





Warren, Ohio, April 9-Three prisoners were injured and thirty others panic when a dynamite bomb was exploded under a window in the west corridor of the Trumbul county jail here.

The blast tore a hole through the

four foot stone wall on the west side of the building, too small, however to permit the wholesale jail delivery which it is thought, was the aim of the perpetuators of the bombing. Win-

sidence adjoins the jail in the rear, together with his family, was awakened by the blast and pushed into the jail proper, where the wildest scenes of disorder were being enacted as some of the prisoners sought means of escaping, and others in the cells beat their fists against the bras and shouted to be turned lose.





"The invention will mean millions and millions of dollars to the Province of Quebec and Canada at large, and I am positive that it will work," said Mr. Joanovici.

Joanovici refused to divulge his secret of how he will perform the miracle of keeping hundreds of miles of waterfront from freezing, outside of saying that he will do it by "water disturbance," and that electricity will be an important factor.

"I am prepared to state," he said, "that I will hold open for navigation the St. Lawrence River between Montreal and Quebec during the winter months, and that the channel will be wide enough to permit two ships to wide enough to permit two ships to the said, "that I will be the regular summer navigation, with 60 to 75 ships a day, which will do away with a large amount of railroad transportation in the winter months."

Mr. Joanovici said he has worked seven years on his invention, and that his last trials in the Niagara River have proved conclusive.
