Northwest, valued at \$50.25. The Annual Thank-offering of \$147.85 was the largest in the history of the Society. By interesting addresses from visitors, by papers on various subjects, and by Bible readings by some of the members the meetings had been of great interest.

Mr. W. S. Ormiston presented the Report of the Mission Band, which showed a membership of 41, and an average attendance of 28. As a result of the year's work, \$205.37 had been handed by the Band to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

The Sabbath School Report was presented by Mr. C. S. Macdonald, the Superintendent. There had been satisfactory progress during the year, and the Bible Class taught by the Pastor had been of great assistance. It was urged that parents might be of much more assistance to the teachers by seeing that the scholars regularly prepared the lessons at home.

The Young People's Association presented their report through Mr. Wallace Anderson. They have three branches of work—the Bible Class, taught by the Pastor; the Prayer Meeting, taking the place of the Christian Endeavor Society; and the Institute, devoting itself to literary pursuits and sociability among the young people of the Congregation. All of these are actively at work.

The Wayside Gatherers reported their average attendance during the year to have been 33, and their contributions were \$27.99. There had been a gratifying increase in the Thank-offering.

Mr. W. E. Long reported that the Poor Fund had a balance

on hand of \$27.95, after having disbursed \$98 during the year. The contributions this year were somewhat less than last year.

The Scrutineers now reported the election of the following Managers:—Alexander Nairn, W. D. McIntosh, James Buik, T. R. Bain, John Paton, Wm. Macdonald and James Watt.

Moved by Mr. John Paton, seconded by Mr. R. C. Steele, "That Messrs. W. M. Douglas and W. S. Ormiston be Auditors for the year." Carried.

Pursuant to written notice read from the pulpit on the two last preceding Sabbaths, the members present were asked to nominate and elect three Trustees of the Church property.

Moved by Mr. R. C. Steele, seconded by Mr. Wallace Anderson, "That Messrs. A. A. Allan, Alexander Nairn and W. D. McIntosh be elected as such Trustees." Carried unanimously.

Mr. Jordan was asked to close this meeting. He said that he looked back upon the past year with special pleasure. The addition to the membership had been larger than in the previous year; there had been an increase in the membership of the Session, and the re-organization of the Young Peoples' Associations had already been productive of much good. On the other hand, though there was a deficit, it was a trifling sum for this Congregation, and the outlook for the coming year was bright and hopeful.

The business meeting was then declared at an end, and was followed by a social meeting of the Congregation, refreshments being served by the ladies.

The Session's Report.

There is very much in the record of 1897, as its events are viewed from the standpoint of the Session, which serves to make the year a memorable one. By very many, it will always be recalled with grateful recollections. Some things indeed, hoped for and prayed for and labored for, have not been attained. Moreover, death has been unusually busy amongst us; and, for the first time in nine years, one of our own number has been summoned from our sight. But God has been faithful to His promises. He has not withheld His presence or His benediction, and the labors of His servants have been abundantly rewarded.

THE COMMUNION ROLL.

The number of names upon the Communion Register shows a slight increase. Sixty-four persons have been publicly received into fellowship during the year. It was confidently believed that many others, during 1897, would have taken that step, through which loyalty to Christ usually expresses itself. Inasmuch, however, as the Pastor was not in Canada at the time of the June Communion (when there were no accessions), and since the number of removals by Certificate and by death have been considerably larger than usual, it is easy to understand why the additions to the membership have not been greater.

THE POOR FUND.

The receipts of the Fund which the Congregation annually place at the disposal of the Session, and which is intended to furnish relief in cases of pressing necessity, have been somewhat smaller than those of last year. The Treasurer has been enabled to supply much real help through this channel; but if the quarterly offerings were increased, the benefits of the Fund could be proportionately augmented.

AN ELECTION OF ELDERS.

On Sabbath, May 23rd, the Session were much pleased to receive an addition to their number. Four members of the Congregation, who had previously been cordially invited to assume the office of the Eldership, were formally inducted that day; and they have since been active in the discharge of the duties that have been assigned to them. By this accession, which increases the number of our Session to nineteen, it has been possible to re-arrange somewhat the Districts of the Congregation,—a few of which had become irregular in form and unwieldy in size. Six additional Elders had been asked for, and work for all of them could easily have been furnished; but, in the meantime, the help secured has proved a very real service.

REV. D. MACGILLIVRAY'S FURLOUGH.

The Rev. Donald MacGillivray, the Missionary of the Congregation who labors in Honan, China, returned to Canada early in the summer. Until quite recently, Mr. MacGillivray has always enjoyed very robust health. Unfortunately, however, about the time when he should have commenced his first furlough, he felt constrained to carry on towards completion a piece of literary work upon which he was then earnestly engaged,—with the result that, laboring on when he was scarcely equal to the task, he arrived in Toronto feeling far from well. Happily a change of occupation and surroundings, coupled with a measure of rest, has restored to him in a large degree

his accustomed vigor; and he is now busily addressing Congregations, in the interest of the cause to which he has devoted his life. Mr. MacGillivray has been very warmly welcomed by his many friends in Canada, alike for his own sake and for his work's sake.

INTEREST IN MISSIONS.

Allusion to Rev. Mr. MacGillivray makes it appropriate to add that the sympathetic interest, which St. James Square Congregation have always manifested in Missions, (whether Home or Foreign,) shows no evidence of flagging. Indeed, that sympathy and interest seem rather to be increasing. The two great Missionary gatherings which were held in the Church near the close of the year,—one in connection with the farewell that was given to Messrs. MacKenzie, Leslie and Griffith, who were starting for China, and the other being the formal Designation of Rev. A. S. Grant, who was setting out for the Klondike,—will unquestionably help to promote that spirit of loyalty and self-sacrifice, which are indispensable for the adequate carrying on of this important but costly enterprise.

WORK AMONG THE YOUNG.

One of the most noteworthy events in our history, during 1897, has been the entire re-organization of our work among the young. The Sabbath School, the Communicants' Class, and other well-tried agencies, are still of course being sustained, and they are manifestly fulfilling their purpose; but the inauguration of the Young People's Association,—with its various Departments, and its different lines of work,—may be said to mark a new departure in the inner life of the Congregation. The Young People's Bible Class has been exceedingly well attended from the very outset; the Young People's Prayer Meeting, which has taken the place formerly filled by the Society of Christian Endeavor, is growing in numbers and in interest; while the Young People's Institute,—with its attractive programmes, and its invariably cordial welcome for all

who come to its meetings,—has won the genuine appreciation of the whole Congregation. The outlook therefore, so far as the young among us are concerned, is unusually hopeful.

THE NEW BOOK OF PRAISE.

Another event, which must needs be chronicled, is the adoption by the Congregation of the new Book of Praise. The Committee of the General Assembly, having this important enterprise in charge, have shown rare good judgment in their selection alike of Psalms and Hymns and Tunes. The new Book was used for the first time on Sabbath morning, October 3rd, and it has already established itself securely in the esteem of all who have examined and used it. It may be added that, at the suggestion of Rev. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions, some hundreds of copies of the old Psalters and Hymnals have been forwarded to the Northwest, where they are likely to render good service in weak and scattered charges.

“LIFE AND WORK.”

Our quarterly Magazine, LIFE AND WORK, has appeared regularly during the year. It is gratifying to know that this little publication is always welcomed and read in the homes of the Congregation. The series of photo-engravings, by which its last volume has been distinguished, and which have afforded to many an opportunity of looking at likenesses of those who were formerly pastors of the Church, has been universally appreciated. To some, no doubt, as these well-remembered countenances have recalled “the days that are no more,” many of the impulses of the past have come back with a strange and compelling force, and former experiences have happily been lived over again.

THE CHOIR.

Dr. Norman Anderson, as heretofore, has taken the greatest pains with the work entrusted to his care; and, in all his efforts, he continues to be loyally supported by his Choir. The

introduction of the new Book of Praise has put into his hands a volume of such manifest excellence, and possessing qualities of such rare musical worth, that the interest in the Saturday evening Practices of the Choir has been decidedly quickened. And a like deepening of interest is visible, on the part of the Congregation, in the diets of public worship.

REMOVALS BY DEATH.

In our last Report, gratitude was expressed in view of the fact that only two of our number had been called away by death during the preceding year. Unhappily for us all, and especially for those who sorrow most amongst us, the number has risen during 1897 from two to eleven. And some of those who have recently been summoned away had, for an unusually long time, been very closely identified with the life of the Congregation. MR. ANDREW TELFER had been with us for almost twenty years, during the last ten of which he was a devoted and conscientious member of the Session; MRS. THOMAS EWART,—abundant in good works, and for over thirty-two years one of our members,—was also the President of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, over which organization she had presided for seventeen years; MR. R. RICHARD CATHRON's connection with us dated even earlier, viz., from January 1861; while MRS. WALTER INGLIS, widow of the late well-known fellow-laborer of Dr. Livingstone in Africa, had reached eighty-two years of age. Other three had in each case considerably passed the allotted span of "three score years and ten." Seldom indeed has the Congregation so suffered before, and suffered so severely, within so brief a period. To all who mourn amongst us, we extend our sincere sympathy; and we confidently entrust them to Him who, "in the multitude of His mercies," tenderly careth for them.

The Managers' Report.

In presenting their report for the past year, the Managers regret the necessity of again announcing a deficit. The Treasurer's statement shows the balance due at the end of the year to be \$318.51. As the year was commenced with an adverse balance of \$95.92, the deficit for the year is \$222.59.

A comparative statement for the past two years of the receipts and expenditure of the congregation shows as follows :

Notwithstanding the repeated requests of the Managers that the congregation increase the annual revenue to a sum sufficient to meet the expenditure, it again became necessary during the year to ask for a special collection to meet the year's deficit. As the amount contributed was far below the amount required, it was deemed advisable to hold a joint meeting of the Session and Managers to consider the financial position. It was agreed that the yearly expenditure had reached a point when little or no further reduction in it could be made, and the Managers have again to urge an increase in the contributions for the coming year, not only to remove the present deficit, but to meet the expense of some much-needed repairs to the church property.

It has become imperative to renew the heating apparatus during the coming year, and the Church building should be re-carpeted. The Managers would recommend that subscriptions be asked for, payable in instalments, for these purposes.

The Managers feel that the congregation has been greatly blessed during the past year by the zealous work of our Pastor, not only by his helpful preaching, but in the personal interest he has taken in each member of his congregation. His interest in the young people is shown by the re-organization of the Young People's Societies, brought about largely by his efforts, and the congregation has every reason to look forward with hope and confidence.

The Managers who retire this year, but who are eligible for re-election, are Messrs. H. W. Nelson, John Paton, James Buik, Alexander Nairn, R. C. Steele, Wallace Anderson and W. D. McIntosh.

It is not possible in a Report of the Sabbath School to speak definitely of the value of the work done, but we believe the earnest work of the teachers during the past year will be blessed in the lives of both scholars and teachers.

As will be seen by reference to the above list, there are as usual several changes in the Staff. Some teachers who have given valuable service to the School have withdrawn and

other members of the Congregation have come forward to join in the work. The number of scholars on the roll and the attendance are almost the same as last year. The Infant Class, under Miss Roger and Miss Campbell, continues a very interesting part of the School, and it is mainly through the additions to this Class that our numbers are maintained.

We have this year to record the death of one of our scholars, Miss Ruth Robinson.

The formation of the Pastor's Bible Class, with which have since been joined the Bible Classes mentioned in our previous reports, was an important step in connection with the Sabbath School work. As the Class is very closely in touch with the School, it has already proved in several ways a real help in our work and will certainly continue to be a source of strength to the School.

The meetings for the Study of the Lessons on Wednesday evenings have this season been unusually interesting, and for this we are much indebted to some members of our own Congregation and to several friends outside our own Church for very valuable assistance rendered.

Owing to the very small attendance during July and August, it was decided to close the School during the month of August last.

The Children's Day Services, which were held in May and October, were, not only for the children, but for many of the older people, two of the brightest and most interesting services of the year.

The Annual Picnic of the School, held at Oakville in June, and the Annual Festival in the early part of January, were thoroughly enjoyed by the children, and the enjoyment was greatly increased by the presence of so many of the parents and friends of the School.

We again invite the assistance of parents in encouraging the children to give some time to the preparation of the Lessons for each Sunday, and pray that God's blessing may be

upon the children of our School and that He may fit the teachers for the great work given to them.

It will be noted that Mr. Long has been elected Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Anderson having asked to be relieved of that office owing to the other work for which he is responsible.

The Annual Meeting of the Missionary Association was held in the Lecture Hall on Wednesday evening, January 26th, at 8 o'clock.

The chair was occupied by Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D., the President of the Association.

After the opening exercises, and a short address from the Chairman, the following Report was presented by Mr. Joseph Henderson, one of the Treasurers :—

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Committee of the Missionary Association have pleasure in reporting that \$4,564.52 has been received by the Treasurer during the year 1897, which is an increase upon the amount reported in 1896.

The increase has, however, been the result of a special collection of \$910.37 made in April last, for the funds of the Foreign Mission Committee, and which aided in lessening the large deficit with which that fund was at that time threatened.

The amount of \$750.20 was contributed towards the McGillivray Fund, which amount has enabled your Treasurer to remit the sum of \$750, which this Congregation has undertaken to provide.

The Congregation has been glad to welcome Rev. D. McGillivray, and it has been a source of pleasure to us to have had him in our midst during his furlough. Mr. McGillivray has, on different occasions since his return from Honan, addressed the Congregation, and has given most vivid and interesting accounts of the conditions and prospects of the work in which he and his colleagues have been engaged in North China.

In September a very largely attended meeting was held in this Church, under the auspices of the Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee, to bid farewell to a party of outgoing Missionaries, and in December a meeting was held in connection with the Assembly's Home Mission Committee for the purpose of bidding God-speed to Rev. A. S. Grant, who was then designated as Missionary to the Klondike region.

These meetings were very stimulating, and will, we trust, result in deeper interest being shown in these branches of the Church's work.

Whilst your Committee are gratified that the total amount received by their Treasurer shows an increase, they have to express their regret that the regular monthly and

yearly contributions made through the district collectors show a marked decrease, and as a result we have a lessened amount to allocate at this meeting to the various funds of the Church, than in previous years.

The financial statement presented herewith shows that there remains to be allocated the sum of \$1,895.23, and the following recommendation is made as to its distribution :—

The Treasurer's statement was then also presented, and on motion of Mr. Joseph Henderson, seconded by Mr. R. Clarke Steele, and after some interesting questions had been discussed, the motion was unanimously passed :

“ That the Report of the Committee of the Missionary Association be adopted ; that its recommendation as to the allocation of the funds be approved ; and that the thanks of the Congregation be given to the Lady Collectors for their faithful services during the past year.”

It was moved by Mr. W. E. Long, and seconded by Mr. R. W. Murray, and passed, “ That those members whose names appear at the head of this Report be elected as the Office-bearers of the Association for 1898.”

After a further interesting and profitable address by the Chairman, the meeting was closed by the singing of the Doxology, followed by the Benediction.

In giving an outline of work done during the year, there is necessarily some repetition, as brief reports are given quarterly in "Life and Work."

Eleven meetings have been held, with an average attendance of sixty-six. Forty-three members have taken part in assisting at these meetings, leading in prayer, in reading letters from missionaries, and imparting general missionary intelligence.

A synopsis of the "Condition of South America from a Religious Standpoint" was given by one. Another gave a synopsis of the "Life of Khamas, an African Chief."

Four papers have been prepared upon the following subjects:—"Work Among the Chinese in Canada," "Growth of

Christianity in China," "India and Medical Missions," and "British Guiana and Condition of the Coolies."

At the special request of dear Mrs. Ewart, a leaflet entitled "The Ideal Missionary," was read at our meeting in June.

We were all much pleased to have with us at our first meeting Mrs. Hunter Corbett, who told us something of her life and work in China.

In March, Mrs. Sutherland Stayner, of the Jarvis Street Baptist Church, gave an address on the "Unity Needful in Doing Work for Christ," and in September, Miss Martha Smith gave an address on "The Foreign Side of Home Mission Work."

At our annual Thank-offering Meeting in October, Mrs. Robinson, wife of Professor Robinson, of Knox College, gave an address on "Mohammedanism."

The regular meeting of the "Auxiliary" was not held in May, owing to the death of our beloved General President, Mrs. Ewart, but a large and representative gathering of the W.F.M.S. assembled in St. James Square Church on the 18th of May, to hold a service commemorative of her who had labored long and faithfully for Christ.

Two life members have been added to the roll: Mrs. Cowan and Mrs. Monteith.

"Foreign Missionary Tidings," the new title for the "Monthly Letter Leaflet," is ever-increasing in influence and interest; and it is earnestly hoped that one of these little pamphlets will find its way into every home in the Congregation.

The "Scattered Helpers" have, as heretofore, shown very great interest in the work of the "Auxiliary," and by their contributions have given the material aid which is sure to accompany a hearty interest in a cause so worthy.

The funds of the Society are made up in various ways. A General Society fee of \$1.00, an "Auxiliary" fee of 25c., offer-

ings in envelopes and by donations. There is also a life membership fee, \$25.00.

With very great pleasure we record the cheerful response of members and others who have aided in making our monthly meetings beneficial, and to Mrs. Douglas and Mrs. Woods for their valued assistance in the Praise Service.

Our meetings are held on the third Tuesday of each month, and time and labor are gladly given to make these gatherings interesting and profitable to all.

This year has been one of very steady work for the members of the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, the membership being forty-one and average attendance twenty-eight. While there has been an increase in membership, yet four of the number have left the city, and several others being engaged during the day have been unable to attend our meetings, thus accounting for the small decrease in the average. Miss Stayner gave a most interesting account of her personal experiences in China.

In Miss Haigh's leaving Toronto, we have lost one of our most interested members, who was always so faithful in her duties as organist.

Our thanks are due to Dr. Milligan for his lecture on the "Eastern Question" given in our interest, and also to Mr. McGillivray for his lecture delivered in October.

In connection with the Memorial Fund the members of the Band contributed \$3.50.

Our pastor, Mr. Jordan, and Mrs. Jordan have in many ways during the year shown their deep interest in the welfare of the Band.

In the death of Mrs. Ewart we, like all branches of the W.F.M.S., have lost a loved and always most interested and helpful adviser. At our May meeting Mrs. Watson reported very fully Mrs. Ewart's address at the annual meeting in Hamilton. It was a most encouraging address to members of Societies and will long be remembered by us all, especially as it proved to be her last address to the members of her much-loved Society.

The office-bearers and members of the Wayside Gatherers' Mission Band are pleased to report another prosperous year ; thirty-five new names have been added to the roll, and the average attendance has increased to thirty-three.

A meeting was held every month with the exception of July and August, and fancy articles of tissue paper, such as candle shades and flower-pot covers, have been made and sold to ladies of the Congregation and other friends. By this means the Band has raised \$27.79.

Early in the year, we were sorry to lose one of our vice-presidents. Miss Gavin, who was ever a faithful and earnest worker, retired in February.

In the early part of the year Mrs. MacLachlan asked each of the girls to buy and clothe a doll to be sent to Mrs. Wilson in India. Over thirty dolls, beautifully dressed, have been brought in, and two lovely scrapbooks were also made.

The office-bearers and members now, as always, cordially unite in extending an invitation to the ladies of the Congregation to visit the Band at any of its meetings.

The formation of a Young People's Association marks, in the history of St. James Square Church, at once a return and an advance. It is a return to the old ways in that, prior to 1889, a vigorous organization, known as "The Young People's Association," flourished among, and was loyally supported by, the junior members of the Congregation. But the present movement marks an advance in that the new Association is much the more comprehensive in its aim. As will be seen from this Report, it strives to secure a good deal more than the promotion chiefly of friendliness and fellowship among its members.

Briefly stated, the origin of the Association came about in this way. It had been felt for a considerable time that the Society of Christian Endeavor, which in 1889 superseded the former "Association," was not altogether successful in enlist-

ing the interest of the young people of the Congregation. The enthusiasm with which the Y.P.S.C.E. had been greeted had cooled somewhat ; a number of the most active promoters of the Society had left the city, and their places had not been occupied by others ; and thus, for various causes, sympathy with the movement had ceased to be actively manifested. Something had to be done, and the Session held several conferences touching the matter. As a result, at a general meeting of all the young people of the Congregation, held on Friday, October 22nd, the proposal of the Session was carefully considered and adopted, and the scheme of a Young People's Association was successfully launched.

It may be explained that the Association is not a working body, but a supervising body. Its function is to distribute the service, for which it is responsible, amongst its various Branches or Departments ; it is through these Departments that the actual work is done. The Association organizes new Departments, as these may seem to be required. It holds an Annual Meeting each October, for the election of officers ; Emergency Meetings, when necessary ; and an Annual Assembly, to which the whole Congregation is invited.

Thus far, three Departments have been created ; and already each has rendered very gratifying and efficient service. A sketch of the origin of each may be given in a few brief paragraphs.

Occupying the first place in the Association's scheme,—first in the order of its importance, as well as first in the order of time,—comes :—

The attendance at this Class, which was organized on October 24th, began with an enrolment of thirty-seven. The active membership has since grown to seventy, besides whom there are twenty-six associate members, and visitors are almost always present. Of the ninety-six members, thirty are young men and sixty-six are young women. About one half of the Class are communicants. The contributions to Missions, which are a free-will offering of this Class, average almost \$2.00 per Sabbath. A *corps* of "Reserve" Teachers has been established, any one of whom may be called upon by the Superintendent of the Sunday School to take charge of a Class that may be in need of a teacher for the day. Members of this Class are expected to be sixteen years of age and upwards.

The Young People's Prayer Meeting, thus far, has not grown very appreciably either in size or interest. It began its existence on Friday, Nov. 5th, with an attendance of 25. The number present each week has remained almost stationary. Inasmuch however as, until a couple of weeks ago, the workers had not been subdivided into Committees, (each of which is now charged with attending to the oversight of some particular duty,) the prospects of development have been less bright than they are at present. It is hoped that the young people of the Congregation may no longer withhold the stimulus, nor deprive themselves of the benefit, which their attendance at these meetings would be practically certain to secure. Last to be organized, but certainly not least in the interest it has awakened, is the Institute. 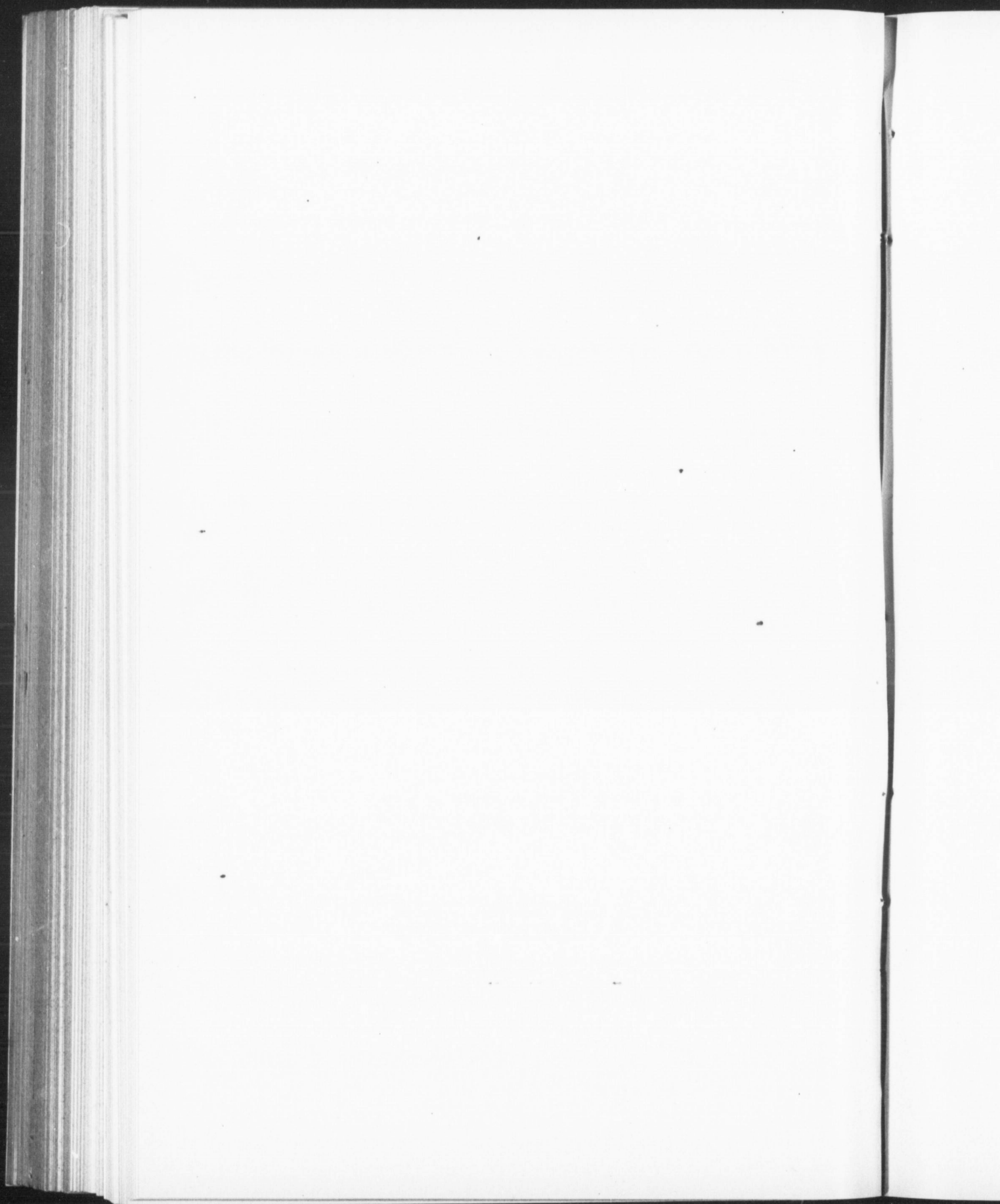

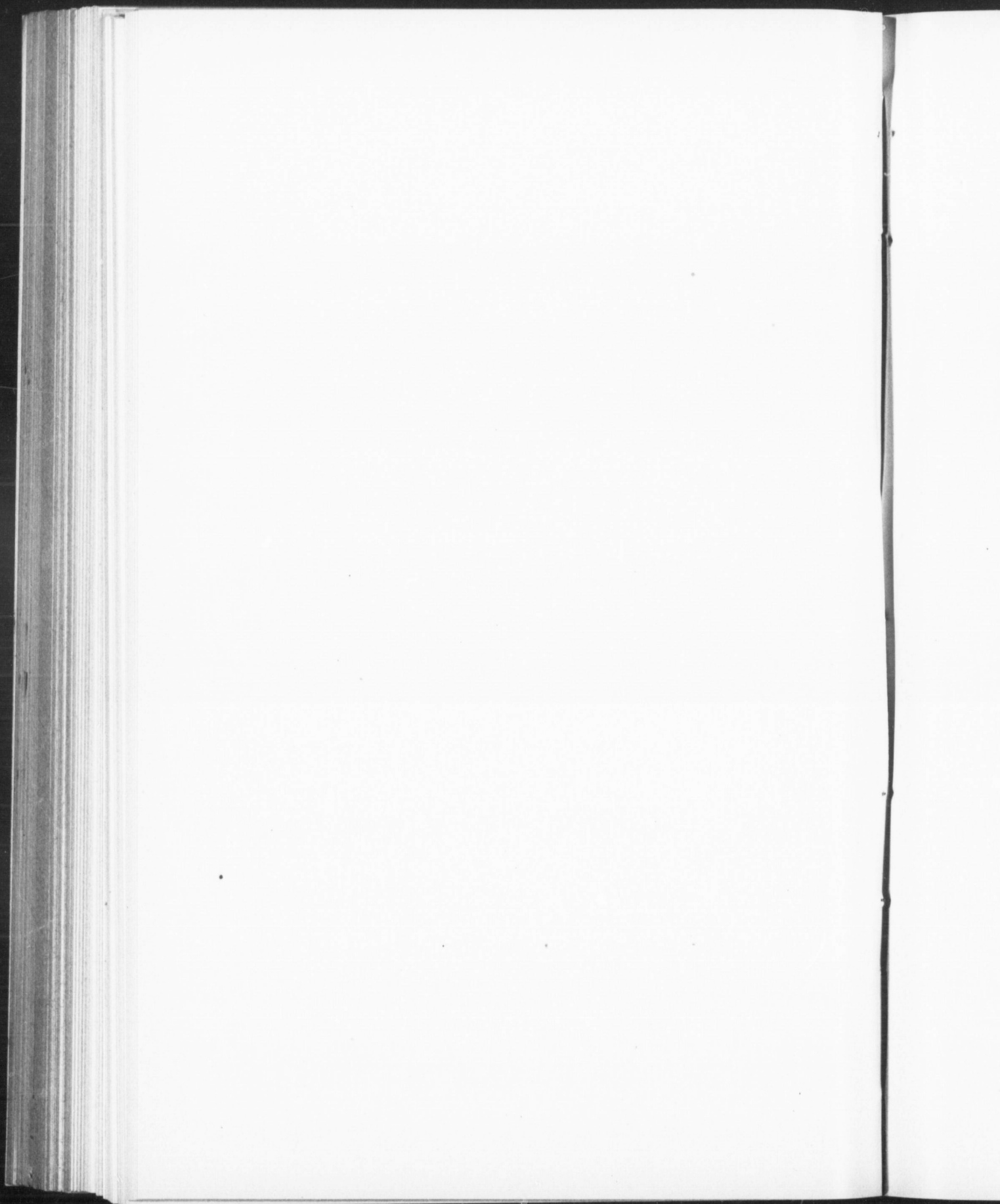

As regards finances, the Treasurer's duties have not been very onerous. At the first and third meetings, a free-will offering was asked for ; and it is satisfactory to be able to state that all outstanding claims have been discharged. A plan is under consideration which, if adopted, will enable the Executive, in future, to render material help to the Board of Managers in meeting some portion of the annual expenses of the Congregation ; but, in the meantime, the present method of securing revenue must be maintained, in order to the Institute's being able to meet its own current expenditures.

It is hoped that, before very long, the Association may feel warranted in organizing a Young People's Choir (to lend assistance in *all* the meetings of the Association, at the Wednesday evening Prayer Meetings, in the Sunday School, etc.) ; a Mission Band for boys ; and perhaps another Department. For the present, however, the Association finds itself fully occupied in supervising the work which has already been begun.

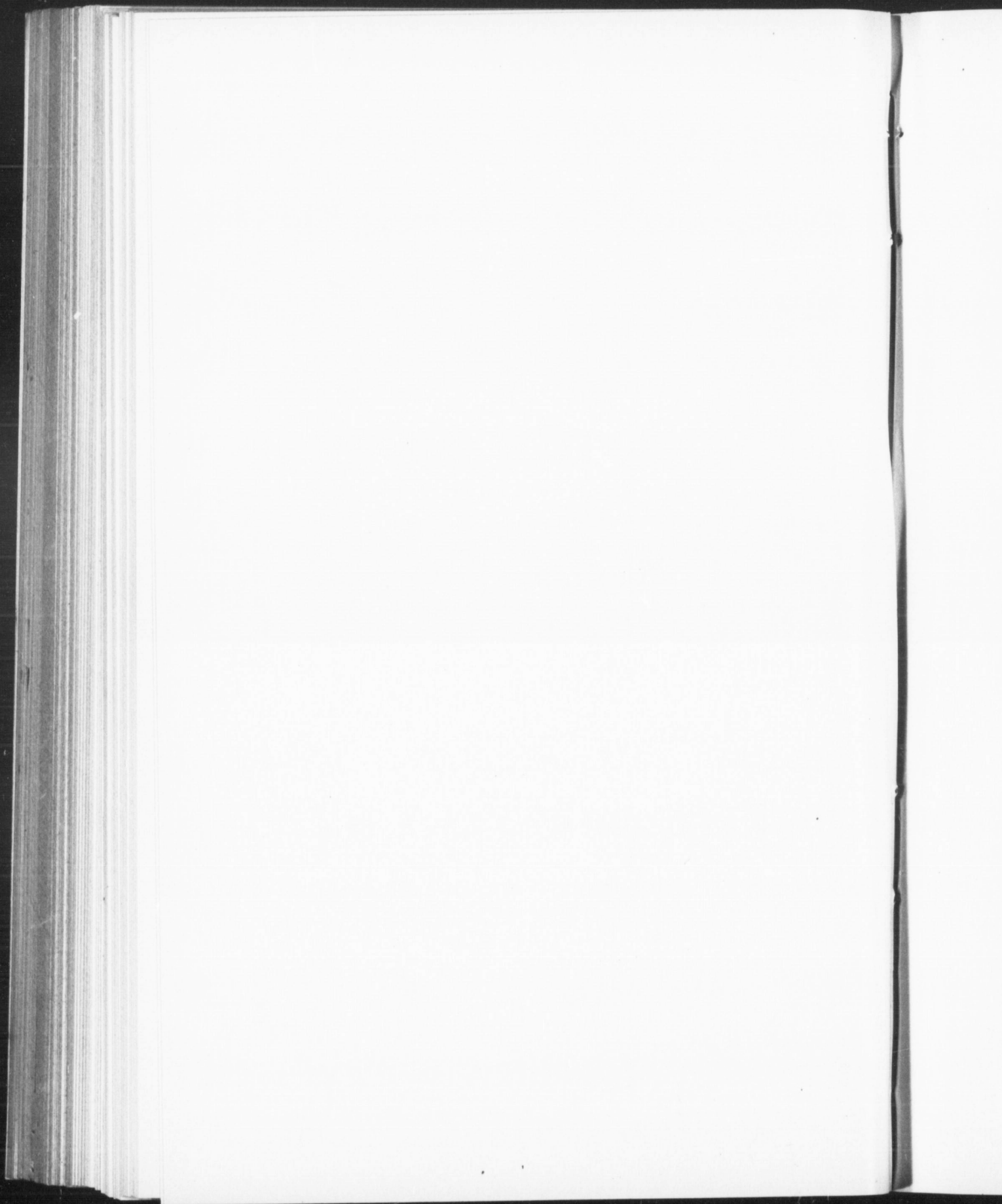

Historical Notes.

The first printed ANNUAL REPORT of the Congregation covers the history of its life and work during 1865. An effort was begun about two years ago to collect a few complete sets of these REPORTS, in order that they might be bound and preserved for reference when necessary. Only one full series, thus far, has been secured. The history of the Congregation, prior to 1865, must be sought in the official *Minutes* of the Session and of the Board of Managers.

The Congregation of St. James Square was formed by act of the U.P. Presbytery of Toronto, June 23rd, 1853. This step was the outcome of a Petition, already favorably considered at a meeting of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, whereby the Presbytery was urged to organize a second U. P. congregation in Toronto. The Presbytery granted the prayer of the petitioners, and at the same time it agreed to sanction the invitation extended to Rev. John Taylor, M.D., to act as stated supply of the new congregation.

At the beginning of its history, the Congregation was known as the "Gould Street U. P. Church." For about twenty-five years it worshipped in the structure now occupied by the adherents of the Catholic Apostolic Church, corner of Victoria and Gould Streets. In 1877 the original property was sold for \$10,000,—which sum, by the way, was exactly the amount paid for the Gerrard Street site. The present structure was at once commenced. On November 17th, 1878, the new church was formally set apart for the worship of God, Rev. Dr. Taylor, of New York, and Rev. Dr. Jenkins, of Montreal, preaching the opening sermons.

The following ministers have served in the pastorate of the congregation. The dates set after their respective names indicate the period during which each held office :—

 Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D. Mar. 27, 1894—

The Rev. Dr. Taylor spent his later life in Edinburgh, Scotland, where he died October 30th, 1880, in the eightieth year of his age. The Rev. Dr. Burns died in Toronto, August 19th, 1869. The Rev. Dr. King is still a trusted leader in our Church in Canada, occupying the important post of Principal of our College in Winnipeg. The Rev. Dr. Kellogg has returned to his missionary labors in India, where, at the same time, he is assisting in the re-translation of the Scriptures into Hindi and Urdu.

* Dr. Burns, strictly speaking, was not Pastor of the congregation, for he was never inducted. He, nevertheless, for a time, discharged the duties of the pastorate, in addition to his professional work in Knox College.

THE SESSION meets in the West Parlor on the last Tuesday of every month, or at call of the Moderator.

THE MANAGERS meet in the Managers' Room quarterly, or, when occasion arises, at the call of the Chairman.

THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION is held in the Lecture Room on one of the Wednesdays of January in each year at 8 p.m.

THE CHOIR meet for practice every Saturday at 8 p.m.

CHILDREN'S DAY is observed, and an appropriate service is conducted in the Church, twice each year, viz., on the first Sabbaths respectively of May and October.

ALLOCATION OF SEATS. A member of the Committee on the Allocation of Seats will be in attendance in the Managers' Room each Wednesday evening after the Prayer Meeting.

Members changing their place of residence should immediately notify the Elder of the District which they leave, and also the Elder of the District into which they remove. Members leaving the city, or for any cause withdrawing from the Congregation, are particularly requested to intimate their intention to the Minister or to the Elder of their District.

Persons willing to engage in any department of Christian work are urged to make known at once their desire, either to the Minister or to one of the Elders.

Cases of Sickness should be reported to the Pastor without delay. The briefest note, or a personal intimation, would invariably be deemed a service.

It is particularly requested that the regular worshippers of the Congregation show uniform and kindly attention to all Strangers, accommodating them with seats and supplying them with Hymn Books.

The Pastor is at home every day (save Saturday) between 1.30 and 2.30 p.m., when he is glad to receive calls from friends or strangers.
