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HEAVY BURDEN FOR THE MOTHERLAND

London Papers Discuss Dominion and Navy... Easier for Empire Than Any Other Nation to Maintain One Power Standard But Soon Beyond Power of British Isles Alone.

London, March 15—(Canadian Associated Press)—Discussing the naval estimates and the question of the development of dominion navies, the Daily Telegraph remarks that, while the dominions enjoy the advantages of autonomous government under the protection of the imperial navy, their total contribution to naval defence now amount to less than a quarter of a million pounds.

The dominion governments have admitted, the Telegraph says, that this does not accord with the proper feelings of self-respect of the dominions. The solution of the problem of establishing the partnership of the dominions in the matter of naval defence is fraught with many difficulties, and it is for the dominions rather than for the mother country to determine the manner of meeting their responsibilities.

It would be for the whole trend of imperial policy, the paper proceeds, for the dominions to attempt to impose any system of co-operation without the consultation and approval of the dominions.

The paper points out that in order to maintain even a modest standard of naval strength, the mother country must spend two pounds on every man in the empire, and it expresses the belief that the dominions will not be content to let the whole of this burden to rest upon the shoulders of the people of these islands.

The Daily Chronicle observes that while it is evident that the empire as a whole could more easily maintain the one power standard than any other political unit on earth, such a task soon pass beyond the power of the British Isles alone.

DOUBT IF MONTREAL WILL GET FIGHT Will Be On This Continent, Says Rickard—Late News of Sport.

New York, March 15—The world's championship match between Georges Carpentier and Jack Dempsey will not be held in Europe, but on the American continent, so Tex Rickard announced today. He was expected some time this week to promoters interested in bidding the bout in Montreal. He said he was not ready to make public his answer today. He added that he had received word that Carpentier would arrive in the United States on May 1 to start training for the bout. The general impression among those who are in close touch with Rickard is that the fight there is but little likelihood of the fight being staged in Montreal.



An amendment by J. T. Halg's Conservative leader, Winnipeg, expressing regret that no mention had been made of any intention by the government to reduce the municipal levy, was defeated 28 to 10. J. Berrin's amendment to Mr. Heig's amendment was voted out 32 to 4. THE CITY'S DEBT The bonded indebtedness of St. John is figured at about \$100 per capita, according to figures prepared in the city chamberlain's office and which will be sent to Halifax in response to a request from the council of that city. The amount of outstanding bonds is \$5,585,920.97, but against this amount the city has on hand a sinking fund of about \$1,467,000, to which will be added this year another \$100,000. As none of the outstanding bonds will mature before 1923, another large sum will be added to the sinking fund next year before it is required to retire any of the issues. Of the \$100,000 to be added to the sinking fund this year, \$39,462 will be obtained in the 1921 assessment, and the balance will be from the earnings of the civic departments, such as water, harbor, etc.

BRITAIN BUYS CABLE LINE Leased to Western Union and Will Be Reserve Imperial Cable.

London, March 15—Purchase of a direct cable to the United States was announced by H. P. Pease, assistant postmaster general, in the house of commons last night during an explanation of post office estimates in the pending budget bill. He said the British government had acquired the cable for 2,670,000, including 1,000,000 worth of cable stock and cable stations at Ballinacorney, Ireland; Harbortown, Wick, Ireland; and Harbortown, Wick, Ireland.

The pulpwood industry, he said, represents a capital investment of \$65,281,040 and a total of thirty-eight establishments in Ontario.

CALL ON GERMAN FOR 20 BILLION MARKS BY MAY 1

Demand Made Yesterday By Reparations Commission If She Persists in Refusal, Says Paper, She Must Be Compelled—Bills for Army of Occupation First to Be Met.

Paris, March 15—Germany was yesterday called upon by the Allied reparations commission to carry out article 238 of the Versailles treaty, which stipulates Germany must pay before May 1, 1921, the equivalent of twenty billion gold marks. The treaty provides that this payment must be paid in gold, commodities, ships, securities or other valuables and that out of this sum, the expenses of the armies of occupation are first to be met.

The commission also took steps to carry out article 238 of the treaty, which provides that Germany must pay before May 1, 1921, the equivalent of twenty billion gold marks. Germany persists in refusing to make payment, says the Parisian, in discussing the action of the commission, "she will force us to impose upon her the significance of yesterday's meeting."

The League of Nations by Germany, against the penalties being enforced by the Allies on Germany, because of her refusal to carry out her reparations obligations, the paper remarks that the Germans are "losing time and trouble."

"The supreme council," it continues, "has decided upon advice of French and English experts that the penalties will be applied, not only because of Germany's evasion of reparations payments or her refusal to carry out the terms of the Paris agreement, but because of the obligations which the treaty imposed upon her."

Vienna, March 16—World wide war on Judaism was contemplated in the Austrian anti-Semitic congress yesterday. A world anti-Semitic congress was called to meet in Budapest next autumn and a central bureau was created to get in touch with anti-Semitic centres throughout the world.

The resolutions call on the government to expel all alien Jews by April 1, or accept responsibility for grave consequences, and also to impose exceptionally severe penalties on all alien Jew offenders.

ROCHE FIGHTS FOR COMMISSION

Against Return of the Patronage System Chairman of Civil Service Board Addresses Federation in Ottawa—Present Method Not Yet Fairly Tried Out.

Ottawa, March 15—Hon. J. J. Roche, chairman of the civil service commission, delivered some sturdy blows at those who would "turn back the clock" and restore patronage when he addressed the civil service federation convention yesterday.



BUILDING UP DEFENCE IN ST. PIERRE CASE

At the trial at Edmundston, yesterday, of William St. Pierre, charged with the murder of Miss Minnie Stevens, the defence produced witnesses to testify that the accused was at home at the time it is contended he committed the murder. His brother-in-law swore that St. Pierre was in the house at the time the prosecution is endeavoring to prove he did the deed, and fixes the time positively by the fact that he had his watch in his hand taking his wife's pulse when he heard St. Pierre talking to his mother. His brother-in-law's name is Hoody. Another fact set up by the defence was the presence in town that day of two strangers, who disappeared the following afternoon. Leo Gillespie, then manager of the hotel at which the two men stayed, testified that they had come to the hotel and registered and had supper. They went out in the evening and returned about 10:20, though he did not see them until breakfast time the next morning. One of the chamber maids had called his attention to the fact that there was blood on the sheets of the bed in which they slept.

RECENT DEATHS

The death occurred at Lower Norton (N. B.) yesterday of Dr. Byrnes, a well-known resident, who passed away in the seventy-eighth year of his age, leaving his wife and three children to mourn his loss. The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock from his late residence.

J. C. Graham, formerly of Andover but lately of Presque Isle, died recently at the age of seventy-two. He is survived by his wife and one son and three daughters.

GERMANY SETS RECORD IN OUTPUT OF DYES

London, March 15.—A special correspondent of The Daily Chronicle who recently returned from Germany writes: "The German dye industry has scored another record. Before the war German production of dyestuffs was 185,000 tons. Last year the amount was 145,000 tons, the biggest amount ever produced in one year in the whole of the industry's thirty years of history. "But the record has been broken during the months of January and February of this year. In January the total production was 18,000 tons and the amount rose in February to 18,000. Presuming the monthly production remains for the rest of the year at the February figure, Germany will this year produce 178,000 tons of dyestuffs. It is not too much to say that the figure will be a good deal nearer a quarter of a million tons.

"It learns that the dye concerns have decided on a big spurt. Never have they been so efficiently organized, never so well provided with capital and never so determined. Though they turn out between four and five hundred different shades of dyes, the industry is concentrating mainly on the making of those for which there is and will most likely be the greatest demand. The cost of production is still very low—about a quarter of the British figure.

"Early in the summer it is hoped to have completed large stocks of the color most in demand, and the financial position of the dye concerns will permit of those stocks being sold at extremely low figures for the express purpose of conquering foreign markets.

"Germany's two great dye opponents are Great Britain and the United States, and it is the markets there she has set her heart, or rather her brain, upon, in spite of restrictions, for she thinks she will be able to overcome these.

"An intensive campaign is being organized and will be opened in a few months. Already the German dye industry is doing very well in the Far East and South America, in both of which regions sales have even now surpassed the pre-war figures."

R. regarded a tri-weekly service as quite sufficient to care for the 1-1/2 of present offering on the St. John and Quebec Railway, and that no cur-

tallment in service was made save with the approval of the Dominion Railways Board.

A great council meeting of the chiefs of the Six Nations will be held this week at the Onondaga Reservation to outline a plan of action. The Indians in Canada, it is claimed, have been ordered to take out citizenship papers in the Dominion within thirty days. 

Pearls Must Be Worn or Lose Value.

The writ issued by the superior court of San Francisco directing Mrs. James B. Blum to wear for thirty days each year under police guard a \$100,000 pearl necklace left by the death of a relative in order to keep "off" in the gems, through contact with her body, has interested owners of pearls.

It was set out in the petition for the writ that upon the death of their owner the pearls were locked in a safety deposit box and were deteriorating in lustre and value. This is an attribute of pearls well known to those who deal in them. It gave birth in ancient times to the superstition that pearls sickened and died through grief over the death of their owner.

Pearls are one of the oldest jewels known to mankind. They were fashionable in the days of Egypt, Babylon, Greece and Rome when those great nations of antiquity knew nothing of the diamond. 

EXPORT CREDIT PLAN IN BRITAIN

New York, March 14—Advances made by the British Board of Trade to facilitate commerce with lesser states of Europe under the Export Credits Scheme amounted to £184,784 up to December 31, 1920. Applications for advances totaling £1,400,084 have also been approved. The advances and applications in detail, according to advice received by the Foreign Information Department of the Bankers' Trust Company, of New York, were as follows: Advances July to Oct., 1920: For Roumania and Czechoslovakia £27,305 Advances Oct., 1920 to Jan., 1921: For Roumania, Poland, Finland, Baltic States, Bulgaria, Jugoslavia, Czechoslovakia 82,147 Previously advanced 29,242 Total advances £184,784 Applications approved: July to Oct., 1920 £ 68,778 Oct., 1920 to Jan., 1921 948,084 Previously approved 882,227 Total applications approved £1,400,084

The Export Credit plan became operative in September, 1919, with a fund of £200,000,000 provided by parliament. It permits of advances up to 100 per cent of the cost of goods being granted in approved cases to British exporters trading with the countries named. Safeguards are applied to insure, as far as possible, payment abroad for the goods exported, but the Government assumes 80 per cent of the loss if, despite the precautions taken, there should be a default.

IMPRESSIONS OF NEW SPEED BOAT

Established New Record in Trial Events—New Creation is From the Hands of Albert Hickman, of Eastern Canada.

The Palm Beach News of a recent date publishes the following interesting article:

Palm Beach now boasts the newest thing in boat construction, a craft that promises to revolutionize speed boat types. She is George Leary, Jr.'s, Orlo II, which created a considerable sensation among the experts at the Miami regatta recently, and Mr. Leary is taking his friends out for speedy spins up the lake and out into the ocean, for the Orlo II is not daunted by heavy surf.

Incorporating such radical changes in boat construction that she will probably mark a departure as far ahead of the present variety of displacement boats as the screw propeller was over the old paddle wheel, Leary's craft leads the way, and all of her performances are officially recorded.

The Orlo II is practically the reverse of what every other speed boat is. She was designed by Albert Hickman, a Canadian, and is a development from the fast sleds he designed for naval purposes during the war. Exhibited at the motor boat show in New York, her type attracted a great deal of attention, and Mr. Leary ordered the Orlo II, built so he could race her for the Fisher gold trophy.

The most striking novelty is her propulsion system. Equipped with surface propellers in contrast to the screw propellers on speed boats, she eliminates all of the resistance that the propeller shaft under water generates. This resistance is placed as high as thirty-five per cent of the total. On the Orlo, however, all of the propeller that touches the water is the working part and there is no obstruction whatever on her bottom. The water line comes just up to the shaft in this new type, and the blades seize hold of the water and have nothing to do but drive the craft ahead.

The second element in this topsy-turvy conceived boat is that she has the sea sled type of hull with an inverted V bottom, which makes for stability and seaworthiness, and she eliminates the flat bottom of other speed crafts in heavy water. Likewise this cuts up the boat's spray, instead of throwing it to the side as is the case with the V bottom boats.

The third significant difference is the fact that her rudders are on the side and the fourth that her bow is larger than her stern.

In appearance, however, this does not make an odd looking craft, but instead creates what might be called an automobile class, with the Orlo figuring as a water limousine, capable of throttling down to twenty-two miles an hour and rushing forward at the rate of forty-seven miles per hour with the boat showing at top form at any speed.

The principle of the surface propeller is one that was looked upon as a joke for many years. Indeed, one expert declared that a boat built with what would merely stand still in the water. However, the Orlo proved the contrary to be the fact and in her qualifying trials at Miami she made forty miles an hour with seven members of the committee on board. The boats must qualify at thirty-five miles or better.

Until the Orlo came along the Rainbow held the displacement records with 41.8 statute miles, on a weight of seventeen pounds per horsepower. However, Leary's craft on a weight of twenty-five pounds per horsepower sped ahead at the rate of forty-seven statute miles per hour in the trials, one racing being made against the wind.

Her efficiency ranks her far in the forefront that the other type of craft in the recent quite old-fashioned in comparison. On Wednesday, with Gordon Hammerby aboard, she went out for a trial into a sea that ran seven and eight feet high, which another speed boat would not have dared to attempt. Old salts standing at the side topped their heads in amazement as she bucked out into the ocean at a high rate of speed.

HEART BEATS HEARD HUNDRED MILES AWAY

Washington, March 15.—An amplifying apparatus described as so delicate as to permit a physician to make a stethoscopic study of the heart action of a patient 100 miles away was demonstrated today to a group of army and civilian medical men at the Army Signal Corps laboratories. The principle involved is similar to that used in transmitting President Harding's inaugural address to the great crowd that extended far beyond the ordinary reach of the human voice.

The demonstration was directed by Brigadier-General George Squire, chief signal officer. The stethoscopic apparatus with electrical connection was placed over the heart of one of the laboratory assistants and the heart beat was amplified through a phonograph horn to be heard distinctly and studied by the physicians in a room some distance from that in which the subject was located.

The device may be used in connection with any telephone wires and will function, it was said at the laboratory, as far as the telephone wires will transmit the voice in ordinary conversation.

"A special heart transmitter has been designed which rests by its own weight over the patient's heart," said General Squire, in describing the apparatus. "The passage of the blood through the different valves of the heart causes vibrations in an air chamber which faithfully reproduces all of the various actions. These are transmitted over the wire to an amplifying apparatus attached to a large horn, which projects the sounds throughout the building."





VERY NEARLY A FATALITY

C. N. R. Section Crew Jump From Hand Car a Few Seconds Before It Is Splintered By Speeding Engine.

A matter of seconds separated George Gallagher, of Torryburn, section foreman of the C. N. R., and his crew of three men from instant death in an accident which occurred last week in the rock cutting near Lawlor's Lake, between Brookville and Torryburn stations. A light engine bound for the city crashed into a hand car on which they were riding toward Torryburn a few minutes after the men jumped into the ditch on the side of the line.

The place where the accident happened is on a fairly sharp curve with walls of rock towering on either side of the track. The cutting is spanned by a highway bridge at this point. There is a heavy grade towards the city and it was down this grade that the engine was running at a good rate of speed.

The crew had finished some work near Brookville and were on their way to Torryburn. They were pumping the car by the hand up the grade and the first intimation they had of impending danger was when the head of the engine swung into sight around the shoulder of the cutting. There was immediately a wild jump for safety and a few seconds later the heavy engine crashed into the hand car, splintering it and scattering the tools of the section crew in all directions.

The engine was brought to a stop but not before it had traveled some 200 yards, and the crew returned to the scene of the wreck. Finding that the workmen had escaped with a few slight scratches, it proceeded again on its way. Mr. Gallagher and his workmen are to be congratulated in the hair-breadth escape.

MOTHER WITNESS AT EDMUNDSTON

Says St. Pierre Was At Home On Murder Night

(Special to Times.)
Edmundston, N. B., March 13.—On the resumption of the trial of William St. Pierre this morning, the cross examination of Leo Gillespie was continued. He could not swear that Room No. 8 was occupied on the night of October 12, 1920.

The next witness called by the defence was Francis St. Pierre, brother of the accused. He said he was living at home on last October. He did not know if anyone got a suit of his brother's clothes. The accused had not worn his suit last October. The witness said he is a brakeman for the Transcontinental. He was working on the night of October 11; reached home at 3 a. m., but did not see William. He saw him on the next day.

Counsel for the defence wished to offer in evidence conversation of the accused and his brother concerning the affair, which took place after the body was found. Objection was taken by the crown and was sustained by the court. A statement made by the accused after he had been arrested was ruled out also.

The witness was not cross examined and was on the stand only a short while. Louis Michaud was next called by the defence. He said he resided in Edmundston city life. On the day on which the body was found he went in front of the garage where the body was placed. He saw a crowd of people there. He saw two strangers leaving the other garage. They did not stop but kept on going. They went along Canada street pretty fast. They didn't stop. He had seen them before; took notice of them on account of their automobile.

SEEK NEWS OF MISSING VESSEL

J. T. Knight & Co., local shipping agents for the Italian government this morning received a telegram announcing that the Italian steamer Monte San Michele of 10,000 tons deadweight, which sailed from New York on February 2 for Italy has not been heard of since her departure, notwithstanding that American naval and representatives of foreign authorities have been interested in news of her whereabouts. J. T. Knight & Co. have been asked to inform masters of ships at this port of the matter and to see them to communicate any information which may reach them regarding the vessel as well as keeping watch during navigation for possible clues.

EMPLOYMENT IMPROVING.
Judging by the number of applications being received these days at the mayor's office, the situation in the city has improved materially within the last few weeks. The mayor's clerk said this morning that on several occasions he has communicated with men whose names are on his list as unemployed, offering them work, and has been advised that they were working. 
