CONTROL HORSE RACES IN CANADA

National Association is To Be Formed

DECIDED ON IN TORONTO

Looked on as Most Important Step Taken by Horsemen in Many Years—Batling Nelson Fails to Knock Out Sorenson

(Canadian Press)
Toronto, Feb. 6.—Members of the Canadian Standardbred Horse Association decided at their annual meeting yesterday to organize a national trotting and racing association, similar to the American Trotting Association and the National Trotting Association, to control racing in Canada. A committee consisting of O. B. Sheppard and George Pepper of Toronto, and James Cowan of Canington, was appointed to bring about the organization and incorporation of the association.

The decision is regarded by horsemen as one of the most important events in many years, in the interest of the standard bred horse.

It is not the intention of the new association to become a racing organization. All money from membership fees, etc., after paying the legitimate expenses of conducting the association is to be used to advance the interests of the standard bred horse in both breeding and racing.

Another important matter was dealt with. The government is bonusing owners of thoroughbred stallions who, for a nominal figure, place their horses at the disposal of farmers in certain districts, and the standard bred men feel that the same thing might be done for them, saying that there is no better cross for remounts than the thoroughbred cross with the standard bred.

Kingston, Feb. 6.—Kingston surgeon has performed an operation for appendicitis in exactly seven minutes from the time the patient was placed on the operating table. It took just three minutes to make the incision and remove the appendix. It is claimed that this is a Canadian record.

Moncton, Feb. 6.—In a points competition for a trophy offered by M. Lodge in the Moncton curling rink last night, C. B. Trites made the remarkable score of fifty-one in a twelve foot circle, which is probably a record for Canada. The former record on the local rink was forty-seven, by E. H. Allen some years ago, on the old fourteen foot circle. Other high scores were made. Curling on the same ice with Trites, A. G. Lindsay made 43.

CLOTHING MAN ARRESTED

Five Leaders in Garment Workers' Strike Also Imprisoned—Riot Has Brought Difficulty Nearer Settlement

Rochester, N. Y., Feb. 6.—Five leaders of the garment workers' strike, Abraham Seltzer, Louis Solomon, Benno Cardin, Harry Schrebnick and leaders Miller, are under arrest today charged with inciting riot and Valentine Seltzer, proprietor of a clothing shop, is also imprisoned on a charge of first degree murder following a riotous attack on his shop last night. Ida Berman, one of the strikers, was killed when Seltzer fired into the crowd. Eight others were injured in the affair, but not seriously.

WILL NOT CONTINUE THE COPYRIGHT OF PARISAL

Berlin, Feb. 6.—The imperial parliament's committee on petitions today refused even to consider a petition to prolong the copyright of Richard Wagner's opera "Parisal" beyond December 31 of this year, when it will expire in the ordinary course.

RAILROAD CONSTRUCTION FOREMAN MURDERED

Hindsdale, N. H., Feb. 6.—James Stewart Hamilton, a railroad construction foreman of Rochester, N. Y., was beaten to death some time last night. The body bearing many bruises, was found in the woods near his boarding place, four miles outside the town today.


Hamilton had charge of 1,000 men, most of whom are foreigners, engaged in building the new Burlington Vermont and Hindsdale N. H. branch of the Boston & Maine Railroad. Yesterday was pay day, but the foreman did not handle the money and no motive for the attack upon him is apparent. He was thirty-five years of age, and is survived by his father, mother and brother, who live in Rochester. The contractors have offered \$10,000 reward for the detection of the murderers.

HOLD MARCONI COMPANY TO ITS EMPIRE CONTRACT

London, Feb. 6.—The postmaster-general has declined to release the Marconi company from its contract to erect a chain of wireless stations throughout the British Empire. The decision was taken on the advice of the Marconi parliamentary inquiry committee.

W. R. Lawson's ordeal before the committee still continues. Yesterday he asked Lord Haldane, who was examining him on the subject of his allegations of misdeeds in the Marconi boom, not to treat him as if he were a prisoner in a police court. Mr. Lawson admitted that he had written several things he certainly would not write again.

TURKS' CANNON ARE TURNED AGAINST THEMSELVES



TURKISH CANNON FIRED BY BULGARIANS

Loosengrad, Turkey, formerly called Kirk Kilise, had its name changed when the Bulgarians captured it. Along with the town the victorious troops captured hundreds of pieces of artillery. Most of the guns are of a modern type and will prove serviceable to the allies when hostilities are resumed. The Turks did not get much use out of the cannon, owing to the lack of ammunition. The Bulgarians will not be handicapped in this way, and the capture of the cannon has therefore materially strengthened them.

BOARD AWAITS RETURN OF ALL REPORTED DEFEAT OF TURKISH FORCE

Sofia, Bulgaria, Feb. 6.—The Turkish army occupying the Peninsula of Gallipoli and defending the Dardanelles, suffered defeat at the hands of the Bulgarian troops at the south of the river Kavay yesterday, according to semi-official statements made at the Bulgarian war office.

The Ottoman troops are said to have retreated in disorder toward the town of Bulair, a small place to the northeast of the city of Gallipoli. They were pursued by the Bulgarians.

The statement concludes that as the result of this success, the Bulgarian troops, nearly the whole coast of the Bosphorus as far as Bulair is now in the hands of the Bulgarians.

London, Feb. 6.—The main object of the Bulgarian army, apart from the reduction of the fortress of Adrianople, was the defeat of the Turkish troops, which are said to be endeavoring to reach the Dardanelles straits and to clear them for the passage of the Greek fleet into the Sea of Marmora, whence it will be able to attack Constantinople.

From the reports of the fighting to the north of the peninsula of Gallipoli, it can be seen that the columns of King Ferdinand's troops are marching straight for the city of Gallipoli. It has occupied all the villages of Mediate, Charium, Llavak and Bulair, which are on the neck of the peninsula. It has not yet, however, made any contact with any large force of Turkish troops, of which there are said to be 70,000 on the Gallipoli peninsula. These, in the opinion of military experts, should, owing to their favorable position, be able to offer a strenuous resistance to the advance of the Bulgarians from the north. The guns of the Dardanelles forts also can be trained toward the land side, so that the Bulgarians have a severe task before them.

AMBASSADOR BRYCE TO THE ARBITRATION COURT

London, Feb. 6.—James Bryce, British ambassador at Washington has been appointed by the British government a member of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague.

It was announced at the time of Ambassador Bryce's resignation, that his departure from the United States would depend upon the settlement of the Panama canal question between Great Britain and the United States.

COMMISSIONERS APPROVE OF TERMS FOR THE EXTENSION

The city engineer was in conference with the commissioners at noon today regarding certain clauses used in the regular form of contracts and specifications. Some objections have been made by contractors who felt that several of the requirements bore too harshly on them, and they are asking for a revision of the form. No definite action was taken today.

At today's meeting the commissioner of public works presented the proposals regarding the extension of the street railway to Kane's Corner, made yesterday, in the form of a resolution and received the approval of the commissioners.

The Hospital Jewellery Company moved their stock out and the Merchants' Bank got ready to vacate. London sent a portion of the fire department.

DUKE TO SEE REAL THING IN HOCKEY GAME IN CANADA

His Royal Highness to Attend on Saturday—Likely Back to Six Man Style

Montreal, Feb. 6.—For the first time in his life the Duke of Connaught is going to see a professional hockey match. His Royal Highness has been an occasional spectator at amateur games in Ottawa, but has never been persuaded to see a game as played by professional teams. He has decided, however, to visit the Montreal arena on Saturday night when the Tecumseh and Wanderers will play.

The National Hockey Association fans have probably seen their last seven men hockey for this season. After last night's games President T. Emmett Quinn, decided that during today he would call a telegraphic vote among the six clubs of the league on the matter. The result of the vote looks like a foregone conclusion.

The Wanderers, Quebec, Canadiens and Toronto are in favor of a return to the six men style; Tecumseh is doubtful, and Ottawa is frankly in favor of the seven men game. The playing of last Saturday's games and of yesterday's games has demonstrated pretty clearly that if any change in the number of players in the teams should be made at all it should be made at the beginning of a season, and not in the middle.

The attendance has started to fall off with the seven men game, however, six men hockey is likely to be restored at next Saturday's games.

LOCAL PURCHASES OF REAL ESTATE

The large three-story brick warehouse on South Ward, formerly known as the Robertson building, but lately owned by Messrs. Gandy & Allison, has been purchased by John F. Gleason, a substantial figure. It is understood that the purchase is for outside interests, whose intention is to occupy the building as a warehouse. It is splendidly adapted for this purpose, being one of the most solid brick structures in the city. In addition to Messrs. Gandy & Allison, the building is occupied in part by the Mianus Motor Co.

COAL MINES AFIRE

Hundreds of Thousands of Tons in North Dakota Wasted

Grand Forks, N. D., Feb. 6.—Hundreds of thousands of tons of coal are being consumed in burning North Dakota by fires which are burning in undeveloped mines and action will be taken by the state legislature to halt the destruction of the state's natural resources.

Evidence regarding the destruction of lignite coal by slow fires was received at a hearing yesterday to investigate the possibilities of the North Dakota coal fields. The state geologist reported that there are about 32,000 square miles of coal beds in the state with an estimated tonnage of 500,000,000,000 tons.

GUT PASSENGER RATES TO CANADA

Hamburg, Feb. 6.—The German and Dutch steamship lines announced today that the average rate from Europe to Canada would be cut to \$30 instead of \$40. The cut includes also the Austro-Canadian service from Trieste, Austria to Montreal.

ST. JOHN ODDFELLOWS EXPECTED

Calais, Feb. 6.—Calais will entertain the Maine brigade of Patriarchs Militant, I. O. O. F., and the dates for the field day and meeting of the council have been set for June 10, 11 and 12, 1913. Frederick W. Hinkley, of Portland, a former Calais boy, is brigadier-general of the militia and L. M. Robinson of St. Stephen, a major on General Hinkley's staff, with Captain C. W. Matthews of Calais is on the committee of arrangements for the field day. The local members of the Patriarchs Militant are already making arrangements for the affair, which promises to be one of the most successful ever held by the Maine brigade. It is expected that the department commanders of New England and the maritime provinces will be guests of the Maine department on this occasion.

STORM RAGES IN THE ROCKIES

Worst of the Winter Bothers The Trains

Montreal, Feb. 6.—By far the worst storm of the winter has been raging in the Rockies since Monday and the ten hours late arriving on the prairies. Dice threats are made against the Canadian Pacific railroad coal pile at Eyebrow, for serious fuel famine exists there. Special constables have been sent to guard the company's property and trouble is feared. It seems that fuel dealers of Eyebrow have gone out of wood and coal and have no orders in for more. Conditions there are very acute.

TROUBLE OVER C. P. R. GOAL

Winnipeg, Feb. 6.—Hon. George Lawrence, minister of agriculture, announces that the provincial government will establish immigration offices in England, Scotland and Ireland, \$10,000 being appropriated for the inauguration of the plan. The government is also loaning \$5,000 for the purpose of paying the passage of worthy farm laborers to Manitoba, the money to be repaid. The minister will go to the old country at the close of the session regarding this scheme.

STRAIGHTEN OUT MATTER OF NEW YORK PIERS

Washington, Feb. 6.—Secretary Simonson yesterday approved changes in the pier head lines on both sides of the Hudson River at New York and Hoboken, which he believes finally will insure the Hudson River from further encroachment and afford a basis for the permanent adjustment of the long-standing controversy between the local and national governments over the location of the piers.

After correspondence between himself and Mayor Gaynor, which the secretary regards as sufficiently binding upon the city and state of New York, he has relocated the pier lines so as to provide for the longest piers in what are now the broad reaches of the river, taking the precedent to embody the agreement in the form of a memorandum to be filed in the war department.

By its terms the secretary approves the report of the harbor line board, so as to permit the straightening of the pier head lines on the New York side between the Battery and the foot of Gansevoort street, permitting the construction of piers more than 1,000 feet long thereon and also straightening the pier head lines on the New Jersey side of the river between the Morris canal and basin and the foot of Fifth street in Hoboken. The latter will permit the necessary accommodations for the Hamburg-American line and the North German Lloyd line without narrowing the river gorge, while the former extension will accommodate the International Mercantile Marine Company after their long piers in the Chelsea district have been shortened.

NEW YORK DOCTOR SAYS HE HAS CURE FOR CONSUMPTION

Serum Which Acts to Strengthen Resistance of Cells in Body

New York, Feb. 6.—A cure for tuberculosis is claimed by Dr. Burgan of this city, and is said by physicians to rival that of Friedrich Friedmann of Berlin.

Dr. Burgan also uses a serum, but works on a different theory as to the cause of the disease. The method he uses is to inject serum taken from healthy pigs such as was used to strengthen the resistance of the cells in the body.

He disputes the theory of Doctor Koch as to the cause of the disease. He says that the germ known as the Koch tubercle is a negligible factor and that weak resistance is the real cause. He has tested it on a half a dozen patients and given the records of cure affected in each. He says he will furnish the serum to police dispensaries and hospitals at the cost of making it, so that it will be available to the public at a cost low enough to be of service even to the poorest.

GIBRALTAR GOVERNOR CAUSES SENSATION

Sharp Reply to Chamber of Commerce by Which Body His Act Was Objected To

London, Feb. 6.—The governor of Gibraltar, General Sir Archibald Hunter, has created a sensation by a speech published in the official gazette. He recently issued an order regarding men employed in dockyards and residing on Spanish territory passing through the town on their way from work. The chamber of commerce petitioned the governor to rescind the order, as it was prejudicial to shopkeepers. The governor called a meeting at which he delivered a speech in which he declared:

"The chamber of commerce thinks of nobody but themselves, but the fortress is not maintained purely for commercial interests. The chamber takes no time for reflection. I did nothing without careful study and without devoting deep thought to cause and consequence. Better if the chamber of commerce had taken time to reflect. This town is like the Augean stables. You remember the action taken by Hercules in connection with the stables. I make no pretence to be a Hercules, but I do claim to know what I am talking about and I am determined to exact order and decency here from everybody who comes into the fortress command."

"Let everybody understand that I'm not devoting deep thought to the causation and consequence. Better far if my critics would do the same."

ENLARGE COURT HOUSE FOR CITY AND COUNTY BUILDING

A plan to remodel and enlarge the court house building to provide accommodation for the city and county offices is under consideration. When the proposal to erect a new municipal building in the Market Square at a cost of \$300,000 was given a twelve months' hold at the last meeting of the county council the alternative scheme was proposed. Commissioner Agass says that, by adding two stories to the court house building and making an extension on the eastern side toward the registry office enough room could be secured. The cost is estimated at \$100,000, and the sale of the present city hall would bring at least half that amount. The remodelled structure would replace the present city hall, the city offices in the ferry building and the county offices in the Walker building, Prince Wm. street, and the Harbottle building, Princess street. An architect has been engaged to draw plans for the work.

The petitioner, who is a creditor for \$14,000, asked that the company's affairs be wound up on the grounds of insolvency. The defence was made that the only proof of insolvency recognized by law is failure to make payment within sixty days of demand, and that no demand had been made. The case was adjourned until March 6 to hear evidence.

FARMERS AND TAXATION

(The Square Deal).
The fact of the matter is that other causes are operating to depopulate rural Ontario, also to depopulate the rural New England. These causes are the burden of taxes on farm improvements, discouraging the security of money for the construction of roads; and the light tax on unused or poorly developed land enabling the owner to hold it unused or partly used.

In every farming district of Ontario it is true that the land could support twice the present population in greater comfort than it is supporting the present population. The cure is very simple. Give the townships the right to reduce the tax rate on buildings and improvements and increase it on land values. Most townships would take advantage of this power to a greater or less extent at once.

The increased tax would incline the owners of undeveloped areas to meet the offers of those who would develop them. At the same time the decreased tax on improvements would encourage the owners of improved farms to still further improve them.

The experience of the New Zealand and Australian municipalities that have adopted this plan shows that when taxes are on land values only, the public are no longer afraid of a high tax rate.

Since every expenditure on roads and other public improvements increases the value of the land, roads become to the taxpayer a very simple business proposition, and there is no longer any difficulty in securing a vote of necessary money.

Edmonton's Taxation and Debenture Issues

Edmonton, Alta., Feb. 6.—Five million five hundred thousand dollars is the amount of debentures to be issued by the municipality of Edmonton for civic improvements as soon as the by-laws, adopted at the last meeting of the council, are sanctioned by the ratifiers. The rate of interest is fixed at 5 per cent, the bonds to run from eight to forty years. The principal items are: Street railway extensions, \$1,543,220; telephone extensions, \$88,000; land for general purposes, \$67,720; power house extensions, \$484,720. Edmonton's unmet borrowing capacity today is \$10,701,670. The gross debenture debt is \$11,792,800, while the present indebtedness is \$3,238,430. The assessments are on grand values only, this being a single tax community, and amounted to \$123,474,020, exclusive of exemptions, in 1912. The estimated revenue was \$894,940, based on a tax levy of twelve mills on the dollar.

Another "Broncho Billy" Picture at the Gem Tomorrow; G. M. Anderson in a Fascinating Essanay Western Drama

Philadelphia, Feb. 6.—The Union Presbyterian church in West Philadelphia was sold at sheriff's sale to satisfy a judgment obtained by the Rev. But so far they had never had to put this power in force for it was in accordance with the wishes of the property owners that they made the changes. They were to the landlords' benefit for they increased the value, appearance and condition of their land.

"City planning," said Mr. Culpin, "is an insurance." Every dollar invested yields a hundred fold in the future. During the last thirty years there had been more than 30,000 unclaimed war medals in the ordnance stores at Woolwich.

CITY PLAN AND WORKINGMEN

Better and More Wholesome Homes

EXPERT IN HALIFAX

Edward G. Culpin Tells What is Being Done in Europe to Better the Lot of Workers

(Halifax Chronicle) That co-partnership tenancy leads up to city planning, both involving the same principle of co-operation, was the opinion of the English town-planning expert Edward G. Culpin when interviewed by The Morning Chronicle yesterday morning.

Mr. Culpin further holds the natural development to this co-partnership scheme is a city plan. If co-operation, among a few house-holders was beneficial, how much more so when the whole city was involved.

Speaking on co-partnership tenancy as practiced in England, Mr. Culpin described how it was established in each centre. A certain number of people wanted to live in proper houses if they could be built at a cheap rate. They wanted to have this done by the co-partnership method. Each one was willing to put down a lump sum and pay out so much money per month until they reached an agreed limit.

A number of prominent people in the district were then interested in the scheme. They put up loan stock, limited to a dividend of four per cent per annum. The plans were then submitted to the government. Under recent legislation the government had the power of letting to such companies two-thirds of the value of their property. The money for the remaining part had then to be secured by the company, after which all was smooth sailing.


