MEDICAL REPORT

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MEDICAL REPORT.

We are happy to state that during the course of the year which has just expired, we have not had one serious accident in this institution.

The general health has been most satisfactory and we keep constantly making every effort to keep the establishment in the best condition of salubrity, cleanliness and comfort, in order to render their stay in the asylum as pleasant as possible to the unfortunates confided to our care. We have been exempt from all contagious diseases; still if any calamity of the kind should occur we are prepared to give our patients all the necessary care so as to stop as soon as possible the spread of infection. For that purpose we have in the vicinity of the main buildings two isolated buildings perfectly adopted therefor, and we could at once put in them any patients attacked with infectious disease.

At the beginning of the year there were in our wards 476 men and 446 women.

During the year we have received 62 men and 32 women; making in all 1016, of whom 538 men and 478 women; of this number 29 men and 18 women have been discharged.

The percentage of discharges, 50 per cent of the number of patients admitted during the year is very favorable, if we consider that we only received 35 patients whose chances of cure might be deemed favorable.

The remainder of the patients admitted had to be classed as offering but little prospect of being cured.

This leads us to deplore once more the criminal neglect which families display in the treatment of those of their members who become insane. Generally they are confined only when they have become a source of embarrassment for the family and a danger to society, sometimes months and years after the disease has declared itself and when every chance of cure has disappeared.

In each of our previous reports we laid great stress on this point but unfortunately without any appreciable result.

The number of deaths was sixty-five ; thirty-six men and twenty-nine women, say : 6.39 per cent.

This percentage is a little lower than that of previous years and compares favorably with that of institutions in other countries. A glance at the death tables in this report will show that out of those who died, six were octogenarians while 25 had reached an age between 60 and 80 years.

We have now under treatment nine hundred and four patients, four hundred and seventy-three men and four hundred and thirty-one women.

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FIRST PART.

Since its foundation, that is to say, during the 38 years of its existence, our establishment has received within its walls 4,570 insane persons; of this number 1,810 have been discharged, and 1,856 have died. At the present time we have 304 patients under our care.
