Turks Send British Battleship To Bottom

London Is Cheered By News From Athens

Constantinople in a Month, Says a French Observer—Offensive Work at Two Points in West — Brilliant Hundred Bodies of Lusitania Victims RECRUITS FOR Success of Cossack Cavalry

London, May 12—London was cheered today by the publication of a despatch from Athens recording a decided advance of the British and French troops along the Gallipoli Peninsula.

On the Bukowina frontier Petrograd reports a brilliant success won by the Russian Cossack cavalry over the Austrian infantry. The Russian horse-men, forcing their way through a series of barbed wire entanglements, dis-lodged the Austrians from three lines of trenches and captured 2,000 prisoners, a battery of quick firing guns, several searchlights and a whole string of cais-

Russia admits that the Austro-German offensive is still proceeding in Western Galicia, while Vlenna says that the Russian retreat is fast becoming a rout, with the invaders suffering enormous losses.

CONSTANTINOPLE
IN A MONTH?

Mitylene, May 18—Considerable progress has been made by the allies since a week ago, when they had advanced four miles up the Gallipoli Peninsula. Three days ago the Turks were fighting desperately to prevent their being push-ed into the sea between Maidos and the town of Gallipoli. The allied troops from Sedd-El-Bahr, Gaba Tepe and the Gulf of Saros, were converging on them, assisted by the fire of the ships on both sides.

From the Gulf of Saros the Queen Elisabeth and other warships were concentrating a heavy fire on Plaisir and the north end of the Bulair lines to prevent the Turks from crossing to Gallipoli to Join the forces near the town, Gallipoli was in flames as a result of the bombardment by the fleet.

It is evident that hard fighting must be expected between Maidos and Gallipoli, as the Turks have greatly strengthened the fortifications since the first attack on the Dardanelles. They have lines of trenches about thirty metres apart, and artillery on the surrounding hills.

A high French authority considers that in a month's time, the Bulair lines will have been forced and Constantinople entered.

The Goliath Torpedoed In The Dardanelles; Feared Five Hundred Lives Lost

London, May 13—The British battleship Goliath has been torpedoed in the Dardanelles. It is feared 500 lives have been lost.

Announcement of the loss of the Goliath was made in the House of Commons this afternoon by Vinston Spencer Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty. While no definite information apparently has been received as to the number of lives lost, Mr. Thurchill said he feared it would reach 500.

Queenstown, May 13—Lord Wimborne, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has issued an order in Dublin that bodies of persons drowned on the Lusitania if found along the Irish coast, shall be brought direct to Queenstown without an inquest in small towns where they might have happened to be landed. This order should greatly expedite the identiful.

A fishing boat reported last night having sighted no fewer than 100 bodies floating ten miles south of Glandorne, on the southwest coast of County Cork. This would upset the contention that the current, wind and tides had so scattered the bodies as to make the recovery of any considerable number of them doubtful.





Great importance was attached by a paris correspondent yesterday to the success gained by the French to the north of Arras. The cables to the morning papers told of further success in that quarter and noted the capture since Sunday of 4,000 prisoners. At the points along the line all German attacks were repulsed, by the British as well as the French. The German losses are said to be heavy.

In the east the Russians claim that the Austro-German loss in inte days sighting has been upward of 100,000. A Cracow despatch says the enemy loss since the first of May has been 168,000, but admits a Russian loss of 50,000 in prisoners alone. The Russian reports claim, moreover, that where they have been compelled by a great concentration of enemy forces to retire it has been done in fairly good order and to stronger positions. In short there is no hint of discouragement in Russian circles, in relation to the situation in Galicla and the Carpathians, and they are pursuing the retreating Germans in the northern portion of the fighting area. Today's news from Petrograd asserts emphatic sheer immense concentration of forces, have gained no real tactical advantage, and that now in a stronger position and heavily reinforced, the Russians are ready to take a "hearty revenge."

The news from Rusy grows more and more warilke, and the determined attitude of the United States makes the future appear more and more ominous for Germany and her allies.

No fault can be found with the action taken by President Wilson and his cabinet in their note to Germany. Virtually it means war. Germany will neither make reparation for past crimes nor pledge herself to refrain from similar acts in future. It is a great source of satisfaction to the friends and admirers of President Wilson that he has taken a firm stand, and that his speech in Philadelphia was not an indication of his attitude in relation to Germany. The moral effect of the action of the greatest of the neutral nations will be The moral effect of the action of the greatest of the neutral nations will be far-reaching. Germany is left without a friend or sympathiser apart from Austria and Turkey, and these have good reason to lament their surrender to the spirit of Prussian militarism. It was evident from the tone of the American press that while the people had no desire to embarrass the president in a great national crisis, they wanted action such as would uphold the dignity and honor of the nation. They have not been disappointed, and in the course it has pursued the government has strengthened the bonds of Anglo-Saxon friendship to a degree that perhaps at this moment cannot be fully measured. The people of Canada will be especially gratified to have their belief confirmed that the great republic, so closely united with them in trade, in sympathy and in similarity of institutions and language, does not hold lightly those principles of national honor and international good faith which have been so grossly violated by Germany in this war.

Thanks to the vigilance of the Liberals and the manner in which they forced the enquiry into the parliament buildings scandal the province now enters upon an era of clean government.



It is planned to lay new sidewalks in Kingsville, hitherto a much neglected district. Where necessary, blasting will be done to clear away rock from the path of the proposed sidewalk. The walk will be made two feet wider, with a wooden retainer on the gutter side, while the inner side wil run away to a natural crown.

The old culverts, which have not been renewed in years, are to be built. Where the waik leads over a deep gully or a culvert hand rails are to be placed as a precaution for pedestrians.

At the C. P. R. crossing in Milford, always a nasty piece of roadway, a trestle is to be erected and the gutter will run under it and enter the concrete take away pipe, which is being laid by the railway company. This is expected to do away with large pools, always characteristic of this particular section in spring and fall.





Germans Checked By British

Stirring Account of Saturday and Sunday Effort to Break the Khaki Lines-Official Eye Witness' Report

London, May 12, 9.30 p. m.—The official British eye-witness under date of May 11 gives an account of the German attempts on Saturday and Sunday last to break the British lines around Ypres, and the commencement of the Anglo-french offensive north of Arras. He says:

"The calm that prevalled Thursday and Friday proved to be only the lull before the storm. Early Saturday morning it became apparent that the Germans were preparing an attack in strength against our line running east and northeast from Ypres, for they were concentrating under cover of a violent artiflery fire, and at about 10 o'clock the battle began in earnest.

"At that hour the Germans attacked our line from the Ypres-Poelcappelle road to within a short distance of the Menin high road, it being evidently their intention, while engaging us closely on the whole of this sector, to break our front in the vicinity of the Ypres-Roulers railway to the north and to the south of which their strongest and most determined assaults were delivered.

"No asphyxiating gases have been em-loyed by us at any time, nor have ney yet been brought into play by us."
