

Mallahy gave McCaffery his wages and the two left together, riding from the Hoyt avenue station to Bridge Plaza, where they separated. Previously Mallahy said he had told McCaffery to report to the Roulston general offices Monlaw. McAleer said McCaffery lived

said he had told McCaffery to report to the Roulston general offices Monday morning to arrange about a bond he had failed to sign.

The Ludwig Baumann building is three-quarters of a mile from Bridge Plaza, where Mallahy last saw his clerk alive. The building fronts for a block along the Long Island railroad tracks and occupies a deserted and unlighted site.

Moorfield was left in ashes; the settlements of Ludlow were entirely destroyed. Bertibogue, Napan and Black River were involved in the common ruim. 


Dalhousie Students Consider Withdrawal From All Intercollegiate Sport.
