



# LORDS ARE BEATEN IN THE COMBAT

Creation of New Peers For **Political Purpose Not** 

## LANSDOWNE'S BILL

Probability is it Will be Quietly Withdrawn—A New Cunarder in Canada Service—The Imperial Conference and Its Great

(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, May 23—The House of Lords not in the throes of dissolution seems if not in the throes of dissolution seems preparing itself for reconstruction and mending on democratic lines.

The ill-starred bill introduced by Lord Lansdowne has been riddled by criticism of the Tory peers. That it will be quietly withdrawn is most likely, notwithstanding that it is read a second time without a division. The opposition in the peers will be directed solely to the veto bill and parliament bill, the moving of which by Lord Morley is the first step to any further progress.

The policy of the government is unchanged. That the parliament bill will be allowed to pass the second reading is expected and that it will be hung up till after the coronation, is no doubt agreed upon. If the peers reject the bill the prime minister will, it is believed, exercise his power to recommend his Majesty to call a sufficient Liberal majority of peers to the House of Lords to pass the parliament bill.

any disputed matter.

Compromise may be in the air, for the Lords are thoroughly beaten in their fight against the commons, and the Liberal government can afford to give a little, while at the same time moving no step in the direction of relinquishing their Liberal principles or bolstering up aristocratic and Tory privileges. The drastic step of making Liberal peers to swamp the Tory majority will not, it is believed, be needed, for when all is said the stability of our constitution has heretofore been maintained by the people's preference for compromise and the acceptance of a second best, rather than the jubilant triumph of big majorities.

The menu is to be all red, which is understood—no foreign trash for an English king, and the city party is not to be interrupted in the serious business of lunching with royalty by any speechifying. Except the royal toasts there are to be none, and these are to be drunk in silence.
