N. Y. Herald Calls on U. S. Government To Take Action

Bring Prussianism to Quick Account For Sinking of Stephano—Submarine Not Heard From For More Than Day and Night

New York, Oct. 10.—The New York Herald, under one caption: "This time for action not for 'weasel words,' says: "Surely even the most pugnacious pacifist cannot find excuse for delay on the part of the government of the United States in bringing Prussianism to an immediate account for the sinking of the Red Cross liner Stephano, plying between St. John and New York.

There was much speculation as to whether the German commander trusted to chance when he virtually advertised what he was going to do and went about doing it so deliberately or whether his apparent confidence in his plans was based on an exact knowledge that a vital strip of the American seaboard had been left unprotected by the British patrol.

"We are all Americans on this side of the Atlantic. The Stephano was engaged in peaceful commerce between two American ports. Her international status was just as clearly that of an American vessel engaged in American coastwise trade as if she were of American registry and flew the flag of the United States.

Christiania, Oct. 10.—A Russian torpedo boat on Sunday sank two German submarines near the Norwegian coast, according to information received here today from Petrograd. Several persons were killed by the gunfire of the submarines.

He went overseas with the First Contingent and has been in the front for about eighteen months with No. 1 Field Ambulance Corps. His brother, Private Fred Carten, was recently wounded while fighting in the ranks of an infantry battalion in France, but has now practically recovered. Private Gerald Carten is also in hospital at Boulogne, but his wounds are slight.

DEATHS

Private Chapman had been wounded twice, but was again in the trenches when he contracted tonsillitis, and passed away on September 26. Private Chapman was in his twenty-first year. He enlisted with the 61st Battalion in Edmonton, Alberta, in August, 1914, and in September of the same year he was drafted with fifty-five others, to the 40th Battalion, going directly to the front.

DEATHS

Mrs. Eliza Wilson of West St. John has received a field card from her son, Pte. Chas. E. Wilson, dated September 17, stating that he had been admitted to the hospital with wounds. No further particulars have been received. Pte. Wilson went overseas with the 26th Battalion. He has been in the trenches more than a year and this is the first time he has been wounded. The relatives are anxiously awaiting official word, which has not yet been received.



LIQUOR IN HALIFAX. (Halifax Echo) Intoxicating liquor is being sold openly, in the streets, on the wharves and in a hundred and one places which could and should be ferreted out. But Mayor Martin and his colleagues are making no move. Instead, by defeating every movement aimed at the proper enforcement of the law and by doing nothing in the face of the most flagrant violation of the law, they have in effect rendered notice on the boot-leggers, the blind-peddlers and the hole-in-the-wall men that they are not to be molested unless somebody "splitts" on them, in the police court.

And so we have the spectacle of the men who have sworn to enforce the law, aiding and abetting in its violation. What is official Halifax coming to, anyway? Up to July 24 the Australian Wheat Board received £12,250,000 for the sale of wheat abroad and in Australia.

DIG INCREASE IN CARS PREDICTED

Benjamin Briscoe Believes There Will be 5,000,000 Automobiles in Use in 1919

Five million automobiles in America by 1919, or 2,600,000 more than the number now in use, is the forecast made by Benjamin Briscoe, president of the Briscoe Motor Corporation, in his book "Looking Forward in the Automobile Industry," advance copies of which have just come from the press. Mr. Briscoe estimates that the output for 1916 will aggregate 1,200,000 cars, and, to illustrate the gigantic strides which the industry has made, sets this enormous figure alongside 3,700, the number of cars of all makes produced in 1899.

"We have in use today practically 3,400,000 automobiles," says Mr. Briscoe in his book, "and the estimate of production for this year is 1,200,000. This estimate probably is somewhat extravagant on account of the difficulties experienced by many manufacturers in obtaining material and labor. The automobiles made in 1911 will have gone out of commission some time in the course of 1916, so if there should be, say, 1,100,000 cars made this year the increase in the number of automobiles at the end of 1916 would be about 800,000. This would start 1917 with 3,900,000 cars.

"For the year 1917 we would deduct the 1916 production of 400,000 and add 1,100,000 cars, which probably will be the production for 1917 (production still being influenced by shortage of material and labor), giving us a total at the end of 1917 of 4,000,000 cars in use. At the end of 1918 deduct the production of 1918 on approximately 600,000 and add 1,500,000, making a net increase of 1,000,000 cars. Therefore, July 1, 1919, there will be 5,000,000 automobiles in use. Estimating these figures as being approximately correct (and they may vary up 500,000 or down 500,000), there will then be 'rolling in the United States a total number of about 5,000,000 automobiles."

Mr. Briscoe concludes from income statistics, population increases, wealth gains, etc., that the "saturation" point is more likely to be 8,000,000 cars than 5,000,000. He states that half the machines now being sold are bought by farmers, and that of all the farmers in America at least fifty per cent eventually will have automobiles within the next few years, giving more than 3,000,000 automobiles to the agriculturists alone.

Going further into the future, Mr. Briscoe says that in 1920 the 1915 cars will have to be replaced. He estimates the number at 900,000. To this will be added the sales from the increase in



Not a Single Life Lost in Transporting Armies to France.

In a report to the admiralty, reviewing the operations of the Dover patrol since December, 1915, and recommending numerous officers for meritorious conduct, Vice-Admiral Sir Reginald Bacon, commander of the patrol, says that in the six months more than 21,000 merchant ships, apart from men of war and auxiliaries, passed through the patrol lines. Of these only 21 were lost or seriously damaged by enemy vessels. "But to effect this security to merchant shipping," says the admiralty, "this vast transport has been so thoroughly safeguarded that not a single life has been lost during the sea passage."



Thanksgiving services were held by several of the city churches yesterday. The little three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Chlp Hunter of East Florenceville was instantly killed on Saturday morning when she fell from the top of a load of potatoes, being driven by her father, and one wheel of the vehicle passed over her. The funeral was held on Sunday at the East Florenceville Methodist church.

Dr. McIntosh, who left Hartland a year ago to join the R. A. M. C. in England, returned home on Sunday. He has during his absence, seen service in Egypt and other parts of the eastern war zone. He was given a splendid reception at his home town on arrival. He will resume his practice in Hartland after a short rest.

It is reported from St. Andrews that the Booth Fisheries, Ltd., expects to rack 20,000 cases of sardines this season. Good catches of sardines are reported about the mouth of the Digbyquash river and the Magaguadavic river. A wooden weir has been jacked in the Magaguadavic river as an experiment and if it works well a metal weir of similar construction will be placed in its stead.

Sunday afternoon Detectives Briggs and acting Detective Armstrong were notified that the residence of H. G. Marr, 248 Germain street, had been broken into and many articles of wearing apparel, also \$100 in cash, stolen. The wearing apparel was found in the grip of Della M. Scott, a former employe of the Marr family. She was taken to police headquarters.

Andrew Ingraham Robertson, who says he is a returned soldier, now faces several charges of theft. He was arrested last evening in a boarding house on Princess street, as a result of a complaint made by Mr. McIntyre, barber. He is charged with the theft of twenty-six shares in the Scotland Woolen Mills, the property of Alexander Ingraham, also with the theft of a safety razor.

W. T. Brokaw, the well known New York millionaire, has acquired about 160 acres of land at McDougall's Lake, near St. Andrews. C. W. Macdonald, of St. John visited the property last week and made estimates on the new camp which this New Yorker intends to erect there. Mr. Brokaw intends to establish a hunting centre at McDougall's Lake for the benefit of big game hunters in the S. metropolis.

Yesterday at noon telephone communication with West St. John was re-established and subscribers on both sides of the harbor were heartily glad. The vast amount of work necessary to move the new exchange was carried out with rapidity by the men of the N. B. Telephone Company and in fact the work was completed in less than a week. The West Side exchange, which was anticipated at the beginning of the operations. During the period of the inactivity of the West Side exchange, the British army were set up and 440 lines connected. Three additional operators will be employed on the new exchange.

Reports have reached the city to the effect that Lieutenant Percy Sherran, member of the Royal Flying Corps, has brought down five machines in one day single-handed, while the British army aviators on that front watched with wonderment and surprise his magnificent feat, and on several occasions he has been mentioned in despatches. He was a member of the staff of the Bank of Nova Scotia here when the call came for men of the 29th he signed on, but after his arrival in England was turned down as being locally unfit. prison life, are directed by an order issued by James M. Carter, state superintendent of prisons, no longer to extend to convicts sentenced to life, or long imprisonment, privileges which would carry them outside the prison walls.

It was explained at the prison department that the order had been prompted by the escape of two inmates from Sing Sing, the latest of several recent escapes, and that it was directed at Sing Sing prison, although its terms had been made general, and no exceptions would be permitted in any prison.

Soon after signing the order Mr. Carter received word that W. H. Coniller had escaped from Great Meadow prison, where he had served fourteen years of a seventeen-year term for murder. Mr. Carter's order reads:

While it is not the intention of the superintendent to interfere with the experiment which you are testing at your institution, in view of my recent order as regards escapes, I have decided that hereafter the privileges of convicts known as "lifers" and those having long terms to serve, must be confined inside of the walls of the institution, this order to take effect at once.

Mr. Carter has instructed his chief clerk to investigate recent escapes from Sing Sing and from the Matteawan Hospital for the Criminal Insane.



Ottawa, Oct. 9.—A new Dominion five per cent three-year debenture stock, maturing on October 1, 1919, with interest from date of purchase, payable by check free of exchange, is being issued by the finance department. The new stock will be available for purchase at par at any time and will be advertised in a few days at which time all particulars will be given. The new issue promises to be very popular as a safe, patriotic and profitable investment.

BOY SCOUT NOTES

A Bucharest despatch states that when German aeroplanes dropped bombs on the city, killing about forty civilians, "Boy Scouts engaged courageously in maintaining order among the entire population." In the early part of 1916, Bristol, Eng., introduced a practical scheme for utilizing all her Boy Scouts in the event of air-craft raids. The scheme caught on there with such enthusiasm that it was unanimously adopted in other parts of the continent. This scheme was introduced with the one idea of giving large numbers of Boy Scouts an opportunity to "be prepared" if occasion should unhappily arise. In the event of an air-craft raid a scout's duty consists of assisting in rescue work, procuring equipment from nearest troop headquarters, sending for police and other assistance, calling attention to dangers from explosives and cables, giving first aid assistance and performing numerous other duties.

STREET CARS USE THE MILL STREET RAILS AGAIN

Progress of Street Work in North End and Graveling of Marsh Road

Last night the street cars were allowed free passage along Mill street for the first time since the new street work was begun there. Although the concrete laying had been completed the street car traffic was tied up until the new work had time to "set". Tenders for the portion of the work which is to be carried out with contract were closed yesterday. The offers will be considered at a meeting of the council this afternoon. SHELL WHICH WOUNDED SAINT JOHN SOLDIER KILLED TWO OTHERS

Three More Were Hit—Private Freeman Gardner Writes Home of Big Offensive on Somme Front

"At last a big one burst right behind the party that I was in and got six of us. Two of them died in a few moments and three got it in different parts of the body—I got it in the neck, right where the chicken got the axe," writes home Pte. Freeman Gardner, who is now wounded and in a hospital in Boulogne, France, in the course of his story of the great British advance on the Somme front.

With stoic complacency he writes that his wound is not very serious, although he admits that it was made by a shrapnel bullet, which would not likely make a very light injury.

Speaking of the Somme offensive he says: "I suppose you have read about that big advance at the Somme on September 14. Well, that's when I got it. We had been up digging a trench from our old front line up to the new front line, the one we had taken that morning and at half past eleven we started for dinner.

"We were getting along nicely and were just about ready to jump across what was the German front line, the night before, but who's our third then, when 'Frits' started to send over some shrapnel. Well, they were bursting all around us and at last one burst right behind the party I was in."

The damage caused by the bursting of that particular shell is already related. Pte. Gardner says that he is being given excellent treatment at the hospital and expects to be around again in a short time. It is a noteworthy fact that he is one of two brothers now at the front and his father is also serving in a C. E. unit. The family lives at 124 Thorne avenue.

CAUGHT IT EARLY OR MUCH DAMAGE MIGHT HAVE RESULTED

Quite a Bad Water Situation Discovered in Vicinity of One Mile House

A small sized river that had lost its check rein and was running wild was discovered by Commissioner Wigmore and his assistants on Saturday afternoon when they went to the vicinity of the One Mile House for the purpose of installing the new meter boxes.

Arriving at the point where the work was to be effected the men heard a great rushing of water and found that the brick vault and three tiers of brick in concrete and the break is immediately adjacent to the wall, so that a large part of it will have to be torn away before the work can be properly accomplished.

A very fortunate feature of the whole thing is that the turning off of the big main, which was necessary before repairs could be made, did not leave any portion of the city without water and since the work was begun the lowest pressure recorded has been twenty-two pounds. A new throat was installed on Sunday and it being found that the stopcock on the "M" was also out of order a new one has been installed. The commissioner hopes to have the repairs completed within a very short time now, and every effort is being made to rush the work.

CAPT. CORELLI RETURNS

Captain A. D. Corelli arrived in the city yesterday from Valenciennes where he has been for the last few months on the staff of the New Brunswick brigade as brigade captain. It is not definitely known just what position he is to fill in St. John, but it is understood that he will be attached to the 10th Battalion as an instructor. Captain Corelli was the O. C. of the branch of the R. I. 1 which was conducted here last winter, and when the school was broken up he was transferred to Valenciennes where he was attached to Brigadier-General McLean's brigade.

A VETERAN JOURNALIST

Still vigorous and cheerful in his seventy-seventh year, after sixty years in the printing business, J. J. Anslow of Windsor, N.S., is in the city on business, and is going north to see old friends before returning home. Mr. Anslow is one of the old guard. He worked for the Daily Telegraph in Dr. Elder's days, and has long been a newspaper publisher on his own account. A couple of years ago he gave over the Hants Journal to his son Harold, and has since busied himself to some extent with his garden and a little fire insurance business, but the old habit remains and he still does some newspaper work, including recently a three column report of a notable memorial service. Mr. Anslow's reminiscences of old times in newspaper work are very interesting and he should find time to put them on paper.
