The United States has found it necesparate to eak for the recall of certain representatives of Germany and Austria, who disregarded the laws of hospitality and carried on a vigorous propaganda against Britain and her Allies, even to the extent of interfering with the operation of American industries and American commerce. The United States has had no trouble with the representatives of Britain, France, Russia or Italy, but only with the arrogant and unscrupulous agents of the Central Powers. Germany has not yet agreed to a settlement of the Lusitania affair that is satisfactory to the United States government, nor have her agents and those of Austria ceased their, warlike activities on the meutral soil of that country. On the whole, this has not been bad for the Allies, for the brutal and blundering Teuton has elienated American sympathy by his manner and his methods, and by his total disregard of any rules or usages that may appear to stand between him and the goal he seeks to attain.

No doubt there will now be an outcry from the Berlin press, which will have the effect of deepening the American feeling of resentment. The people of the United States have borne much, and under such a leader as Roosevelt they would long since have taken more vigorous action to uphold their own rights and the rights of humanity.

Letter of Interest From Fairville Soldier-Writes of Lieutenant Being Wounded

am with the machine gun section as we are in a good dry place most of the time. The only time we get wet is going in and out of the trenches. Lots of the boys will get out and walk along outside the trenches and take a chance of getting shot rather than walk through the water and mud.

"I suppose the papers are writing about the 26th. Well the boys are all doing their duty, that is all a fellow can do. We have just received a lot of men from England to take the place of those killed and wounded. I suppose you read in the paper about Lieut. Carter, our machine gun officer, being wounded. We were very sorry to lose him. He was our officer ever since I enlisted. He was a fine fellow. We had a letter from him and he is getting along fairly well in hospital in England. A piece of shrapnel went in his hip and came out by his knee. His home is in New Brunswick.

"If a fellow ever lives to get through this I guess he will be able to stand anything. There is a rumor around here that we are going to Scrbia. I only hope it is true. Of course the fighting is more severe out there, but a fellow has a chance to do something.

"Well, mother, as it is getting late I guess I will have to close, all I can say is that I wouldn't have missed the experience I have had since I came out here for anything. Just wait until I come back and hear some of the stories I have to tell. I have passed through three countries since I left Canada and I wouldn't want to live in any of them, Canada for me."

### WAR'S INROADS UPON

The British House of Lords has suf-fered to such an enormous extent in the war that it is seriously in danger of ex-

tinction.

The deaths of 560 peers, heirs to peerages and members of titled families have already been reported. Of the 616 members of the House there is said to be not one who has not lost a son or other near relative. The Marquis of Lansdowne, the Conservative leader of the House, described the situation correctly when he said:—"The House of Lords has become a House of Mourning."

One remarkable consequence of this wholesale slaughter is that many titles will become extinct and many famous English castles and stately homes will cease to be associated with the families to which they have belonged for generations. In most cases they will pass to daughters or more distant relatives of the last owner through the female line.

It is impossible to catalogue all the noblemen and members of titled families who have fallen. Besides, the list is being increased by new names daily. A few conspicuous instances will prove to what an extent the ownership of historic estates has been changed by the war.

The Marquis of Lincolnshire has lost his only son, Viscount Wendover, and has no other male heir. He is the owner of historic Gwydr House, in North Wales, which his family acquired through marriage with the last heiress of the very ancient Welsh family of Wynn. This place is famous in early Welsh legend and the name "Gwydr," strange to say, means in Welsh "House of the Bloody Hand." The Marquisate will now become extinct and the estate will pass to daughters.

Lord Ribblesdale, now an old man, has

Lord Ribblesdale, now an old man, has lost his two sons and has no brothers or other male heirs to his title, which will therefore become extinct. He is the owner of Gisburne Park, Yorkshire, a beautiful old estate, which has been in the possession of the Listers—the family name of Lord Ribblesdale—for centuries. Now it will cease to be associated with the name.


Lord Waleran has had his only son sent back from the war, dying. He is the owner of Bradfield Park, in Devonshire, a house and estate which have been in his family for over 800 years.

Lord Stamfordham, private secretary to King George, has lost his only son, Captain J. N. Bigge. His title will probably become extinct unless his present wife dies and he remarries again, and his seat, Dunham Massey Hall, at Altrincham, will cease to be connected with his name.

Lord Knaresborough has lost his only son, Captain Claude Meysey-Thompson. He has been a great social light and was a particular friend of the late King Edward. He has a magnificent country estate, Kirby Hall, near York, noted for its stables. There is no one of his name to which this place can pass.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 80—Approximately 18,000 men have been recruited from the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and recruiting is proceeding at the rate of 400 men a week. The work is in efficient hands, and increasing efforts are meeting with increasingly satisfactory results. These provinces have an aggregate population of less than 1,000,000 and the recruiting ratio to date will be slightly under 2 per cent.

New Brunswick claims to have recruited about 8,000, this being the estimate of Capt. Tilley, recruiting officer for that Province. In Nova Scotia splendid work is being done by Lieut. W. B. A. 



The thorough work of Captain Florence since his appointment as the recruiting officer for the county, was demonstrated in a striking manner on September 10 last, when reinforcements were called for the Royal Canadian Regiment, then enroute to England, Scarcely had the ship with the regiment on board left Canadian shores when the recruiting officer received a telegram asking for 100 men for the R. C. R., for overseas service. The men were wanted at once, Captain Florence immediately went to the barracks—and the recruits who were then on parade were addressed by him. He read the telegram calling for men for the regiment, and the recruited men stepped out prepared to leave at once for "somewhere in France." or anywhere.

The recruiting of the 36th Field Battery, C. F. A., C. E. F., now in winter quarters at Fredericton barracks, which was accomplished by Major Crowe, in one day, can hardly be equalled in any part of the Dominion of Canada. Major Crowe, who had offered himself for service, at the time the old 17th were to be sent across the Atlantic, and assurred the department that another battery of artillery could be secured in Sydney, received orders from Ottawa during the latter part of July to recruit a battery for overseas service, and to proceed to Kingston, Ont., to qualify for its temporary command.

During the major's absence at the Royal Schol of Artillery, the names of young men desirous of enlisting with the new Field Battery were received by Anthony MacMullin, a Sydney newspaper man. On the return of Major Crowe to begin recruiting the 36th battery, he was handed the names of men desirous of enlisting numbering over 200. Of these Mr. MacMullin secured 148, or the equivalent of one battery, plus ten percent. over strength. Major Crowe began the recruiting of the new battery on Friday, September 10 and by Saturday noon the 36th was a few over strength—and awaiting equipment so that the unit could get into camp. Mr. MacMullin assures the recruiting officers that another battery or even two batteries could be mobilized in Cape Breton with as little difficulty as the 36th was raised, for artillery is a most popular branch of the army with the Cape Breton boys.




